Since then a couple of more projects have been implemented and Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project (Phase-2) is the fifth project which is being implemented with the financial assistance from Japan Government through its donor agency JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency).

1. BACKGROUND

Rajasthan is the driest state in India. Two thirds of its geographical area is covered by Thar Desert, and the state has only 1.16% of the surface water in India. The average rainfall in Rajasthan is 531 mm against the national average of 1,200 mm. In the absence of surface water, reliance on ground water is excessive, and water table is depleting at an alarming rate in most of the area except in canal command area. Due to the severe climatic condition mentioned above, the forest & tree cover of Rajasthan State is only 7.11% (forest cover is 4.69%, and tree cover is 2.42% respectively), which is far below the national average of 23.4%, and the open forest cover out of the total forest is as high as 71.8%. Furthermore, the state faces a major challenge of desertification due to recurrent drought and increasing human and livestock pressures. Especially in western Rajasthan, desertification is causing wind erosion and deposition, followed by water erosion, as well as water logging and salinity. More than 60% area of western Rajasthan is affected by the desertification and requires intensive management to contain desertification.

Reflecting these severe conditions above, the Government of Rajasthan announced state specific forest policy called "Rajasthan State Forest Policy 2010", in which the Forest Department sets the target of more than 20% of vegetal cover to achieve and declares to take actions for combating desertification. According to the State Forest Policy, additional 45,000 square km of afforestation and pasture development is the gap to bridge in a reasonable timeframe.

In order to achieve the above-mentioned target with sustainable forest management, people's participation is indispensable. Forest guards in the State are forced to look after 10 to 15 sq km area as against the ideal norm of 5 to 7 sq km, which is unrealistic for the sustainable forest management only by the effort of the Rajasthan Forest Department. Although capacity development of the forest department is continuously undertaken, it is very significant to conduct afforestation activities through the participatory scheme of Joint Forest Management (JFM).

Rajasthan State enjoys the richness and uniqueness of biodiversity. It has wide variety of ecosystem ranging from the desert ecosystem in the west of Aravalis to moist deciduous forest in South Rajasthan. There are 2,500 species of plants, 450 species of birds, 50 species of mammals, 20 species of reptiles and 14 species of amphibians besides numerous species of insects, butterflies, micro flora and fauna. Among above, more than 400 species are said to be endemic to the Rajasthan State.

However, the State's biodiversity resources are under constant threat due to variety of natural and anthropogenic factors such as grazing, mining, direct poaching of wild animals and man-animal conflict. Due to increasing wilderness-human interface and decreasing buffer areas, there is increase of incidents in man-animal conflicts. As the Rajasthan State Forest Policy 2010 indicates, in order to release biotic pressure and create enabling environment to mitigate man-animal conflicts, it is imperative to undertake various biodiversity conservation improvements in conformity with the approved Management Plan of the area.





According to the Census 2001, there are 56.51 million people in Rajasthan, and Scheduled Tribes accounts for 12.6% of the total population. About 75 % of total population lives in rural area, and large number of impoverished people are dependent on forest for their means of livelihood. Loss of forest cover over the decades has led to reduction in incomes and put at risk the means of livelihood for them since forest degradation resulted in scarcity of fuel wood and other minor timber for their personal requirements. Lack of forage in forest has caused the livestock rearing communities either to migrate to faraway places to reduce the size of their herds, even to change to some other means of livelihood.

Taking into consideration that most of rural impoverished population is dependent on forest resources, the threats to forest might be partly attributed to continuous dependency of those people on forest by grazing, illicit cutting of trees and over-use of forest resources. Thus, providing alternative income sources in a participatory manner through Village Forest Protection and Management Committee (VFPMC)/Eco Development Committee (EDC)/Self Help Group (SHG) are required to mitigate biotic pressure on forest and ecosystem, which will result in cutting off the vicious cycle of poverty and natural resource degradation.





2. THE PROJECT

Government of Rajasthan has received a loan from the Japanese International Cooperation Agency (JICA) through Government of India for implementation of Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project Phase 2 (RFBP-2) across 15 districts of Rajasthan and in and around 7 Wild Life sanctuaries. The 8 year Project with an outlay of Rs. 1152.53 Crores involves taking up activities in the field of Afforestation, Soil and Water Conservation, Biodiversity Conservation, Poverty Alleviation and Livelihood Improvement in selected villages of the project area through active peoples' participation under the Joint Forest Management (JFM) approach. The project envisages active involvement of NGOs/VOs in the field of community mobilization and development and expert individuals, agencies and institutions in technical and specialized fields. The Project has already started in financial year 2011-12.

The Project is being implemented by Rajasthan Vaniki Evam Jaiv Vividhata Sanrakshan Society registered under Rajasthan Societies Registration Act 1958. The Society forms the State level Project Management Unit (PMU) of the Project. The Project Director, RFBP-2 is the ex-officio Chief Executive Officer of the Society and is responsible for the implementation of the Project. He is also the head of the Project Management Unit whose office is located in Aravalli Bhavan, Jhalana Institutional Area, Jaipur.

At the lower levels, the Project is being implemented by peoples' body namely Village Forest Protection and Management Committee (VFPMC) or Eco-Development Committee (EDC), as the case may be through the existing territorial forest division which is called as the Divisional Management Unit (DMU) of the Project and the concerned Range Office, which is called as the Field Management Unit (FMU) of the project. A VFPMC/EDC is formed as per the extant resolutions/regulations issued by Government of Rajasthan (GoR). Livelihood Promotion activities are envisaged to be undertaken through formation of Self Help Groups (SHGs) from within the members of VFPMCs/EDCs.

The Project Objective

"'To enhance forest area and livelihood opportunities of the forest dependent people and to conserve biodiversity by undertaking afforestation and biodiversity conservation measures through JFM approach, thereby contributing to environmental conservation and socio-economic development of Rajasthan."





3. THE PROJECT AREA

Project area consists of two parts respectively designed for Afforestation component and Biodiversity Conservation component.

1. AFFORESTATION:

- Total FIFTEEN (15) Districts
- Ten (10) districts in desert area (Barmer, Bikaner, Churu, Jaisalmer, Jalore, Jhunjhunun, Jodhpur, Nagaur, Pali and Sikar)
- Five (5) districts in non-desert area covering tribal population (Banswara, Dungarpur, Sirohi, Bhilwara and Jaipur).

2. BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION:

It consists of areas of in and around up to 2km of boundaries of the Protected Areas of SEVEN (7) sanctuaries (Keladevi WL Sanctuary, Kumbalgarh WL Sanctuary, Fulwari Ki Nal WL Sanctuary, Todgarh Raoli WL Sanctuary, Sitamata WL Sanctuary, Bassi WL Sanctuary and Jaisamand WL Sanctuary).

Activities of the components of Afforestation, Agro Forestry and Water Conservation Structure shall be conducted in 590 villages (340 villages in 10 districts in desert area and 250 villages in 5 districts in non-desert area). All activities in Afforestation, Agro-Forestry and Water Conservation Structure shall be undertaken by Village Forest Protect and Management Committee (VFPMC) with support from RFD.

Biodiversity Conservation component shall be undertaken in 60 villages in the 2km fringe area of the selected Protected Areas (7 sanctuaries). Village level works such as Drainage Line Treatment works, development of water points, closures for biodiversity conservation are conducted by Eco Development Committee (EDC). Activities such as in-situ conservation of germ plasma and development of biological parks shall be implemented directly by RFD. Poverty Alleviation and Livelihood Improvement and Capacity Development component shall be undertaken in all project villages.







4. PROJECT SCOPE

All project activities at the village level shall be undertaken in Joint Forest Management (JFM) mode. These activities shall be started with Community Mobilization. For the activities in JFM mode, services of local NGOs shall be sought to catalyze societal input much needed for long term sustainability of the project activities.

The brief scope of RFBP-2 is given below

5. IMPLEMENTING ORGANIZATION (Responsibilities and Mandate)

1. Project Management Unit

The Project is implemented through the Project Management Unit (PMU) at Jaipur, established as an autonomous society as per the Rajasthan Society Registration Act, 1958.

At the field level, 27 Division Management Units (DMU) and 80 Field Management Units (FMU) have been established, and the functioning of FMU is monitored by concerned DMU.

The High Powered Committee (HPC), headed by the Minister in charge of Forest Department, Government of Rajasthan has been constituted by the State Government as the highest decision-making body for the Project. The HPC also serve as the integrating and consolidating body to integrate and synergize the efforts of various departments and other institutions for the smooth and effective implementation of the project. The HPC functions to approve and endorse the operational manual of PMU and budget allocation.

PMU takes the overall managerial charge of the implementation of the Project. The Governing Body (GB) headed by the Principal Secretary has been created above PMU as required by the Society Registration Act. The GB monitors the financial and physical target to review the work of PMU and provide necessary assistance and direction from time to time. PMU functions for the overall project coordination, procurement management, financial management including collating the expenditure statements from field offices and prepares and submits reimbursement claims to JICA. It monitors and evaluates, and prepares reports such as Quarterly Progress Reports (QPR) and Project Completion Report (PCR).

DMUs have been created within the office of Divisional Forest Officer (DFO) and are not registered as autonomous society. DMUs implement the activities of the project in the Division and assist the PMU in planning, fund management, work progress monitoring and documentation at the field level. The DMUs receive project fund from PMU for the execution of the works and disburse it to project implementers such as VFPMCs/EDCs/SHGs/NGOs only after approval of the DFO in charge.

FMUs have been created within the office of Range Officer (RO) and are not registered as autonomous society. FMUs have following major functions: 1) execution of works 2) technical support to VFPMCs, EDCs and SHGs etc. at the village level.

2. **Project Management Consultant**

The PMC assists PMU in planning, implementation and monitoring of the project and as per JICA guidelines consists of International & Local consultants.

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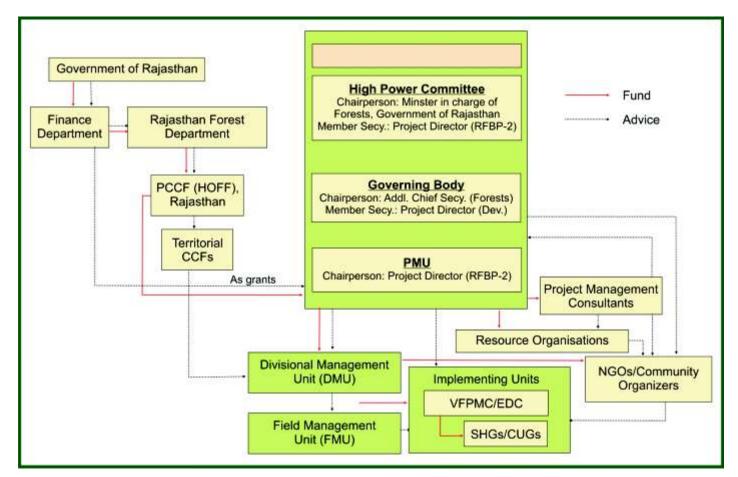

6. ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS (2011-12 and 2012-13)

The first two years of the project were basically preparatory phase in which the emphasis was on establishing of project executing bodies besides focussing on other ground building activities required for the success of project of this magnitude.

1. Establishment of PMU

For the implementation of the project, as per the Minutes of Discussion on Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project Phase 2 signed between Government of Rajasthan and JICA on 22nd December 2010, Rajasthan Vaniki Evam Jaiv Vividhta Sanrakshan Society with its Memorandum and Articles of Association was formed and registered under Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958 on 8th March 2011 vide registration Number 1207/Jaipur/2010-11.

Further to this, the government constituted the Project Management Unit (PMU) of Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project -Phase 2, vide Government Order No F12(2)/Forest/2011, Jaipur dated 11th April 2011 which stated that Rajasthan Vaniki Evam Jaiv Vividhta Sanrakshan Society shall be the Project Management Unit (PMU) and shall work as per the registered Memorandum and Articles of Association. The PMU will be in charge of the overall managerial tasks of the Project and will collate and consolidate the expenditure statements from divisional and field offices. PMU will also prepare documentation for reimbursement claims to JICA.

2. Preparation of Operation Manual

PMU being an autonomous society, exclusively created for implementation of the project, was to have duly approved set of financial and administrative guidelines and regulations for the society to carry out various activities of the project in consonance with the, government rules and regulations as also to facilitate their easier and better implementation.

The Operational Manual was duly approved by government vide Government Order No. P4(47)Forest/2006 dated 03rd April 2012.

3. Selection of PMC

To assist the PMU, concerned DMU & FMU with technical guidance and policy initiatives related to the Project for smooth and quality implementation of the project activities, Project Management Consultant (PMC) were selected.

The selection was done as per JICA Guidelines through international open bid tender. The basis of selection was "Quality and Cost Based Selection (QCBS)" in concurrence with JICA Guidelines.

The contract was signed on 29th March 2012 between Rajasthan Vaniki Evam Jaiv Vividhta Sanrakshan Society and Consortium of

4. Selection of Resource Organisation

To provide various services and support to the PMU, The Louis Berger Group, Inc. was selected as the resources organisation. The selection was done through open bid tender and as per JICA Guidelines Quality Based Selection (QBS) mode was adopted. The contract between PMU and LBG was signed on 22nd February 2013.

The discipline and scope of services to be provided by the resource organisation are:

- 1. Afforestation and Biodiversity Conservation: All technical matters relating to project activities under the Afforestation, Bio diversity Conservation and Water Conservation Packages.
- **2. Livelihood Promotion:** All matters relating to project activities that are proposed under the Packages of Agroforestry and Poverty Alleviation and Livelihood Improvement.
- **3. Joint Forest Management:** All matters dealing with mobilisation and consolidation of Community participation in the Project activities and Capacity Development and training of all stakeholders associated with the Project.
- **4. Monitoring and Evaluation:** All matters relating to documenting, reviewing, monitoring and evaluation of various project activities and their progress.
- **Geo-informatics and IT Enabled Services:** Setting up and running of Geoinformatics centres under the project which shall inter alia include, acquisition, storage, processing production presentation and dissemination of geoinformation relating to the project area and project activities.





- **Capacity Building, Training and Research:** All works related to capacity building of all the participating stakeholders of the project including the villagers, public representatives, NGOs, officials of other line departments, forest officials, project officials etc., and taking up of research activities under the project.
- 7. Extension, Publicity and Documentation: All matters relating to dissemination and wider publicity of project objectives, activities information, progress; as well as documentation of project successes, learning's, best practices etc
- **8. Project Administration:** All matters dealing with the functioning and administration of the PMU.

The resource organisation has for the desired services, provided at least one subject matter specialist for each of the above disciplines along with necessary supporting technical and managerial staff.

5. Selection of project villages

The basic unit of the project is 'Village'. Total 650 villages have been selected for the various activities under the project. Out of these 340 villages are in desert area, 250 are in non desert area and 60 villages are in the 2km fringe area of seven wildlife sanctuaries. In order to avoid replication of afforestation activities and to have more transparency, villages that have been intervened under any previous externally aided projects including JICA assisted projects for afforestation have been excluded.

SELECTION CRITERIA OF TARGETED VILLAGES

- 1. Village is the core unit of all project activities. Project activities shall be taken up only in selected villages which conform to the overall requirements of the project. The project area can be safely divided into two distinct categories as follows:
- a. Core project districts development of available land resource including forest land, community land, waste land, Panchayat land and even private land for increase in vegetal cover and alleviation of poverty is the primary objective. These can be further divided into the following distinct groups:
- Desert Districts: These include the districts of Jaisalmer, Bikaner, Churu, Sikar, Jhunjhunu,
 Jalore, Nagaur, Barmer, Jodupur and Pali. These districts are characterized by:
 - Low population density-widely distributed habitations
 - High livestock number enormous fodder requirement
 - Less forest area

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- Less number of villages
- Villages having larger areas
- Abundant availability of wasteland
- ii. Non-desert Districts: In this group fall the districts of Jaipur, Bhilwara, Dungarpur, Banswara and Sirohi. These districts have following characteristics:
 - Relatively higher population density
 - More forest area
 - More number of villages
 - Lesser area per village
 - Mostly tribal dominated
 - Limited availability of wasteland
- iii. Areas falling within 2 km periphery of the selected Protected Areas conservation of wildlife habitat with rich biodiversity and mitigation of man-animal conflicts are the primary objective. Villages lying in the 2 Km belt along the boundaries of selected Protected Areas fall under this category. These areas have following characteristics:
 - Remote and underdeveloped
 - Mostly tribal dominated
 - Availability of land with better rootstock
 - Better biodiversity potential
- 2. In light of the difference mentioned above, the specific criterion for selection of village shall also differ accordingly. Specific parameters on the basis of which a village shall be selected for implementation of project activities for both the categories mentioned above are given below:

The following parameters of a village shall be objectively assessed for inclusion in the Project:

Socio-economic parameters

Incidence of poverty





- Degree of dependence on forests
- Proportion of tribal/backwards population

Proximity to forest area – the nearer, the better

Design parameter

Potentiality of cluster formation

METHODOLOGY

- Through a rapid assessment and survey, secondary data available about the socio-economic parameters and information about availability of suitable land for project activities, a preliminary list of potential villages in each selected Range would be formed.
- Tentative clusters of villages would then be formed based on their geographical proximity to each other. Based on the information, villages would be assigned scores as follows:

 - Develop capabilities among the people to coordinate, manage and monitor and evaluate the progress of various components and activities of the project.
 - Identifying beneficiaries of various project components especially those related to poverty alleviation and livelihood improvement.





- g. Identify the poor and forest dependent communities and organize them in Self Help Groups (SHGs) in project villages.
- h. Conduct training for SHG members on various institutional and management aspects of SHG.
- i. Developing sufficient and adequate linkages for skill up gradation and marketing and also support in convergence with other government schemes and departments.
- j. Collection and compilation of data and carry out regular monitor and review the progress of project activities in line with the objectives of the project and ensure achievement of objectives within stipulated timeframe.
- 2. Prepare a detailed Micro plan for each selected village as per the requirement of the project and as suggested by the DMU
- 3. Secure appropriate approval of the Prepared Micro Plan from the VFPMC and DMU as per the guidelines of the DMU.
- 4. Undertake regular review and revision of Micro plan on every two years.
- 5. Strive for and ensure proper implementation of Micro plan.
- 6. Constitute/ reconstitute and/or strengthen the VFPMCs/EDCs/SHGs as per the laid down guidelines of Government of Rajasthan.
- 7. Ensure regular and proper functioning of VFPMC/EDC/SHG.
- 8. Any other activity mentioned in the RFP or assigned by the DMU.
- 9. The respondent will analyze the data and make presentations as and when required before the DMU particularly before submitting any report /plans and incorporate any suggestions made by the DMU.
- 10. Detailed Plan of Action (DPA): Based on the requirements of the project, area and local conditions, a village wise Detailed Plan of Action shall be prepared by the NGO in consultation with the DMU in a period of one month from the date of issuance of work order by the DMU. Such a Plan would include an exhaustive list of activities that need to be conducted in the area to secure the intended objectives as well the dynamics of the proposed activities. The DPA would clearly specify the phasing out of the activities, time of delivery of various output expected in the assignment etc which shall be finalized in consultation with the DMU. Such a list would be monitored and reviewed on a regular basis (at least once every quarter) by the NGO Coordinator and the DMU and can be revised on mutual understanding, if such a need is felt for the furtherance of the objectives of the Project. 7. Training of NGOs

Orientation and training programs for the NGOs selected for community mobilization, microplanning and for assistance to DMUs in implementation of the project activities were organised. These were attended by the representatives of NGOs and selected staffs of DMUs and FMUs.

8. Formation of VFPMC/EDC

Community participation and Joint Forest Management is the essence of the Project. In accordance with the JFM resolution (dated 17th October, 2000) of the state, 590 VFPMCs have to be formed in desert and non-desert villages under the project. Besides this 60 EDCs have to be formed in the fringe villages of the selected protected areas (7 sanctuaries) of the state as per the EDC resolution of the state (dated 24th October, 2000). These VFPMCs / EDCs have to be involved in planning, implementation and monitoring of all project activities as well as maintenance and sustainable use of assets created under the project.

In 2012-13, 192 VFPMCs/EDCs have been formed. These VFPMC / EDC are empowered to undertake project activities and have been trained to manage funds in an efficient and transparent manner.

9. **Preparation of Micro Plans**

Micro planning is the backbone of all kind of activities for the project. It lists out all activities required for proper integrated socio-economic development of the village and its inhabitants taking into account the natural, ecological, social, human, animal and skill based resources of the villages.

NGOs have assisted DMUs in the preparation of Micro Plan in project villages with the participation of village members and local forest staff.

In 2012-13, approximately 200 Micro Plans were prepared after extensive Participatory Rural Appraisal and Rapid Assessment and Situation Analysis. They were approved by the Executive Committee of the VFPMC / EDC and sanctioned by the concerned Deputy Conservator of Forests. They were subsequently scrutinized by the Project Monitoring and Appraisal Group (PMAG). On the basis of approval and scrutinized Micro Plan, budget allotments were made to DMU which were further forwarded to VFPMC / EDC.

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10. Capacity building

The Project lays a lot of emphasis on organising training programmes for the Project Staff and Community Members for smooth implementation of the Project and also for sustainability of the benefits and impacts created by the Project. The MOD has listed out priority areas of training for different project staff and other stakeholders.

A brief summary of the trainings conducted in 2011-12 and 2012-13 is given below:

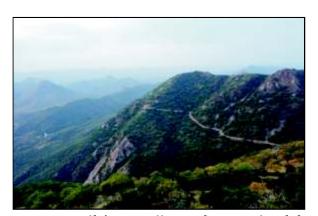

3. Aims and Objectives of the Society:

The aims and objectives of the society shall be the following:

1. Name of the Society:

The area of operation of the Society shall be limited to complete area of the districts of Bikaner, Jodhpur, Jaisalmer, Pali, Nagaur, Churu, Barmer, Jalore, Bhilwara, Banswara, Dungarpur, Jaipur, Jhunjhunu, Sikar and Sirohi and areas in and around Ravali Todgarh, Kumbhalgarh, Phulwari ki Naal, Jaisamand, Sita-Mata, Bassi and Keladevi Wild Life Sanctuaries within the State of the Rajasthan.

3. Aims and Objectives of the Society:

The aims and objectives of the society shall be the following:

- 1. To effectively implement the activities of Rajasthan Forestry and Bio-diversity Project Phase 2.
- 2. Restoration of degraded forests and public land of the State with active participation of the people through Joint Forest Management approach.
- 3. Promotion of community / tribal development through own initiative and convergence of development schemes.
- 4. Provide better opportunities of income generation to people of the State especially those dependent on forests, through forest development and biodiversity conservation works.
- 5. Implement all types of activities directed at conservation of forests, wildlife and biodiversity.

- 11. To achieve convergence and synergy through coordination of activities of various agencies engaged in development and conservation of forests, wildlife and biodiversity.
- 12. To construct and develop necessary structures for development and conservation of forests, wildlife and biodiversity.
- 13. To implement various community development /entry point activities to strengthen peoples' participation in development and conservation of forests, wildlife and biodiversity.
- 14. To construct various types of soil and water conservation structures and develop suitable techniques for promoting soil and water conservation in the State.
- 15. To adequately educate, train and improve the skill of all stakeholders for achieving the above objectives.
- 16. To carry out any further activities in the furtherance of the above objectives.

4. Short title, extent and commencement

- (i) These Bye-laws shall be called the Bye-laws of the Rajasthan Vaniki Evam Jaiv-vividhta Sanrakhshan Society.
- (ii) These shall extend and apply to all the members of High Power Committee, Governing Body, Office bearers of the society and shall relate to properties, activities and transactions of the Society.
- (iii) They shall come into force on the day on which the society is registered.

5. Definitions

In these Bye-laws, unless the context requires otherwise,

- i. "DMU" means Divisional Management Unit(s) at level of Forest Division headed by Divisional Forest Officer/Deputy Conservator of Forests of the Division concerned.
- ii. "FMU" means Field Management Unit(s) at level of Forest Ranges headed by Forest Range





Officer of the Range concerned.

- iii. "Governing Body" means the Governing Body of the Society.
- iv. "Government" means the State Government of Rajasthan.
- v. "HPC" means High Power Committee of Rajasthan Forestry & Bio-diversity Project Phase 2.
- vi. "PMU" means Project Management Unit of Rajasthan Forestry & Bio-diversity Project Phase 2 at the State level.
- vii. "Society" means the Rajasthan Vaniki Evam Jaiv-vividhata Sanrakhshan Society.

Constitution of the Society

The society shall be an autonomous non-profit organization registered under the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958.

7. Members of the Society:

The following shall be the members of the society:

- (i) All persons subscribing to the Memorandum of Association.
- (ii) Members of HPC, Governing Body and Heads of DMUs shall be the members of the society, in their ex-officio capacity.
- (iii) In addition, the Government may, from time to time, nominate any officer of the Government as member of the Society.

All official members of the society shall be the members of the society in their ex-officio capacity and on transfer of charge, one shall cease to be such member of the society and the new incumbent shall become member of the society in his/her ex-officio capacity.

8. High Power Committee (HPC):

There shall be a High Power Committee with following composition, as the highest decision making body of the society:

A representative of Ministry of Environment & Forests, Government of India and also a representative of Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) may be invited to HPC meetings as Special Invitees.

9. Powers and Function of High Power Committee:

The High Power Committee shall be the highest decision making body of the society and shall be empowered to act on behalf of the society in all matters. It shall have the following powers and perform following functions:

- i. Approval of annual plan of the society
- ii. Approval of budget, accounts and Operational Manual of the society.
- iii. Approval of plans and programmes in furtherance of the objectives of the society.
- iv. Formation of committees for various purposes and delegating suitable powers to them
- v. Making, altering, modifying schemes, rules and regulations or approving such alteration, modification or changes considered necessary for achieving the objectives of the society, for management of affairs of the society, for running of the institution or for furtherance of the objectives of the society.
- vi. Delegation of appropriate powers to the Chairperson, Vice-chairperson, Member Secretary or any other office bearer of the HPC or the Governing Body of the society.
- vii. Facilitate meaningful coordination amongst various departments of the Government and other agencies for achieving the objectives of the society.

10. Meetings of HPC:

The High Power Committee shall meet at least once in a year or more frequently, if felt necessary. Ordinarily fifteen days notice shall be given before holding a meeting of the HPC. In case of urgency, however, the meeting may be held at a shorter notice. The quorum of the meeting shall be six including the Chairperson or Vice-chairperson, the presence of either of them being mandatory.

11. Powers and duties of the Chairperson of HPC:

The Minister in-charge of Forests in the Government of Rajasthan shall be the Chairperson of the HPC and shall preside over the meeting of the HPC and the General Body and perform other functions as decided by the HPC from time to time.





12. Powers and duties of the Vice-chairperson of HPC:

The Chief Secretary, Rajasthan, shall be the Vice Chairperson of the HPC and shall preside over the meetings of HPC in the absence of the Chairperson. He shall perform other functions as decided by the HPC from time to time or as directed by the Chairperson of HPC.

13. Powers and duties of the Member Secretary of HPC:

The Project Director, Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project Phase 2, shall be the Member Secretary of the HPC and shall, inter alia, perform the following functions:

- i. Preparation of agenda for meeting of the HPC and the General Body
- ii. Maintenance of the records of proceedings of all such meetings of the HPC and the General Body
- iii. Ensuring action on all decisions taken by the HPC and the General Body and reporting back the progress achieved.
- iv. Preparation of necessary plans, manuals etc for the perusal and approval of the HPC.
- v. Preparation of suitable plans and proposals for appropriate growth and development of the society and ensuring their execution after approval.
- vi. Appointment and control, including termination of services, of the staff deployed under contractual agreement by the society.
- vii. Appointment and control of staff other than those under contractual appointment, after prior approval of the HPC.
- viii. Administration and management of the funds of the society according to the extant rules and regulations applicable and as per the policy laid down by the HPC.
- ix. Act as a person on behalf of the society in whose name the society may initiate or respond to any legal/quasi legal/administrative proceeding in any court of law/tribunal/departmental commissions etc.
- x. Such other functions as are delegated or entrusted to him by the HPC.

14. Governing Body:

There shall be a Governing Body to look after the day-to-day working of the Society, which shall comprise of the following members:

15. Powers and Functions of Governing body:

The functions of the Governing Body shall, inter alia, include:

- i. Monitoring the financial and physical progress of the programmes of the society,
- ii. Providing guidance and proposing initiatives and changes in policies, rules and regulation and other such aspects for better and efficient working of the society and for furtherance of the objectives of the society.
- iii. Preparing and approving plans, proposals etc to be placed before HPC.
- iv. Preparation of suitable plans and proposals for appropriate growth and development of the society and ensuring their execution after approval.
- v. Preparation of agenda for meeting of the HPC and the General Body
- vi. Any other functions as prescribed by the HPC

16. Meetings of the Governing Body:

The Governing Body shall meet at least once in three months or more frequently, if deemed necessary. The Principal Secretary (Forests) shall call and preside over the meeting of Governing Body. In his absence, however, the Principal Chief Conservator of Forests (Head of Forest Force), Rajasthan may preside over the meeting of the General Body. Ordinarily seven days notice shall be given for the meeting of the Governing Body. In case of urgency, the meeting may be held at a shorter notice. A minimum of four members shall form the quorum for the meeting of the Governing Body.

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17. Chief Executive Officer (CEO):

The Project Director, Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project Phase 2, appointed by the State Government, shall be the ex-officio Chief Executive Officer of the Society and head of the Project Management Unit (PMU) of Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project Phase 2. The Chief Executive Officer shall perform the following duties:

- a) To prepare and disseminate technical, administrative and financial guidelines, instructions, and approvals in connection with the works under Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project Phase 2 and others projects, programmes implemented by the Society.
- b) To prepare a mission document which shall state specific goals of the Society, strategies to be adopted, programmes and works to be taken up, and time frame for achieving predetermined specific targets for each Divisional Management Unit (DMU) and Field Management Unit (FMU).
- c) To supervise and review the progress of all activities under Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project, Phase 2 and other programmes of the society.
- d) To carry out day- to- day activities of the society and overall supervision of Rajasthan Forestry and Biodiversity Project, Phase 2 and other programmes being implemented by the society.
- e) To execute and effectively implement the directions and decisions of HPC, Governing Body, etc.
- To exercise, such power, as may be necessary for achieving the objectives of the society.
- g) To perform all such functions and acts necessary for the furtherance of the objectives of the society within the framework of the rules and regulations laid down for the working of the society by the HPC or the Government.

18. General Body of the Society and its meeting:

The General Body of the society shall comprise of all members of the society and shall meet at least once in a year to discuss the affairs of the society and adopt the annual report of the society. The office bearers of the HPC shall be the office bearers of the society. The Chairperson of HPC shall call the Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the General Body of the society after the close of financial year and before 30th of June every year on a notice of at least 15 days. The meeting of the General Body shall be presided by the Chairperson of HPC. The Member Secretary of the HPC shall also be the Member Secretary of the General Body of the society. In the absence of the Chairperson of HPC, the Vice Chairperson of HPC shall preside over the meeting of the General Body. The quorum of AGM shall be 10 members. In the AGM, the following business shall be transacted:





- i. Consideration, adoption and approval of Annual Report and annual audited Statement of accounts of the Society for the financial year just ended.
- ii. Consideration and adoption of Annual plan of the society for the financial year in progress
- iii. Consideration and approval of appointment of Auditors for the ensuing year.
- iv. Other business on the agenda given in the notice for the meeting
- v. Other such issues which may come up during the course of the meeting after approval from the chair.

19. Special General Meeting:

Such special meetings of the General Body may be called by the Chairperson, suo moto or may be called by the Chairperson of HPC, if ten or more members of the General Body make a written request for the same clearly specifying justifiable reasons for calling such a meeting. In both cases, however, a notice of at least 15 days should be given. The quorum of such special meetings shall be the same as that of Annual General Meetings.

20. Financial Year:

The official financial year of the society shall be from 01 April of a year to 31st of March of the subsequent year.

21. Funds of the Society:

- The society may receive funds in form of budgetary provisions, grants, aid, or otherwise in form of any other lawful instrument from Government of India and/or Government of Rajasthan or any of their departments, agencies, institutions etc., from private sources, Non-Governmental organizations/Voluntary agencies etc. for activities related to the furtherance of the objectives of the society.
- ii. Funds received by the society shall be kept and operated through one or more Accounts in one or more Nationalized Banks, as may be felt necessary after obtaining approval of the HPC.
- iii. The Society may receive such funds as may be provided by or through the State Government or the Government of India and such assistance as the State Government may permit it to receive and all funds so received shall be credited into its aforesaid accounts.
- iv. The Society may borrow funds from such sources as the State Government may permit.
- v. The Chief Executive Officer or any other officer of the society duly authorized by him, may operate the accounts of the society and undertake financial transactions of the Society as per the approved financial regulations of the society.





vi. The Society shall have a detailed accounting procedure which would be approved by the HPC, along with an approved Operational Manual, to carry out its financial transactions.

22. Audit of Accounts:

The Society shall maintain proper accounts and others relevant records and prepare annual accounts following the approved accounting procedure. The accounts of the Society shall be audited in such manner and through such agency or agencies as may be approved by the HPC.

Provided, Government may cause the accounts of the Society to be audited by such agencies as may be decided or directed by the Government.

23. Legal Action:

All legal action initiated on behalf of the Society or against the society shall be in the name of the Chief Executive Officer of the Society. The Chief Executive officer may sue or be sued on behalf of the Society for movable and immovable properties.

24. Amendment in the Bye-Laws:

The Articles of Association (Bye laws) of the society cannot be altered except by a resolution passed by two-third of the members of the General Body in the meeting called for the purpose and the approval of HPC to that effect and as per the provisions of the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act 1958:

Provided, no such amendment shall be approved or accepted which alters the basic objectives of the society or is not in consonance with or prejudicial to the furtherance of the objectives of the society.

25. Change of Purpose:

The society is not entitled to alter its objectives or amalgamate itself wholly or partly, with any other society, without complying with the section 12 of the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958.

26. Dissolution of the Society:

The Society may be dissolved subject to section 13 and 14 of the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958 and after obtaining the concurrence of Government. If, upon such dissolution, there remains, after liquidation of all debts and liabilities, any fund or assets whatsoever, the same shall be transferred to the Government or any Government Agency pursuing similar objectives as decided by the Government.

27. General Provision:

All the provisions of the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958 shall apply to the society. The





Registrar of Societies shall have full powers of inspection and suggestions made by him shall be complied with.

28. Certification:

We, the following members, certify that:

- i. The rules , as stated above, represent the correct rules and regulations of the Rajasthan Vaniki Evam Jaiv-vividhta Sanrakhshan Society .
- ii. There is no other registered Society in the same name and at the same place.
- iii. This is the true and correct copy of the bye-laws of the Society.

All the legal matters shall be guided under the Rajasthan Societies Registration Act, 1958.

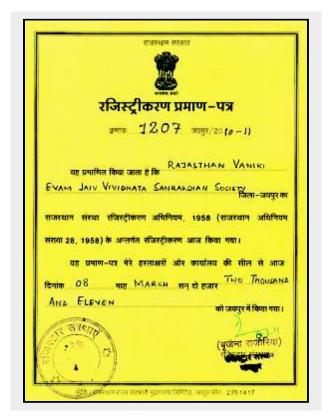

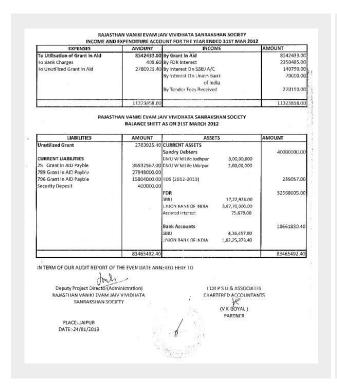
