EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Background: The Rajasthan Secondary Towns Development Sector Project (RSTDSP), is the fourth phase of investment projects financed by Asian Development Bank (ADB) and implemented by the Rajasthan Urban Drinking Water Sewerage and Infrastructure Corporation Limited-Externally Aided Projects (RUDSICO-EAP), previously known as Rajasthan Urban Infrastructure Development Project (RUIDP). RSTDSP seeks to improve water supply sewerage and other infrastructure services in secondary towns of Rajasthan with populations ranging from 20,000-110,000 through a sector loan modality. The project is aligned with the following impact(s): (i) access to potable, affordable, reliable, equitable, and environmentally sustainable drinking water supply in all urban areas of Rajasthan improved; and (ii) health status of urban population, especially the poor and under-privileged improved through improvements in sewerage systems of sub-project towns (iii) improvements in other infrastructure services of some towns. Under RSTDSP, work is in progress in 14 project towns. RSTDSP will support the ongoing efforts of the Government of Rajasthan towards improving the sewerage conditions of 13 towns through undertaking Faecal Sludge and Septage Management (FSSM) works. The Government of Rajasthan has decided to take up implementation of Water Supply, Sewerage, Drainage, Faecal Sludge and Septage Management (FSSM) and other city improvement works including city beautification works in about 23 towns under the additional financing of \$200 million from Asian Development Bank (ADB). The Department of Economic Affairs (DEA), Government of India has agreed for additional financing of these new projects. Conservation, restoration and development of heritage sites of Nawalgarh town is one of the subprojects proposed under the investment component of RSTDSP-additional financing.

Subproject Description: Nawalgarh is one of the towns selected under additional financing of RSTDSP and key components are: (i) Development of Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground; (ii) Development of Surya Mandal Playground; (iii) Conservation, restoration and façade lighting of 4 City Gates; (iv) Development of heritage walks in the town and (v) Rehabilitation of 29 heritage assets.

Scope of Land Acquisition and Resettlement: Land acquisition is not envisaged for the development, restoration, conservation and execution of proposed subproject components of Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground, Surya Mandal Playground, conservation, restoration of 4 city gates and heritage walk (**Refer Figure 1 to 8**). All proposed sites are in *Khasra* number 1332, copy of land records is attached in appendix. One common property resource (CPR) i.e. *Shivalaya* (Shiva's abode – in this case, a small sized unauthorized worship structure, not registered with Devasthan Department) was found during transect walk at Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground (**Refer to Figure 9**), which will not be affected by the project facilitated renovation works.

Involuntary Resettlement Impact: The involuntary resettlement impacts assessed through subproject census and socio-economic survey based on detailed design include loss of livelihoods and relocation impacts. Implementation of the subproject will entail temporary economic impacts to 149 vendors (147 male and 2 female vendors- total 885 family members with 496 males and 389 females). Out of the 149 vendors, (**a**) 113 vendors (664 family members consisting of 373 males and 291 females) will be temporarily affected during development of Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground. These vendors occupy a part of the fair ground to conduct business of selling puja samgiri (worship material), fruit, vegetable, tea etc. As part of this subproject component, construction of 140 small shops within the premises of Ramdev Mela Ground is proposed. Cost of construction of shops is already mentioned in the bill of quantity (BoQ). The aforesaid 113 vendors will be accommodated / provided shops within the 140 shops proposed to be constructed. This arrangement will enable the 113 vendors to elevate their status from non-

titled vendors to vendors with recognizable rights of the shops. During the development and construction activity in and around Ramdev Fair Ground, the 113 affected vendors will be temporarily provided an alternate space (at 100 meters distance from current location) to continue their business activity. The proximity of the alternate space to their current location will ensure that their clientele can continue to be catered by them. Permanent shops with secure tenure and recognizable rights to the shops upon completion of work at same place as their current location will ensure that the livelihood impact is temporary. Prior to start of civil works, confirmation shall be obtained from Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh for allotment of shops free of cost (at the proposed shopping complex at Ramdev Fair Ground) to potential affected persons for restoration and enhancement of their livelihood. Project will facilitate shifting of all 113 vendors to new shops. Temporary livelihood loss for establishment of business in the new shops (30 days) and a two-time shifting assistance in accordance with the entitlement matrix has been included in this resettlement plan. No permanent negative impacts on vendors at Mela Ground is envisaged and all will be provided new shops constructed under this subproject. Monthly rent shall be decided based on MoU according to the terms of municipality, to be agreed with the allottee. Disabled and elderly affected shop owners will be allocated shops on the ground floor, to ensure universal access and convenience to them.

Additionally, the restoration and replacement of damaged parts of 3 city gates (Baori Gate, Nansa Gate, Poddar Gate) will have temporary livelihood impacts on **(b)** 15 vendors /shops (88 family members consisting of 46 males and 42 females). Out of the 15 vendors/shops; 10 are operating through permanent structures (no structure loss envisaged) and 5 have pushcarts. Restoration of Mandi Gate will have no impacts. Similarly, development of heritage walkways will cause temporary livelihood impacts on **(c)** 07 vendors (55 family members consisting of 30 males and 25 females). Development of Naya Bazar Bus Stand Chowk (Square) will also cause temporary livelihood impacts on **(d)** 2 vendors (12 family members consisting of 6 males and 6 females). Development of Old Bus Stand Chowk (Square) will also have temporary livelihood impacts on **(e)** 12 vendors (66 family members consisting of 41 males and 25 Females). Implementation of subproject component 'Rehabilitation of 29 heritage assets' including development of Balbaksh Ka Kuan (Well), Chaukhani Kuan (Well) and Havelis (Mansion), are not expected to have any resettlement and/or livelihood impacts.

As per discussion with design team, it was confirmed that scaffolds will be used (BoQ items) during restoration of gates to avoid the impacts of renovation activities on the shops

adjacent to the gates. However, to mitigate any potential impacts (temporary loss of livelihood and income) on shops during subproject implementation, adequate budget has been proposed in the resettlement plan. In discussion with technical team, 30 days' compensation for temporary livelihood loss and shifting allowance for vendors required to shift (one-time for 26 vendors, two-time for 113 vendors and none for 10 vendors who will not be required to shift) has been included in the resettlement budget. Based on data from the socio-economic survey, out of 149 vendors, 17 vendors (11%) belong to vulnerable category; 12 (8%) are from scheduled caste (SC) category comprising 72 family members (39 males and 33 females), 2 (1.33%) are Female Headed Households (FHH) comprising 13 family members (04 males and 09 females) and 3 (2%) belong to Below Poverty Line (BPL) category comprising 18 family members (11 males and 07 females). None of the potential affected persons are from scheduled tribe (ST) category.

After assessment of sites, contractor shall prepare works plan including details, how to implement the proposed works including repair and façade works of gates including subproject specific environmental management plan. After submission of works plan, reassessment will be undertaken by safeguard team and draft resettlement plan will be updated and same shall be shared to ADB for approval.

Consultation and Disclosure: Goals and objectives of the project have been disclosed to stakeholders (including beneficiaries, affected persons, elected representatives and institutional stakeholders) through consultation meetings during preparation of preliminary project report and preparation of draft resettlement plan (RP). These included site-specific meetings with surrounding communities and affected persons, focus group discussions and a town-level multi-stakeholder meeting. A total of 192 community members (178 males and 14 females) were consulted including affected persons. A city level committee (CLC) meeting was held on 21-08-2023 chaired by district collector at collectorate meeting hall in Jhunjhunu district regarding subproject scope and ADB funding details. Additional consultations will be conducted and will be continued throughout the subproject implementation. Leaflet containing project scope, types of impacts and entitlement, proposed grievance redress mechanism was circulated to stakeholders as well as potential affected persons. A hard copy of the summaries of the resettlement plan (both draft and the final) in the local language (Hindi) will also be made available at government offices and complete approved documents will be uploaded at project management unit (PMU) and ADB websites.

Grievance Redress Mechanism: GRM will be established for the entire project including this subproject. The GRM will aim to provide a time-bound and transparent mechanism to voice and resolve social and environmental concerns linked to the project.

Resettlement Budget and Financing Plan: The resettlement budget for this subproject components includes compensation for temporary loss of livelihood/income, resettlement assistances and assistance to vulnerable households as outlined in the entitlement matrix and 20% contingency provision, in total amounting to **₹2,578,584 (INR 2.578 million)**. The Superintending Engineer / Executive Engineer of PIU will issue sanction order for compensation payment to affected persons which shall be released through electronic clearance service/National Electronic Fund Transfer (ECS/NEFT) transaction from bank, through concerned Treasury of the state administration.

Institutional Setup: The Local Self Government Department (LSGD), Government of Rajasthan (GOR) will be the executing agency (EA) of the project and LSGD will be responsible for overall strategic approvals, guidance, and monitoring of the project. Rajasthan Urban Drinking Water Sewerage and Infrastructure Corporation Limited (RUDSICO) will be implementing Agency (IA)

for the project. The Project Management Unit (PMU) is housed in the Externally Aided Projects division of RUDSICO (RUDSICO – EAP). Resettlement plan implementation will be closely monitored by PIU/PMU. Monitoring reports prepared by PIU will be compiled by PMU on a semi-annual basis for due submission to ADB.

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Project Description

1. The Rajasthan Secondary Towns Development Sector Project (RSTDSP), is the fourth phase of investment projects financed by Asian Development Bank (ADB) and implemented by the Rajasthan Urban Drinking Water Sewerage and Infrastructure Corporation Limited-Externally Aided Projects (RUDSICO-EAP), previously known as Rajasthan Urban Infrastructure Development Project (RUIDP). RSTDSP seeks to improve water supply sewerage and other infrastructure services in secondary towns of Rajasthan with populations ranging from 20,000-110,000 through a sector loan modality. The project is aligned with the following impact(s): (i) access to potable, affordable, reliable, equitable, and environmentally sustainable drinking water supply in all urban areas of Rajasthan improved; and (ii) health status of urban population, especially the poor and under-privileged improved through improvements in sewerage systems of sub-project towns (iii) improvements in other infrastructure services of some towns. 2. The fourth phase of RUIDP with a loan amount of \$300 million (project costs 428.5 million), for fourteen towns, including towns of heritage/tourism importance, with populations ranging of 20,000 –100,000, was launched in 2020. Based on speedy implementation of this phase, ADB has agreed for additional financing of \$200 million under the same program, to support similar investment in more than thirty similar sized towns. The scope continues to be to meet the infrastructure gaps in water supply, sanitation and drainage. An additional aspect of city beautification and conservation of historical sites has been added, for the first time, as part of scope of titles undertaken under RUIDP.

3. Nawalgarh is a heritage city in Jhunjhunu district of Indian state Rajasthan. Nawalgarh is famous for its fresco paintings, havelis (Mansion) and johads (Pond). Nawalgarh is situated at 27° 52 north latitude and 75° 17 east longitudes. It is situated in the southwest of Jhunjhunu at a distance of 145 km from state capital Jaipur and 37 km from district headquarter Jhunjhunu. According to the census on 2011, Nawalgarh city has a population of 63,948 with an average sex ratio of 930 females per male and literacy rate being 74.44% which is greater than the average literacy rate of Rajasthan (66.11%). Nawalgarh experienced decadal population growth of an average 50% till 2001 but since then, the decadal growth dropped down to 2.87% by 2011. Nawalgarh city has 35 administrative wards. The average household size is 4.2 persons, and the majority of the population lives in nuclear families. The city is well connected by road and rail, and is easily accessible from major cities such as Jaipur and Delhi.

4. Nawalgarh has also been established as a tourist town due to its ancient artistic mansions, which are visited by tourists from all over the country and abroad. The two famous havelis (Mansion) here are Poddar Haveli (Mansion) and Moyarka Haveli (Mansion). There is also a special museum of artifacts in the Moyarka Haveli (Mansion). The town today can be seen with empty havelis (Mansion) as the owner have moved out to some other town due to limited

employment opportunities in the town hence the traditional havelis are deteriorating and so the culture of the town. The city is a hub for handicrafts and arts and is famous for its beautiful havelis (mansions) adorned with exquisite frescoes and murals. The city also hosts several cultural and religious festivals throughout the year, including Diwali, Holi, Teej, and Gangaur, which attract tourists from all over India and abroad. The city's development has also led to the growth of small-scale industries and trade, with a number of markets and commercial centers emerging in recent years. Overall, Nawalgarh is a vibrant and dynamic city that offers a unique blend of heritage, culture, and modernity.

5. Nawalgarh is the second most popular destination of foreign tourists in the Shekhawati region. About 46,000 foreign tourists, mostly from Europe, visit Jhunjhunu district every year, out of which 70 to 80 percent of tourists visit Nawalgarh. Most of the domestic tourists come from Maharashtra, Delhi NCR and Rajasthan particularly from Jaipur, Mandawa, Churu, Jhunjhunu etc. There is a huge potential for the development of the tourism industry in Nawalgarh.

6. Nawalgarh is an important tourist destination in the state of Rajasthan. Implementation of subproject will improve the tourism scenario of town and will provide a new recreational avenue to local public and a new tourist spot. This will improve livability in Nawalgarh town. The objective of this subproject is to improve economic development by providing infrastructure and service in city beautification. The improvement of quality of life and thereby effective contribution of beneficiary people in the economic activity is expected. The objective of the subproject includes: (i) Improve infrastructural facilities and help create durable public assets and quality-oriented services in cities to inculcate and boost the healthy environment (ii) Development of Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground, Surya Mandal Playground and surrounding area to create a tourist destination and city level urban Haat (Market) area for Nawalgarh residents. (iii) Enhance tourism and economic activities in Nawalgarh district.

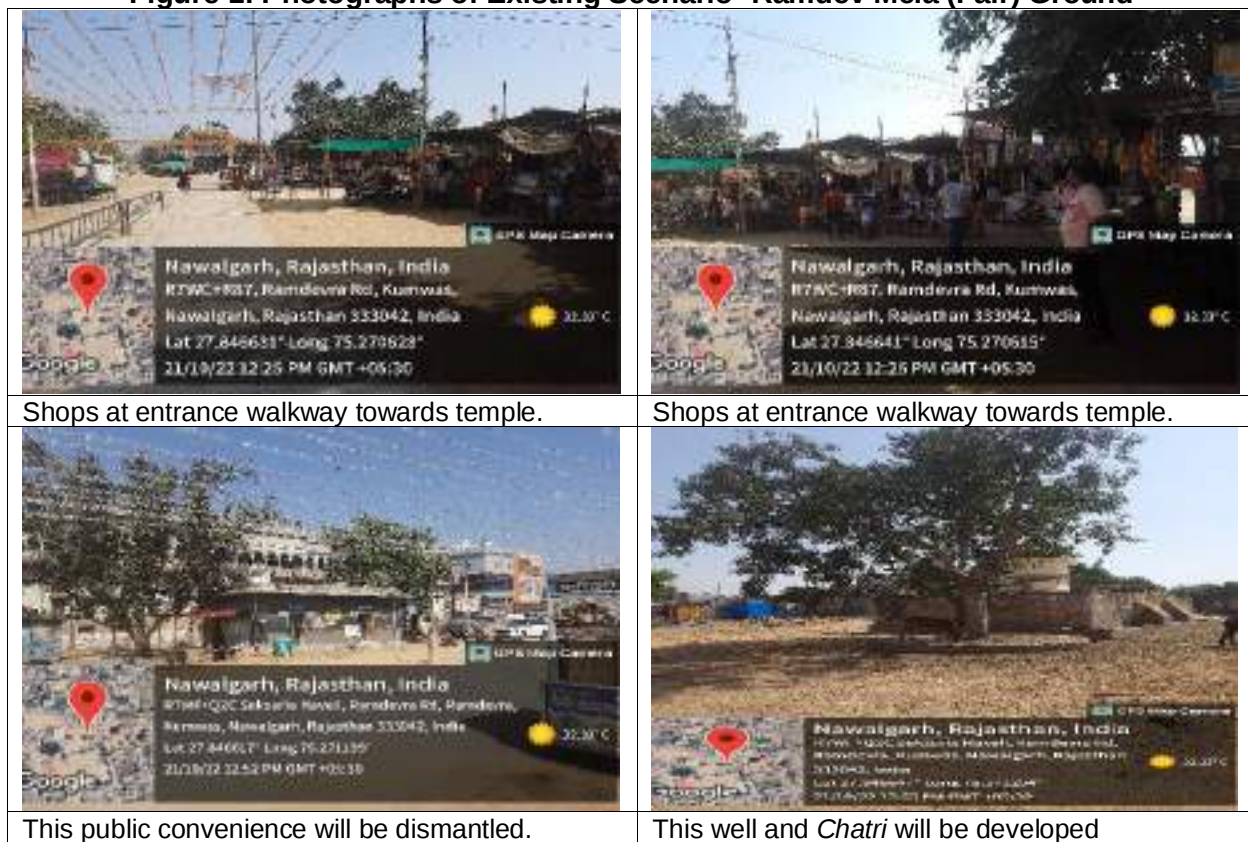
B. Existing Condition of Proposed Sites

7. Nawalgarh is also known for its havelis, gates and water bodies. The town once had an ample amount of tourist inflow from domestic as well as foreign tourists, but after pandemic and due to inadequate tourist infrastructure and town's inability to offer tourists with new and attractive tourists' destinations, the tourist inflow deteriorated drastically in previous years. Therefore, the town is in prompt need to improved infrastructure, rehabilitation and conservation of havelis (Mansion), gates as well as upgradation of tourist infrastructure to meet up the international standards. Hence it is required to develop Nawalgarh by conservation and development of its rich cultural heritage and upgradation of tourist infrastructure to rebuilt the town as major tourist attraction. Following are existing condition of proposed sites which need to be developed:

8. **Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground:** The Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground area is located about 700m south of the city center, and it is traversed by the main road that leads from Nawalgarh towards the south. The total area of the Mela (Fair) Ground is approximately 2.6 hectares, and the sports ground occupies about 2.1 hectares. When combined the total area of the entire space reaches 4.7 hectares, making it a large public space that serves as a prominent venue for major events and festivals in the city. It has great potential for development as a tourist destination, as it is connected to the Heritage Walk, which is densely populated with heritage sites, through the city center within about 1 km. Moreover, it is slightly away from the crowded narrow streets of the city center, and there is ample open space nearby that can be used for parking, making it easily accessible by car and suitable for accommodating many people simultaneously. Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground is the major areas of local as well as tourists' interaction in the town and hence are in need of proper infrastructure in order to cater the needs of tourists as well as local folks. It will

be developed as integrated urban Haat (Market) area with heritage landscape design elements. Still, they are not interconnected, partially damaged, and not designed to suit for daily and seasonal uses. Moreover, essential public facilities such as public toilets are lacking in other urgent needs, and existing public facilities are very outdated and lacked the capacity to meet the demands of the people. Mela (Fair) Ground is also a commercial space where many merchants gather, with nearly about hundred small shops and vendors operating in mobile stalls. The main items sold are groceries such as fruits, vegetables, and snacks. The makeshift shops are concentrated along the main roads that divide Mela (Fair) Ground into the eastern and western sides. On the southern side of Mela (Fair) Ground, there is a bus stop, and along the roadside from the bus stop to the interior of Mela (Fair) Ground, there are small shops and street vendors densely clustered. The central area of Mela (Fair) Ground has great potential to develop into a major commercial street in the city. Mela (Fair) Ground has many religious sites, some of which are currently used as temples, while others are old temples that have lost their functions but still have their buildings intact. This indicates that Mela (Fair) Ground has long been used as a central space for people's religious lives.

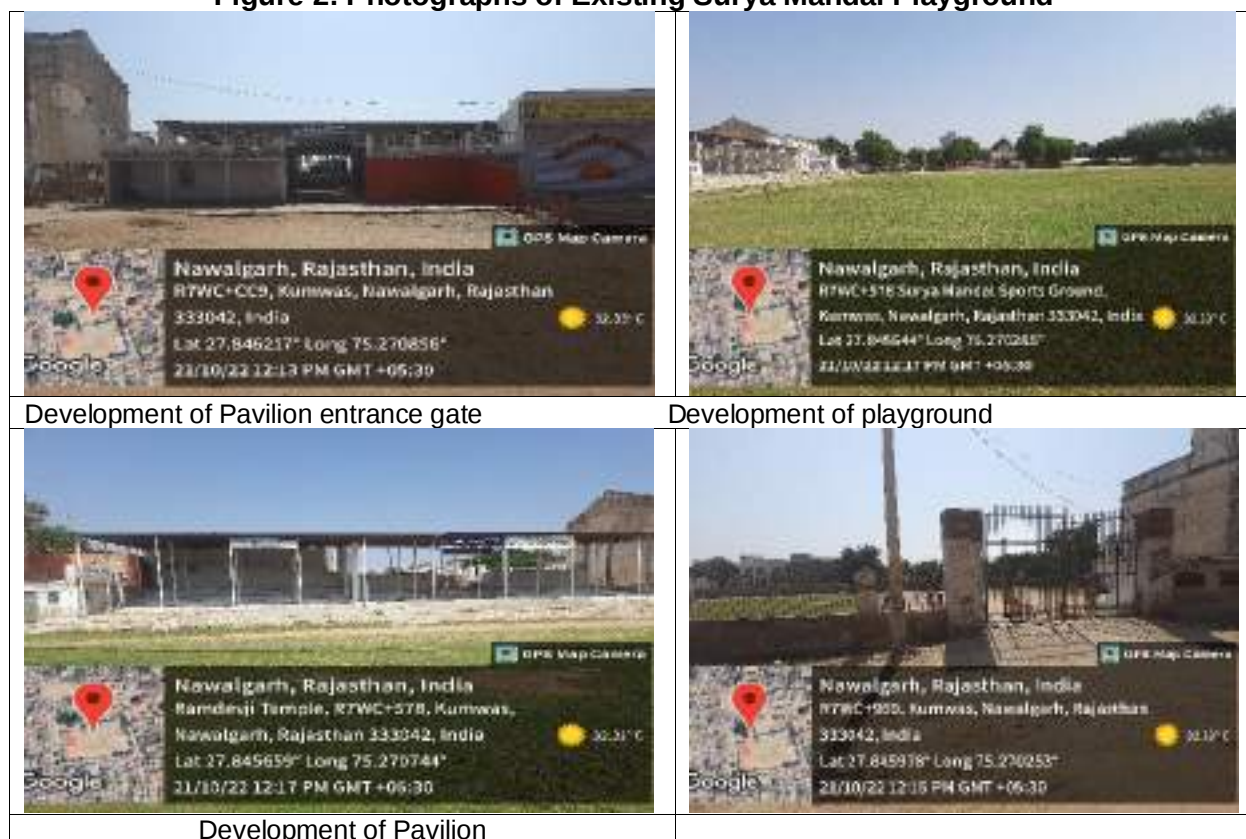

9. **Surya Mandal Playground:** Surya Mandal playground is the only one major play field hosting important regional sports event. The total area of the sports ground is approximately 2.1 hectares. Furthermore, along the boundary with the sports ground, there is a pavilion consisting of stands and warehouses for watching matches, and an auditorium used as a badminton court

and indoor hall, both of which are very outdated, and their functions are deteriorating. In particular, the auditorium has a garden facing Mela (Fair) Ground, but the entrance is blocked, and it is surrounded by fences, which reduces accessibility for people and hinders the wide utilization of Mela (Fair) Ground's space. As for the pavilion, there is a small outdoor stage incorporated into the building facing Mela (Fair) Ground, but its scale is small compared to the public events held at Mela (Fair) Ground, and the other uses of the building, such as warehouses, are not aesthetically pleasing. The road that forms the western boundary of the sports ground is one of the main transportation routes in Nawalgarh, with heavy traffic, and it divides Mela (Fair) Ground into eastern and western sections. Although some road networks are marked on the map within the western area of Mela (Fair) Ground, these roads are not paved, and the existence of roads is not clearly visible to actual visitors. As a result, in the western section, motorcycles and auto-rickshaws are moving without distinction between pedestrian and vehicular spaces.

10. **Present scenario of city gates:** Nawalgarh is famous for its old heritage structures including city gates. Presently they are depleted and deteriorated condition. Plaster and paint are in depleted conditions, some of the areas are dismantled, algae patches have been developed over the gates, seepage, dampness, water marks have been developed, column of area and gates inner wall are damages as well.

11. **Present scenario of heritage walks:** Naya Bazar (New Market) Chowk (Square) is a located at the end of Eastern Heritage Walk. Near the Naya Bazar (New Market) Chowk (Square), as there are various cultural facilities such as havelis and museum along with the old great banyan tree, it can be used as a major tourist destination. Since it is an area where not only cultural facilities but also street vendors and shops are mixed, this square needs to be arranged in an orderly design with roads, pathway, and rest areas. Through the square design proposed in this report, Naya Bazar (New Market) Chowk (Square) and Old Bus Stand (Baori Gate) Chowk (Square) will be recognized as a cultural and commercial base for pedestrians in Heritage Walk.

C. Subproject Components

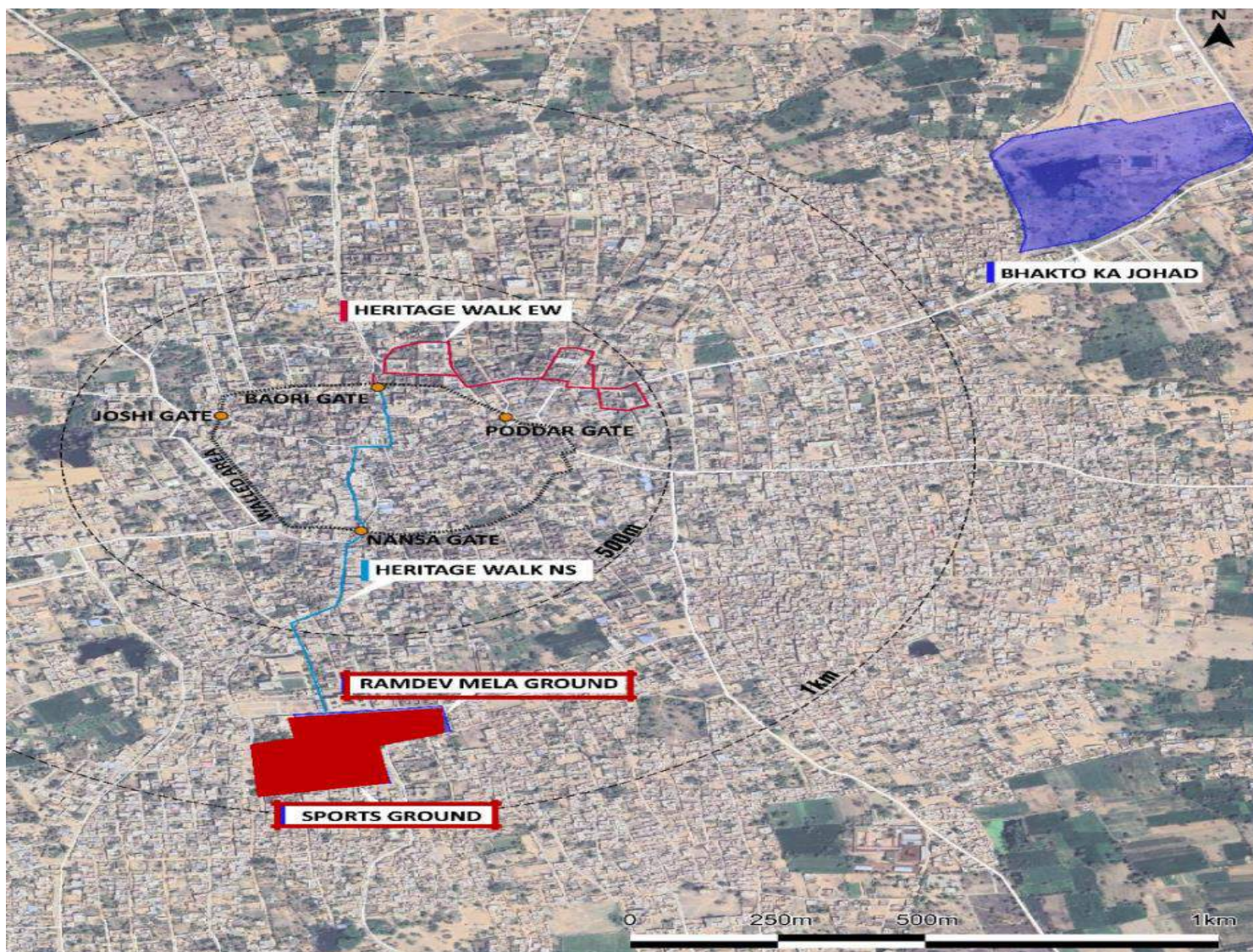
12. As a part of the city development and beautification scheme, on the basis of stakeholder consultations and field studies, the following are the proposed works (i) Development of Ramdev Mela (Fair) ground including development of Flexible Mela (Fair) Ground, development of entrance walkway to temple, development of landscape plaza along the walkway, development of shopping kiosk and food zone, development of street furniture, development of plantation and green buffer zone, development of sitting zone for Ram Leela Ground, development of tourist and visitors amenities, development of alternative entrance and peripheral parking); (ii) Development of Surya Mandal Playground (development of running track and football ground, volleyball court, basketball court, entrance gateway, spectators stands, veranda shops towards main road, amenities for players, parking, repair and restoration of existing admin office, badminton hall complex, hostel block); (iii) Conservation, restoration and façade lighting of 4 city gates; (iv) Development of heritage walks in the town and (v) Rehabilitation of 29 heritage assets. Scope of works for the subproject is presented in the **Table 1** below.

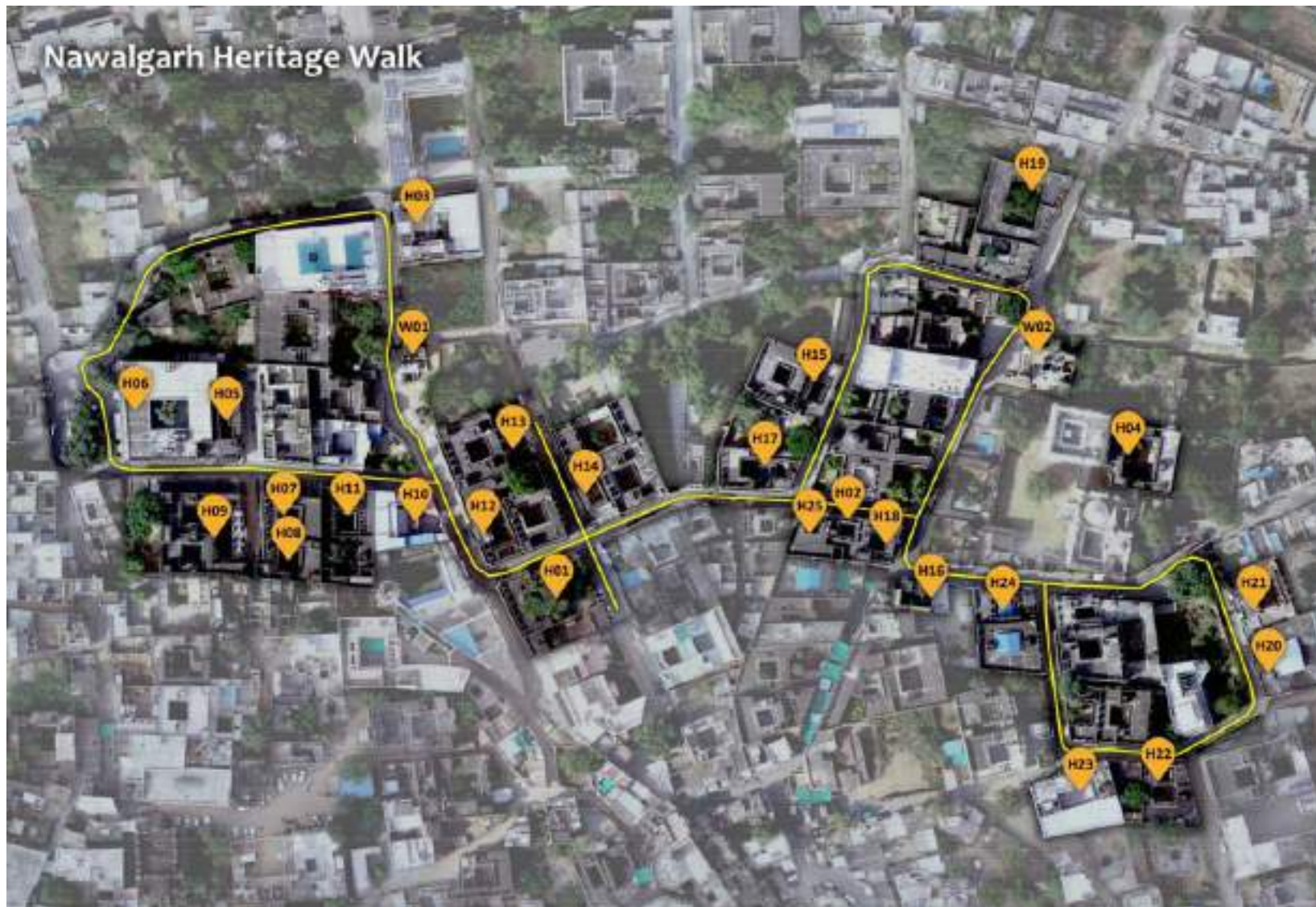

Figure 5: Proposed Components Marked on Google Map



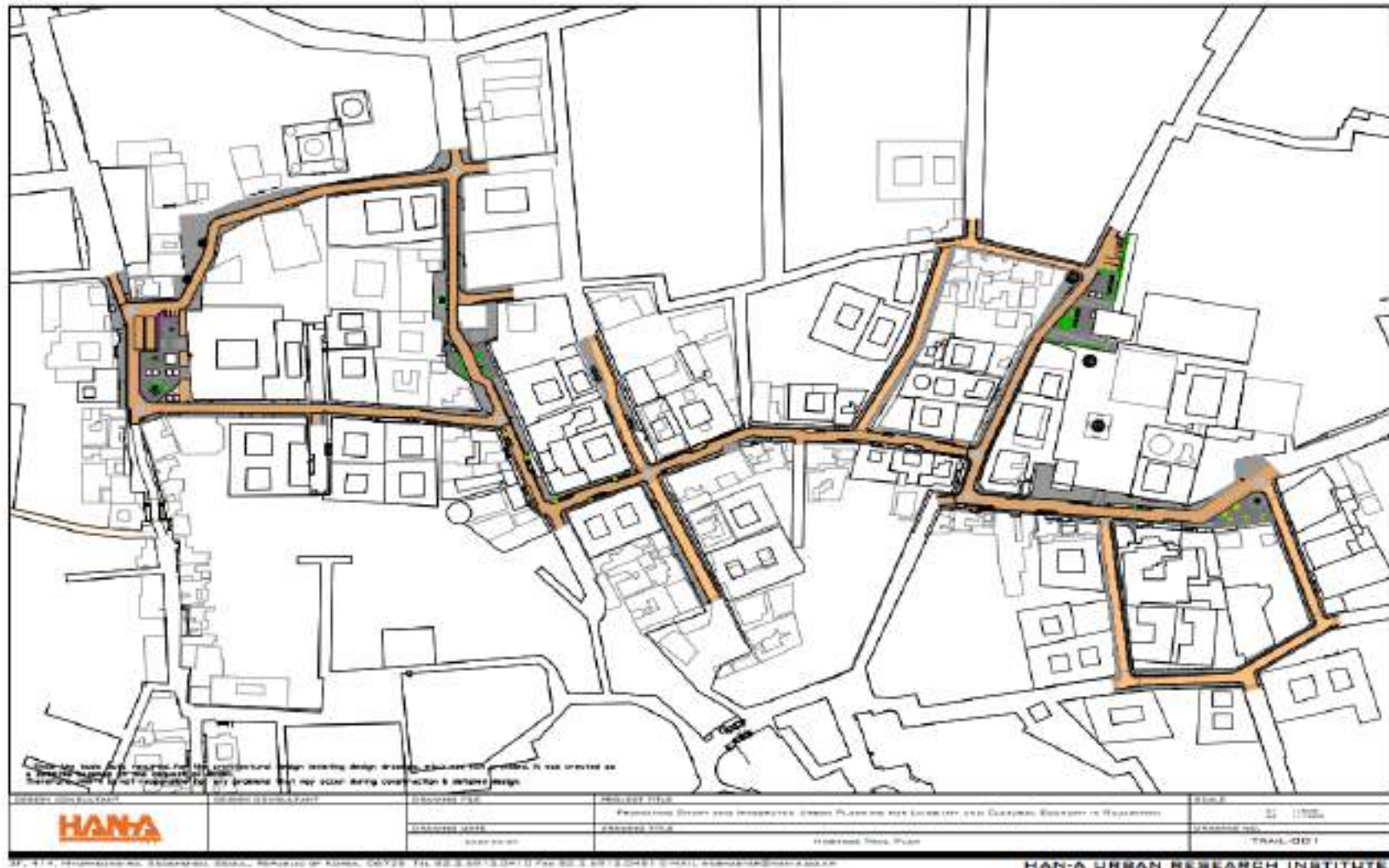

Figure 6 (i): Layout plan of Heritage Walk



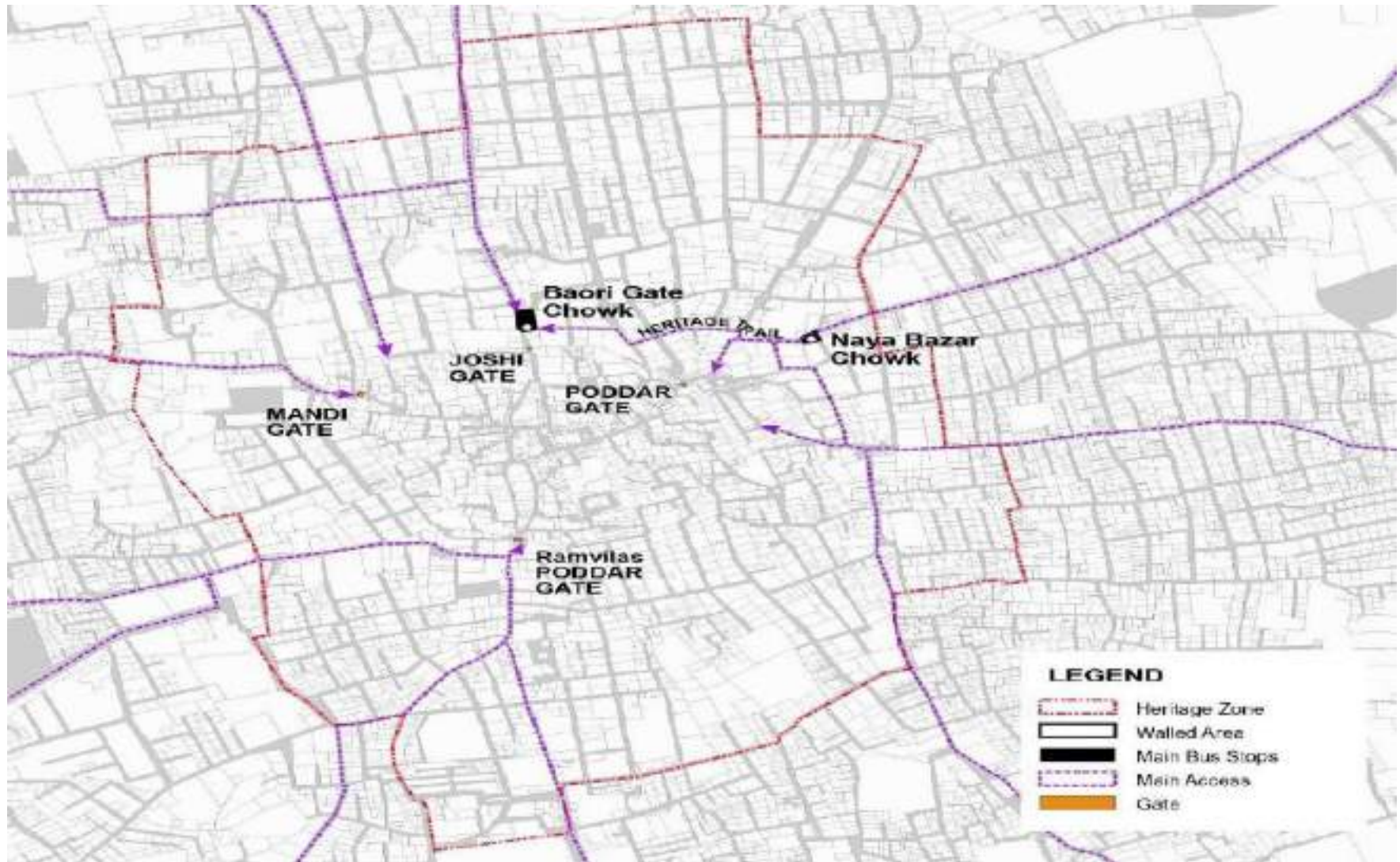

13. **Measures to Avoid and Minimize Involuntary Resettlement:** To avoid and minimize involuntary resettlement impacts, all the works are proposed within the existing campus and premises of properties under the government/department ownership. Land acquisition is not envisaged for the development, restoration, conservation and execution of proposed subproject components of Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground, Surya Mandal Playground, 4 City Gates, Heritage walk and Rehabilitation of 29 heritage assets. Redevelopment works at Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground, Surya Mandal Playground are to be carried out within its existing campuses. Conservation, restoration and façade lighting works of 4 City Gates are to be carried out only on its structure and on the other hand scope of development works of heritage walkway for city beautification are to be carried out within the right of way of government city road and private land acquisition is not envisaged and the city road is under the jurisdiction of Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh.

14. No objection has been obtained for the proposed Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground works from Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh. No objection for Surya Mandal Playground from Shri Pawan Kumar Sharma, Secretary in favor of Nagar Palika (Municipality) Nawalgarh is obtained for rejuvenation work. No Objection Certificate (NOC) has been received from the owner of Baori Gate (Joshi Gate) and no objection for Mandi Gate is received from Nagar Palika (Municipality) and on the other hand NOC of Poddar Gate and Nansa Gate are concerned, Nagar Palika (Municipality) Nawalgarh sent a letter to owner of both gates to issue NOC for rejuvenation of both gates for beautification project. No objection is obtained for Heritage walk. Nagar Palika (Municipality) Nawalgarh sent a letter to owner of Balbaksh Kuan and Chaukhani Kuan to issue NOC for rejuvenation of both well, both well lies in the route of Heritage walk. Land records of all the proposed sites has been obtained i.e. Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground, Surya Mandal Playground, all four city gates (Poddar Gate, Nansa Gate, Mandi Gate and Baori Gate), Heritage Walk etc. Land ownership details and photographs of the subproject components is provided in **Appendix 1** and the NOCs are provided through **Appendix 2 (a) to 2(g)**. All proposed sites are in Khasra number 1332, copy of land records is attached in **Appendix 3(a) & 3(b)**. During implementation of the subproject, efforts will be made that the telephone lines, electric poles and wires, water and sewer lines are not affected. Measures to be adopted to mitigate temporary loss of livelihood (relocation impact) on the shops include (i) provision of alternate space in the vicinity of their current location for continued business activity (ii) provision of shops in the newly constructed food zones/shopping kiosk upon completion and (iii) provision of compensation as per the resettlement framework. Measures to be taken up by contractor to avoid and mitigate temporary economic impacts on shops/vendors/business units include: (a) announcement of proposed civil works in advance (to enable shop owners to stock up and remain unaffected if goods vehicles are unable to reach them during construction); (b) minimizing construction period to the extent possible; (c) assistance to mobile vendors operating through carts and kiosks, if any, present during construction, to shift to nearby location for continued economic activity; (d) signage with project details and contact details for grievance redress and (e) As per discussion with design team, it was confirmed that scaffolds will be used (BoQ items) during restoration of gates to avoid/minimize the impacts of commercial activities (refer **Figure 14**). These measures (a to d) will be part of the contract and will be implemented with careful monitoring by the concerned PIU and CMSC.

15. The contractor will need to adopt the following mitigation measures (i) plan transportation routes so that heavy vehicles do not use narrow local roads, except in the immediate vicinity of delivery sites; (ii) schedule transport and hauling activities during non-peak hours; (iii) locate entry and exit points in areas where there is low potential for traffic congestion; (iv) keep the site free from all unnecessary obstructions; (v) prior to commencement of site activities and mobilization on ground, the Contractor will prepare and get approval from PIU, circulation plan during construction for safe passage of tourists during construction stage, including development of alternative access routes, traffic regulations, signage, etc. during construction; and (vi) provide free access/ temporary access to

households, businesses, shops and havelis (mansion) along the rights of ways (ROWS)/heritage walk during the construction phase.

D. Objectives of Resettlement Plan

16. This draft resettlement plan prepared for the proposed conservation and development of heritage sites of Nawalgarh town subproject under RSTDSP is based on 100% socio economic survey of potentially affected persons. It addresses the potential involuntary resettlement impacts of the proposed subproject components based on detailed project report and is consistent with the agreed resettlement framework for RSTDSP², prepared in accordance with national laws and as per ADB SPS (2009).³ This document will be updated prior to start and during construction based on changes in detailed design if any, construction methodology, signed memorandum of understanding (MOU) between Nagar Palika (Municipality) and the vendors of *Ramdev Mela* Ground, NOCs from private parties as required.

17. This draft resettlement plan is prepared in accordance with ADB SPS, 2009 requirements for involuntary resettlement category B projects and to meet the following objectives:

- (i) to describe the identified scope and extent of land acquisition and involuntary resettlement impacts because of identified project components, and address them through appropriate recommendations and mitigation measures in the resettlement plan;
- (ii) to present the socio-economic profile of the population in the project area, identify social impacts, including impacts on the poor and vulnerable, and the needs and priorities of different sections of the population, including women, poor and vulnerable;
- (iii) to describe the likely economic impacts and identified livelihood risks of the proposed project components;
- (iv) to describe the process undertaken during project design to engage stakeholders and the planned information disclosure measures and the process for carrying out consultation with affected people and facilitating their participation during project implementation;
- (v) to establish a framework for grievance redressal for affected persons that is appropriate to the local context, in consultation with stakeholders;
- (vi) to describe the applicable national and local legal framework for the project, and define the involuntary resettlement policy principles applicable to the project;
- (vii) to define entitlements of affected persons, and assistance and benefits available under the project;
- (viii) to present a budget for resettlement and define institutional arrangements, implementation responsibilities and implementation schedule for resettlement implementation; and
- (ix) to describe the monitoring mechanism that will be used to monitor resettlement plan implementation.

II. SCOPE OF LAND ACQUISITION AND INVOLUNTARY RESETTLEMENT

A. Land Acquisition and Involuntary Resettlement

18. Land acquisition is not envisaged for development, restoration, conservation of any of the proposed subproject components. Summary table on the land availability, ownership status, dimensions and photographs are attached as **Appendix 1**. Redevelopment works at Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground, Surya Mandal Playground are to be carried out within its existing campuses. Conservation, restoration and façade lighting works of four City Gates are to be carried out only on its structure and on the other hand scope of development works of heritage walk for city beautification are to be carried out within the right of way of government city road and private land acquisition is not envisaged and the city road is under the jurisdiction of Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh. No objection has been obtained for the proposed Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground works from Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh (**refer Appendix-2(a)**). No objection for Surya Mandal Playground from Shri Pawan Kumar Sharma, Secretary in favor of Nagar Palika (Municipality) Nawalgarh is obtained for rejuvenation work (**refer Appendix-2(b)**). No Objection Certificate (NOC) has been received from the owner of Baori Gate (Josh Gate) {**refer Appendix-2(c)&2(d)**} and no objection for Mandi Gate is received from Nagar Palika (Municipality); **refer Appendix-2(a)**. Nagar Palika (Municipality) Nawalgarh has sent a letter to owner of both gates i.e. Poddar Gate and Nansa Gate to issue NOC for rejuvenation of both gates for beautification project; **refer Appendix-2(e)**. No objection is obtained for Heritage walk, (**refer Appendix-2(a)**). Nagar Palika (Municipality) Nawalgarh has sent letters to owners of Balbaksh *Kuan* (well) and Chaukhani *Kuan* (well) to issue NOC for rejuvenation of both wells. Both well lies in the route of Heritage walk, **refer Appendix-2(f)**. Land records of all the proposed sites has been obtained i.e. Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground, Surya Mandal Playground, all four city gates (Poddar Gate, Nansa Gate, Mandi Gate and Baori Gate), Heritage Walk etc. All proposed sites are under Khasra number 1332, and the copy of land records is attached in **Appendix 3(a) and 3(b)**. The google maps of the subproject locations are provided through **Appendix 4 to 9**.

19. **Involuntary Resettlement Impact – Ramdev Fair Ground:** The involuntary resettlement impacts assessed through subproject census and 100% socio-economic survey based on detailed design and include loss of income and livelihoods. Implementation of the subproject will impact 149 households comprising of 885 family members (496 males and 389 females). Out of the 149 vendors, 113 vendors (664 family members consisting of 373 males and 291 females) will be temporarily affected during development of Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground.⁴ The vendors have make-shift temporary structure/pushcarts can be moved from their current place to the alternate site. These vendors occupy a part of the fair ground to conduct business of selling puja samgiri (worship material), fruit, vegetable, tea etc which are vulnerable to heat and dust. The local authorities requested for provision of indoor commercial spaces for these vendors to ensure better working conditions. As part of this subproject component, construction of 140 small shops (shopping kiosk and food zone)⁵ within the premises of Ramdev Mela Ground is proposed. Cost for construction of shops is already mentioned in the bill of quantity (BoQ). The aforesaid 113 vendors will be accommodated / provided shops out of the 140 shops proposed to be constructed. This arrangement will enable the 113 vendors to elevate their status from non-titled vendors to vendors with recognizable rights of the shops. During the development and construction activity in and around Ramdev Fair Ground, the 113 vendors (having movable make-shift /temporary structures and mobile pushcarts – no loss of structure envisaged) will be temporarily provided an alternate space (100 meters from current location) to continue their business activity (**refer to Figure 11 and 12**). The proximity of the alternate space to their current location will ensure that their present

clientele can continue to access their businesses. Since the 113 vendors will be provided with (i) alternate space to continue business during the proposed development activities of the Ramdev Fair Ground and (ii) permanent shops with secure tenure upon completion of civil works at the same place as their current location; only potential temporary livelihood impacts are assessed. Civil works at this particular section will commence only after payment of compensation and relocation of vendors to the alternate location site. Discussion with design team was also held and same was suggested. The decision to allot shops (free of cost) to the 113 vendors is taken in discussion and consultation and site visits with the officials of Nagar Palika (Municipality) Nawalgarh and project implementation unit (PIU). The joint site inspection report appended as **Appendix 10**. Based on such discussion and site inspection, it was confirmed by both the agencies (Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh and PIU, RSTDSP) that the 113 vendors would be accorded preference in the allotment of shops in the proposed shopping kiosk /food zone (refer **Appendix 11**). Transitional Allowance (two times – i. for moving to the alternate location and ii. for moving into the proposed shopping kiosk /food zone) will be provided to all the 113 vendors of Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground. Project will facilitate for shifting of all the vendors to new shops. Temporary livelihood loss for establishment business in new shops (30 days) and shifting assistance has been included in the budget of this resettlement plan. It is confirmed that no permanent negative impacts are envisaged on vendors and all have to be provided new shops constructed under this project. Monthly rent shall be decided mutually through MoU according to the terms of municipality, to be agreed with the allottee (Sample MoU attached as **Appendix 12**). Disabled and elderly affected shop owners should be located on the ground floor for their convenience with access.

20. **Restoration of Four Gates:** The subproject will impact total 149 vendors out of which 15 are at four City Gates. During restoration and replacement of damaged parts of city gates (Baori Gate, Nansa Gate, Poddar Gate and Mandi Gate⁶) temporary livelihood impacts are envisaged on 15 vendors/shops comprising of 88 family members (46 males and 42 females). Out them the 15 vendors/shopkeepers, 10 having permanent shops comprising of 57 family members (30 males and 27 females) will not be required to shift during construction. From the remaining 05 temporary shopkeepers, 03 have pushcarts, comprising of 14 family members (06 males and 08 females) and 02 are using footpath/ROW of road comprising of 17 family members (10 males and 07 females). All the shops including vendors are adjacent to the gates that are proposed for repair and façade works. Category of shops impacted and their location wise details including gates and Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground are presented below (refer Table 2 to Table 4).

21. **Redevelopment of Heritage Walk.** For the proposed development of heritage walkways temporary livelihood impacts are envisaged on 07 vendors (households comprising of 55 family members consisting of 30 males and 25 females). The vendors sell fruits and snacks items on mobile platforms like pushcarts, on the footpath and mobile van. 1 vendor (a cobbler) (household comprising 8 family members 04 males and 04 females) is running his

business on the footpath by spreading related goods on a rubber sheet. All business owners are operating their business along the pathway/ROW that is proposed for development. During development of heritage walkways, these vendors will be temporarily shifted to nearby place. As space is available in the vicinity within 100 meters of their current operation, towards the Naya Bazar area, all the 7 vendors will temporarily relocate in that space. The photographs and google earth map of the alternate location will be provided in the updated resettlement plan prior to start of construction. After construction is over, all the 7 vendors will return back to their current place of operation. Shifting assistance will be provided to all the 07 temporary/movable vendors. As alternate location is very close to the existing location where they are presently running their shops, no income loss or loss of clientele is envisaged. All the vendors operate either from pushcart/mobile vans or from a space on the ground where they sit, occupying the road shoulder. None have any form of structure and hence no structure loss is envisaged. Provision of temporary income loss for 30 days and shifting assistance is considered for these 7 vendors in accordance with the entitlement matrix.

22. Redevelopment of Chowk (Square) on the Heritage Walk. During development of Naya Bazar (New Market) Bus Stand Chowk (Square) temporary livelihood impacts are envisaged on 02 vendors (comprising 12 family members 06 males and 06 females), who have been selling snacks like ice cream and nuts on pushcarts. Similarly, during development of Old Bus Stand Chowk (Square) near Baori Gate temporary livelihood impacts are also envisaged on 12 vendors (households comprising 66 family members 41 males and 25 Females), among them, 09 vendors comprising 51 family members (29 males and 22 females) were selling snacks, ice cream, fruits, tea etc on movable pushcart and remaining 03 vendors comprising 15 family members (12 males and 03 females) sell tea, juice and betel leaf in movable cabins. During development of both Chowks (Squares) these vendors will be temporarily shifted to nearby places/ to the other side of the two bus-stands where there is no construction activity. As multiple spaces are available near the proposed site, the exact location will be decided in consultation with the vendors and the project proponent. The resettlement plan will be updated prior to start of construction and the alternate location will be depicted (photographs and google maps) in the updated draft for ADB approval. All the vendors 14 vendors (2 in Naya Bazar Bus Stand and 12 in Old Bus Stand Chowk) will be allowed back to their current business operation area upon completion of construction activity. Shifting assistance and temporary livelihood loss will be provided to all the 14 vendors in accordance with the entitlement matrix. No permanent livelihood impacts are envisaged. Provision for temporary income loss for 30 days is considered in discussion with the technical team.

23. Rehabilitation of 29 Heritage Assets. Under this component, façade rehabilitation of selected properties, fixing the old structures and repainting the façade with traditional technique and natural paint is proposed. Minimizing the damage and uplifting the aesthetics of the structures will be undertaken. During development of Balbaksh Ka Kuan (Well), Chaukhani Kuan (well) and *Havelis* (mansions), livelihood impacts/ any other resettlement impacts are not expected. Only external works like lighting is proposed for restoration of *Havelis*. Ownership details of these structures is attached in **Appendix 13**. Request letter to issue NOC of Balbaksh Ka Kuan (Well), Chaukhani Kuan (Well) is attached in **Appendix 2(f)**. All NOCs will be procured prior to start of work and appended in the updated resettlement plan for ADB approval.

25. Impact on Common Property Resources (CPRs): One common property resource (CPR) i.e. *Shivalaya* (literally, Shiva's abode or temple, in this case, a small sized unauthorized structure of worship, not registered with *Devasthan* Department⁷) found and reported during transect walk at Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground.⁸ It has been confirmed by design team, PIU, and Nagar Palika (Municipality) during discussion that there will be no dismantling of any of the sacred structures or any other structure under productive use within the Mela (Fair) ground. The scope of work was discussed with the priest, who provided consent to cooperate in the proposed redevelopment and beautification works at Mela (Fair) ground. Photographs of consultation are attached in **Figure 9**.

26. As per discussion with design team, it was confirmed that scaffolds will be used (BoQ items) during restoration of gates to avoid/minimize the impacts of commercial activities (Ref **Figure 14**). However, to mitigate any potential impacts (due to noise and dust during execution of work) on shops (temporary loss of income) during subproject implementation, adequate budget is proposed. In discussion with technical team 30 days' compensation for temporary livelihood losses is considered in the resettlement budget. The potential impacts and issues will be discussed with project contractor during implementation, design team, PIU and impact on livelihood of permanent shops will be avoided by executing work in the nighttime. During construction/rehabilitation of city gates, access will be provided to these shopkeepers and construction methodology/EHS Plan/Site specific EMP will be adopted by contractor. As per (Night Work Management Plan) of Site specific EMP will be implemented for permanent shops running their livelihood adjoining to city gates. A 100% socio-economic survey of permanent and temporary shops has been carried out and livelihood loss of all affected shops has been calculated in resettlement budget. Efforts will be made to avoid/mitigate these permanent shops impacts by doing night works or by providing access as per Site Specific EMP. Based on data from the socio-economic survey, out of 149 vendors, 17 vendors (11%) belong to vulnerable category; 12 (8%) are from scheduled caste (SC) category comprising 72 family members (39 males and 33 females), 2 (1.33%) are Female Headed Households (FHH) comprising 13 family members (04 males and 09 females) and 3 (2%) belong to Below Poverty Line (BPL) category comprising 18 family members (11 males and 07 females). None of the potential affected persons are from scheduled tribe (ST) category.

B. Indigenous People

28. Based on field visits and consultations conducted so far, no impacts to indigenous peoples are anticipated under the project. None of the potentially affected persons (permanent and/or temporary loss of livelihood) identified during the transect walk and community consultations conducted, belong to indigenous people groups or scheduled tribe communities. Socio-economic survey of the affected persons also confirmed that no person from scheduled tribe community will be affected. As per ADB SPS, indigenous people safeguards are triggered if a project directly or indirectly affects the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems, or culture of indigenous peoples or affects the territories or natural or cultural resources that indigenous peoples own, use, occupy, or claim as their ancestral domain; no such impacts are anticipated in project town Nawalgarh.¹² Nawalgarh has 0.17% of total population classified as scheduled tribe¹³; however, this population is scattered (does not stay in cohesive tribal communities/tribal groups), is well assimilated in urban society and does not retain the defining characteristics of scheduled tribes. Nawalgarh does not fall in a scheduled area, and no particularly vulnerable tribal groups are reported in project areas.¹⁴ Hence, in consideration of all of the above, no Indigenous Peoples Plan is required for this project.

29. **Gender Considerations and Impacts.** Among the affected persons / vendors/shopkeepers facing temporary involuntary resettlement impacts, there are 2 female headed households. The 2 female vendors (female heads of household) are likely to suffer temporary income loss during implementation of the subproject. At the time of socio-economic

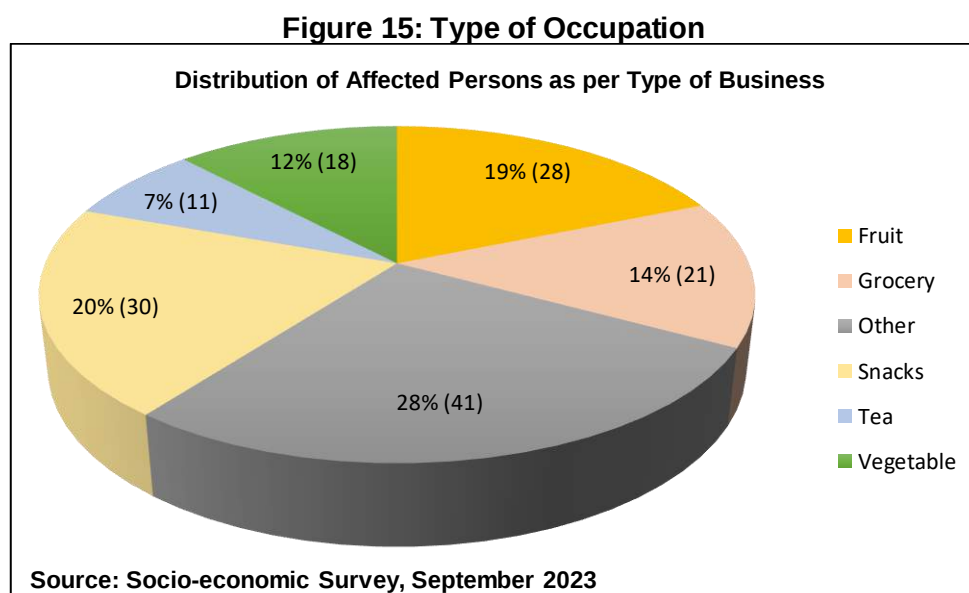

survey, it was found out that the two women were running businesses by selling vegetables/groceries on temporary pushcarts/temporary stalls for their livelihood. The project is categorized as effective gender mainstreaming (EGM) and a gender equality and social inclusion (GESI) Action Plan has been prepared for the project. Components of the GESI plan will be implemented throughout the project towns. In case any impacts are found on women, additional compensation and assistances as per agreed resettlement framework and entitlement matrix will be disbursed to them (as vulnerable persons), over and above other applicable entitlements.

III. SOCIO-ECONOMIC INFORMATION AND PROFILE

30. The following sections present the socio-economic profile of the households likely to be affected by the proposed works. Based on inventory loss survey, 149 households comprising of 885 family members (496 males and 389 females) will potentially be affected under the subproject. The survey provides information socio-economic conditions of affected households. A wide range of data including, social category, type of losses, type of occupation, sources of income, choice of resettlement etc. have been collected. The average dependency ratio of affected person households is 6 and average daily income of affected households are ₹306/day. About 11.41 % of affected persons belong to vulnerable category.¹⁵

31. **Occupation Profile:** As per socio-economic survey, 30 households (20%) of affected persons are engaged in snack selling, 28 households (19%) are selling fruits items, 21 households (14%) are having a grocery shops, while 41 households (28%) are selling others items like cosmetic, clothes, jewelry and shoes etc. and 11 households (07%) are engaged in selling tea. While 18 households (12%) are engaged in selling vegetable. Most of them are carrying their business on movable structures while few others are using roads/ROW for selling their goods. All the potential affected persons are male except 02 female headed household.

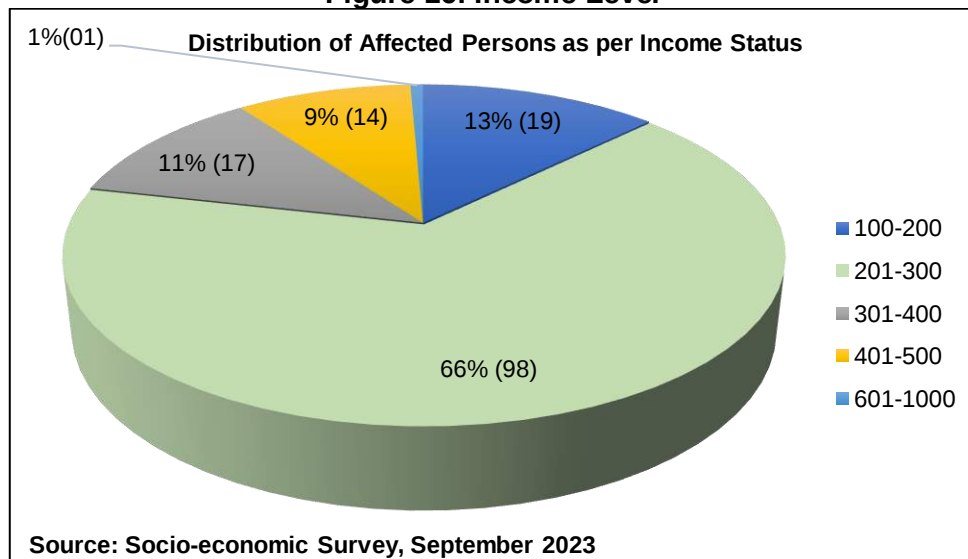


32. **Income Profile:** On behalf of socio-economic survey, 19 households (13%) of affected persons likely to be impacted having an income varies from ₹100-200 per day. 98 households

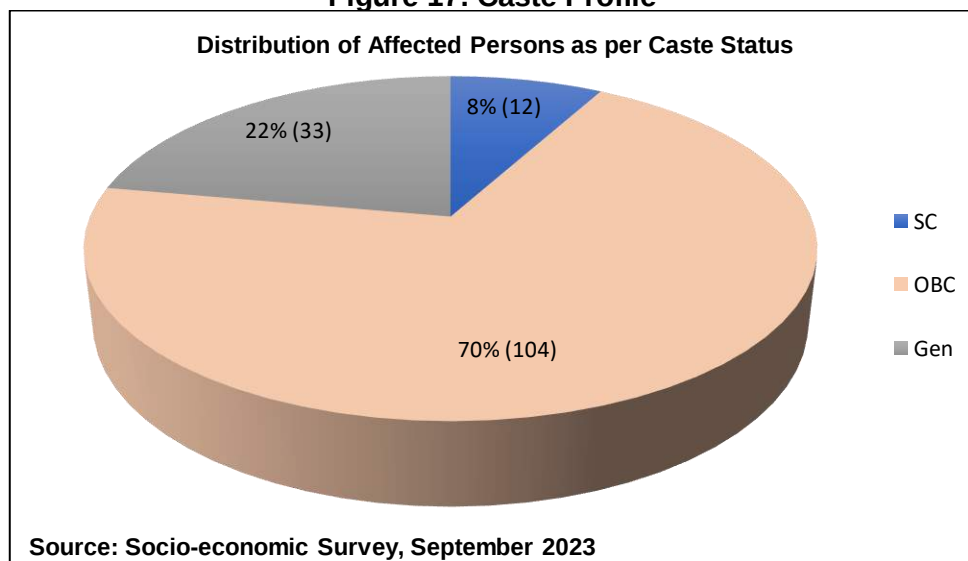
(66%) of affected persons likely to be affected having an income ranging from ₹201-300 per day on the other hand 17 households (11%) of affected persons likely to be affected having an income between ₹301-400 per day. 14 households (9%) of the affected persons likely to be affected having an income of ₹401-500 per day while 01 household (1%) among affected persons likely to be affected having an income of ₹601-1000 per day. The total income of affected persons is ₹45650 and average income is ₹306 per day. All the potential affected persons are male except 02 female headed household.

33. **Caste Profile:** On the basis of chart provided below, affected persons belonging to General Caste comprise of 33 numbers (22%), Other Backward Castes (OBC) comprises of 104 numbers (70%), and Scheduled Caste comprises of 12 numbers (8%). It can be noted that OBC constitutes the majority in the overall social profile. The households likely to be affected as per social category have been presented in **Appendix 10**.

IV. CONSULTATION PARTICIPATION AND DISCLOSURE

A. Public Consultation

34. This draft resettlement plan is prepared in consultation with stakeholders. The key stakeholders consulted during resettlement plan preparation include (i) affected persons, including vulnerable households; (ii) project beneficiaries (iii) elected representatives, community leaders, and (iv) local government and relevant government agency representatives; and (v) project staff, PMU, PIU, and consultants. Meetings and individual interviews were held involving stakeholders particularly, potentially temporarily affected persons; and transect walks, survey and interviews were conducted to determine the potential impacts of the subproject. During meeting the stakeholders were briefed about the technical details of project and project implementation cycle; project benefits as well as adverse impacts envisaged during construction; environmental and social safeguards, gender inclusion, community participation aspects built into the project etc. The issues like, extent of the project and development components, benefits of project, traffic disruptions and impacts on livelihood were discussed in details with the stakeholders. The potentially affected persons were informed that compensation will be provided as per the losses and appropriate measures will be undertaken for minimize the impacts. It was also informed that, if despite mitigation measures, there were any impacts on structures and livelihood; those would be compensated in accordance with the agreed entitlement matrix. A total of 192 persons (178 male, 14 female) were consulted. Additional consultations will be conducted during further project preparation and will be continued throughout the project implementation. This will include focus group discussions (FGDs), awareness program, stakeholder consultation and city level committee meeting. Town level stakeholder consultation meetings is to be also held and subproject scope and its advantages along with relevance of safeguard issues in subproject implementation is to be discussed. Summary, photographs and attendance sheet of consultations with various stakeholder at different times is appended in **Appendix-16 to 19** and photographs and media coverage news of city level committee (CLC) meeting is attached in **Appendix 20 and 21**. District level stakeholder consultation is to be held and will be appended accordingly.

B. Information Disclosure

35. During inventory of loss survey, leaflet containing details of proposed works, their impacts and mitigation measures including GRM were distributed to potential affected persons. (The leaflet in Hindi and photographs are attached in **Appendix 22 and 23**). This resettlement plan will be duly uploaded in ADB and local government's websites. During subproject implementation, construction schedules will be informed to all residents (including affected persons) prior to the commencement of works, through signboards. The signboards will be in local language and will include at minimum: (i) section to be affected, (ii) start and end dates, (iii) information on traffic rerouting if any, and (iv) contact information for sharing opinions/questions/grievances.

36. During resettlement plan updating, PMU/PIU and CMSC will ensure to issue public notices regarding the cut-off date. For all impacts, the start date of census and socio-economic surveys based on final design and DMS will be considered as the cut-off date. Cut-off-date for

involuntary resettlement impacts will be communicated by CMSC (field support staff) under the supervision of PIU to affected persons (**refer Appendix 24 and 25**).¹⁶ Resettlement plan/information, education and communication (IEC) materials will be translated in Hindi and will be prepared and disclosed/discussed with affected persons (APs) and beneficiaries, including those who are unable to read, in Hindi and/or their local dialect. Consultation and disclosure of entitlements and compensation to affected persons will be further reiterated during DMS and survey at detailed design stage.

C. Continued Consultation and Participation

37. Consultation and disclosure are a continuous process since from the beginning of the project. Information dissemination will be carried out throughout project circle for the affected persons including the vulnerable affected persons and other residents. The PMU will extend and expand the consultation and disclosure process during the construction period especially targeting the women/women groups. The PMU, with the support of community awareness and public participation consultant (CAPPC), will design and conduct a public awareness campaign which shall target all citizens especially women to record their views about the project, during project implementation phase. A consultation and participation consultant (CAPPC) will be mobilized for preparation and implementation of community awareness activities. CAPPC will prepare a plan to include more women/women groups in the consultation process. Field staffs from the contractor and the CAPPC will engage with women in and around the project location to record their views and opinions about the subproject. Such critical views and concerns (if any) will be shared with the project team and will be addressed. The project management consultants will conduct training of contractors (engineers as well as safeguards personnel). Community groups will be consulted and made aware of the civil works and project activities, anticipated impacts and mitigation measures, grievance redress process and contact details of PIU/ PMU personnel prior to execution of work/construction.

V. GRIEVANCE REDRESS MECHANISM

38. A project-specific, three-tier grievance redress mechanism (GRM) covers both environment and social issues. The GRM has been established to receive, evaluate, and facilitate the resolution of affected persons' concerns, complaints, and grievances about the social and environmental performance at project level. The GRM will aim to provide a time-bound and transparent mechanism to voice and resolve social and environmental concerns related to the project. Assessment of the GRM designed and implemented for Rajasthan Urban Sector Development Program (RUSDP) shows that the system was effective in timely resolution of grievances in a transparent manner.¹⁷ The multichannel, project-specific, three-tier GRM is functional at RUSDP, hence the design of GRM for RSTDSP takes into account the proposed institutional structure for RSTDSP and the positive features and learnings from the previous GRM.¹⁸

39. **Common GRM.** A common GRM is in place for social, environmental, or any other grievances related to the project. The implementation of the resettlement plan will follow the

GRM described below. The GRM will provide an accessible and trusted platform for receiving and facilitating resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the project.

40. Public awareness campaigns within the entire municipal area will ensure that awareness on grievance redress procedures is generated. The nodal officer- safeguards and gender supported by ASO at zonal level, will oversee the conduct of subproject coverage area-based awareness campaigns by the town-level safeguards and safety officers, through the CAPPC. The awareness campaigns will ensure that poor and vulnerable households are made aware of grievance redress procedures and entitlements. Contractors will provide pamphlets to communities prior to start of works and billboards during construction. The pamphlets and billboards will include relevant environmental and social safeguards, GRM information, and contact details of key personnel from PIU and contractors.

41. Affected persons will have the flexibility of conveying grievances/suggestions by dropping grievance redress/suggestion forms (See **Appendix 26 and 27** for template of grievance registration form and the translated version in Hindi) in complaint/suggestion boxes that will be installed by project PIUs or by e-mail, by post, or by writing in a complaints register in ULB offices/complaints register at contractor's work site or by sending a WhatsApp message to the PIU¹⁹ or by dialing the phone number of town level PIU/CAPPC or by dialing a toll-free number.²⁰ Any aggrieved person can also avail the facilities of online grievance monitoring system 'Rajasthan Sampark' portal to register their grievances which is a parallel mechanism of grievance registration, in addition to the project GRM.²¹ Careful documentation of the name of the complainant, date of receipt of the complaint, address/contact details of the person, location of the problem area, and how the problem was resolved will be undertaken and feedback provided to the complainant on action/decision taken. The SSO of town/city level PIU will have the overall responsibility for timely grievance redressal on environmental and social safeguards issues and for registration of grievances, related disclosure, with the assistance of project consultants. In case of grievances that are immediate and urgent in the perception of the complainant, the contractor, and officials of PIU with assistance from CMSC and CAPPC on-site will provide the most easily accessible or first level of contact for quick resolution of grievances. Contact numbers and names of the concerned PIU safeguard and safety officer, contractors, CAPPC and CMSC personal will be posted at all construction sites at visible locations.

- (i) **1st level grievance.** The contractors, PIU executive engineer /assistant engineer designated as SSO (social and environment), CMSC (safeguard staff) and CAPPC can immediately resolve issues on-site, in consultation with each other and will be required to do so within 7 days of receipt of a complaint/grievance. If required, city level monitoring committee (CLMC)²² will be involved in resolution of grievances at the 1st level;²³
- (ii) **2nd level grievance.** All grievances that cannot be redressed within 7 days at field/PIU level will be brought to the notice of Zonal PIU headed by Additional Chief Engineer (ACE). The ACE at zonal PIU will resolve the grievance within

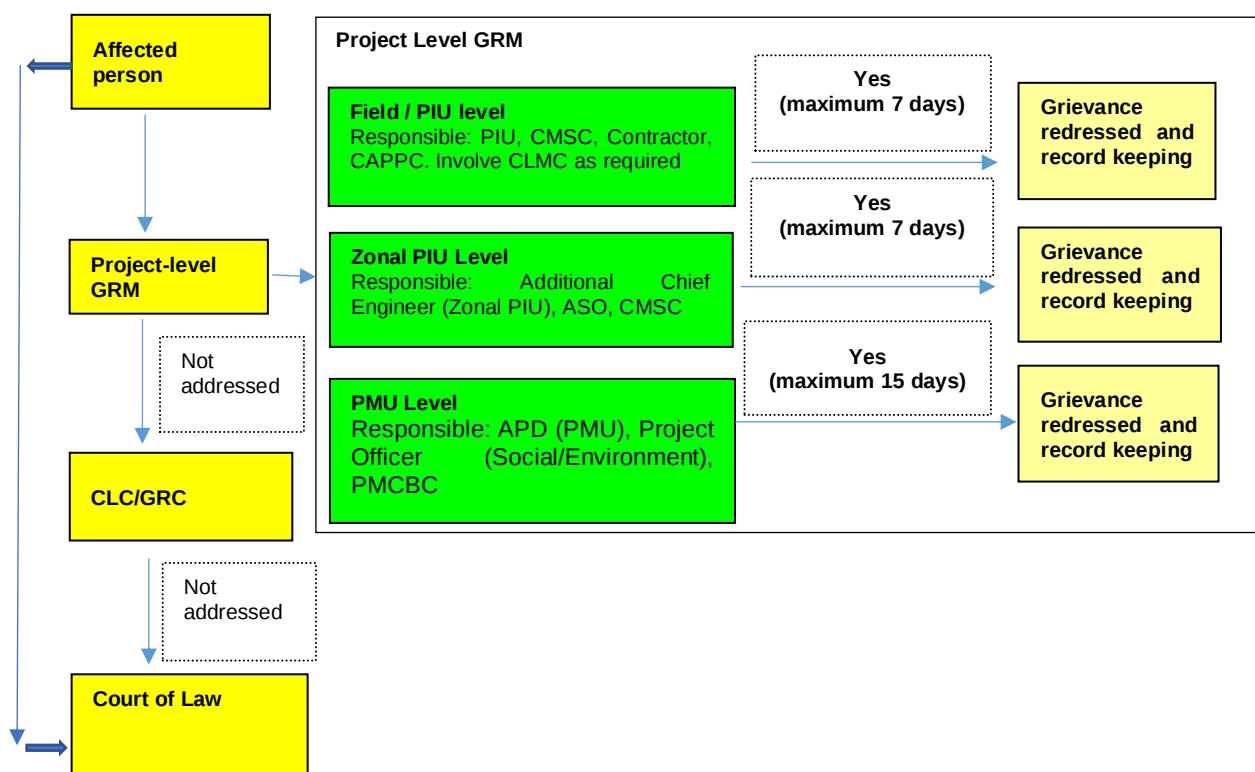
- 7 days of receipt of complaint/grievance in discussion with the assistant safeguard officer (ASO), field level PIU, CMSC, CAPPCC and the contractor;²⁴
- (iii) **3rd level grievance.** All the grievances that are not addressed by Zonal PIU within 7 days of receipt will be brought to the notice of the PMU. Depending on the nature of grievance, the Project Officer (Social/Environment) at PMU will resolve the grievance within 15 days of receipt of grievance with necessary coordination of Zonal PIU and CMSC and guidance/instruction of additional project director (APD-PMU);
 - (iv) Grievances not redressed through this process within/at the project level within stipulated time period will be referred to the CLC/grievance redress committee (GRC), which has been set up.²⁵ In its role as a GRC, the CLC will meet whenever there is an urgent, pending grievance. Other grievances can be discussed during its regular meetings. Zonal PIU will inform the CLC regarding any grievances required to be resolved urgently. The GRC will resolve the grievance within 15 days of receiving the complaint. In case of any indigenous peoples impacts in subprojects, the CLC/GRC must have representation of the affected indigenous people community, the chief of the tribe or a member of the tribal council as traditional arbitrator (to ensure that traditional grievance redress systems are integrated) and an NGO working with indigenous people groups.

42. The multi-tier GRM for the project is outlined below (**Figure 18**), each tier having time-bound schedules and with responsible persons identified to address grievances and seek appropriate persons' advice at each stage, as required. The GRC will continue to function throughout the project duration.

43. The project GRM, notwithstanding, an aggrieved person shall have access to the country's legal system at any stage and accessing the country's legal system can run parallel to accessing the GRM and is not dependent on the negative outcome of the GRM. In case of grievance related to land acquisition, resettlement and rehabilitation, the affected persons will have to approach a legal body/court specially proposed under the RFCTLARRA, 2013.²⁶

44. People who are, or may in the future be, adversely affected by the project may submit complaints to ADB's Accountability Mechanism. The Accountability Mechanism provides an independent forum and process whereby people adversely affected by ADB-assisted projects can voice, and seek a resolution of their problems, as well as report alleged violations of ADB's operational policies and procedures. Before submitting a complaint to the Accountability Mechanism, affected people should make an effort in good faith to solve their problems by working with the concerned ADB operations department. Only after doing that, and if they are still dissatisfied, should they approach the Accountability Mechanism.²⁷

45. **Record-keeping.** The PIU, Nawalgarh town will keep records of grievances received, including contact details of complainant, date the complaint was received, nature of grievance, agreed corrective actions and the date these were affected and final outcome. The number of grievances recorded and resolved, and the outcomes will be displayed/disclosed in the PMU

office, PIU offices, and on the web, as well as reported in monitoring reports submitted to ADB on a semi-annual basis.

46. **Periodic review and documentation of lessons learned.** The PMU project officers (Social and Environment) will periodically review the functioning of the GRM in each town and record information on the effectiveness of the mechanism, especially on the project's ability to prevent and address grievances.

47. **Costs.** All costs involved in resolving the complaints (meetings, consultations, communication and reporting/information dissemination) will be borne by the concerned PIU at town level while costs related to escalated grievances will be met by the PMU. Cost estimates for grievance redress are included in resettlement cost estimates.

VI. POLICY AND LEGAL FRAMEWORK

48. The policy framework and entitlements for the RSTDSP are based on:

- (i) The Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act (RFCTLARRA), 2013;²⁸
- (ii) ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement (SPS), 2009. The salient features of Government and ADB policies are summarized below. The involuntary resettlement principles and procedures to be followed for social safeguards under RSTDSP are detailed out in the resettlement framework document and project implementation shall be carried out in its full compliance; and
- (iii) The Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Act, 2014 and the Rajasthan Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Rules, 2016.

49. The key involuntary resettlement principles of the ADB Safeguards Policy Statement (2009) are:

- (i) Screen the project early on to identify past, present, and future involuntary resettlement impacts and risks. Determine the scope of resettlement planning through a survey and/or census of displaced persons, including a gender analysis, specifically related to resettlement impacts and risks;
- (ii) Carry out meaningful consultations with affected persons, host communities, and concerned nongovernment organizations. Inform all displaced persons of their entitlements and resettlement options. Ensure their participation in planning, implementation, and monitoring and evaluation of resettlement programs. Pay particular attention to the needs of vulnerable groups, especially those below the poverty line, the landless, the elderly, women and children, and Indigenous Peoples, and those without legal title to land, and ensure their participation in consultations. Establish a grievance redress mechanism to receive and facilitate resolution of the affected persons' concerns. Support the social and cultural institutions of displaced persons and their host population. Where involuntary resettlement impacts and risks are highly complex and sensitive, compensation and resettlement decisions should be preceded by a social preparation phase;
- (iii) Improve, or at least restore, the livelihoods of all displaced persons through (i) land-based resettlement strategies when affected livelihoods are land based where possible or cash compensation at replacement value for land when the

- loss of land does not undermine livelihoods, (ii) prompt replacement of assets with access to assets of equal or higher value, (iii) prompt compensation at full replacement cost for assets that cannot be restored, and (iv) additional revenues and services through benefit sharing schemes where possible;
- (iv) Provide physically and economically displaced persons with needed assistance, including the following: (i) if there is relocation, secured tenure to relocation land, better housing at resettlement sites with comparable access to employment and production opportunities, integration of resettled persons economically and socially into their host communities, and extension of project benefits to host communities; (ii) transitional support and development assistance, such as land development, credit facilities, training, or employment opportunities; and (iii) civic infrastructure and community services, as required;
 - (v) Improve the standards of living of the displaced poor and other vulnerable groups, including women, to at least national minimum standards. In rural areas provide them with legal and affordable access to land and resources, and in urban areas provide them with appropriate income sources and legal and affordable access to adequate housing;
 - (vi) Develop procedures in a transparent, consistent, and equitable manner if land acquisition is through negotiated settlement to ensure that those people who enter into negotiated settlements will maintain the same or better income and livelihood status;
 - (vii) Ensure that displaced persons without titles to land or any recognizable legal rights to land are eligible for resettlement assistance and compensation for loss of non-land assets;
 - (viii) Prepare a resettlement plan elaborating on displaced persons' entitlements, the income and livelihood restoration strategy, institutional arrangements, monitoring and reporting framework, budget, and time-bound implementation schedule;
 - (ix) Disclose a draft resettlement plan, including documentation of the consultation process in a timely manner, before project appraisal, in an accessible place and a form and language(s) understandable to affected persons and other stakeholders. Disclose the final resettlement plan and its updates to affected persons and other stakeholders;
 - (x) Conceive and execute involuntary resettlement as part of a development project or program. Include the full costs of resettlement in the presentation of project's costs and benefits. For a project with significant involuntary resettlement impacts, consider implementing the involuntary resettlement component of the project as a stand-alone operation;
 - (xi) Pay compensation and provide other resettlement entitlements before physical or economic displacement. Implement the resettlement plan under close supervision throughout project implementation;
 - (xii) Monitor and assess resettlement outcomes, their impacts on the standards of living of displaced persons, and whether the objectives of the resettlement plan have been achieved by taking into account the baseline conditions and the results of resettlement monitoring. Disclose monitoring reports.

50. The Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Act, 2014. The Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Act, 2014 came into force on 5 March 2014 and seeks to protect the livelihoods of street vendors while regulating street vending. The Act recognizes street vendors of different types including mobile (moving) vendors, stationary (vending from a particular place), natural markets (spaces where buyers and sellers traditionally congregate), vendors with temporary built-up structures, hawkers, peddlers and squatters. It provides for regulation of street vendors, defines the rights and duties of street vendors and requires definition of designated vending zones, issue of certificates of vending and identity cards to street vendors, and

proposes vending fees and maintenance charges. Under the Act, each state government is required to define the public purpose for which a street vendor may be evicted and the manner of relocation, manner of giving notice, and provides for a dispute resolution mechanism. As per the Act, planning and regulation of street vending is to be undertaken at town level by the Town Vending Committee. The Act also provides for social audit of the activities of the Town Vending Committee.

51. The Rajasthan Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Rules, 2016. In exercise of power conferred to state under Section 36 of the central act, the state government has framed rules for implementation of the Act in the state. The State rules outlines the following:

- (i) The State Government shall constitute a Town Vending Committee (TVC) for every local authority [Section 3 (1)]. In the election for representative of street vendors if due representation of the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Classes, minorities and persons with disabilities is not found, the State Government shall nominate one additional member from amongst such categories in the Town Vending Committee [Section 3 (6)].
- (ii) Every street vendor, identified under the survey carried out under sub-section (1) of Section 3 of the Act. who has completed the age of eighteen years may be issued a certificate of vending by the Town Vending Committee. [Section 8 (1)]
- (iii) The Town Vending Committee at its office shall maintain all necessary records as are required to be maintained by it under the Act and these rules and also a soft copy duly updated into its computer system. All records relating to allotment of space to street vendors shall be preserved at least for five years and beyond that till the period of currency of their licenses and for such further period in cases where any litigation with regard to any place is pending. All records including maps, road plans showing existing site of street vending shall be a permanent record of Town Vending Committee. (Section 7)
- (iv) The Town Vending Committee shall take final decision about vending zones along with their holding capacity as worked out by the local authority. TVC shall be responsible for issuing, withholding, suspending and cancelling of the vending certificate. [Section 14 (1)]
- (v) The State Government shall constitute a Grievance Redressal and Dispute Resolution Committee at each divisional headquarters. (Section 15)
- (vi) Any street vendor having grievance for any matter under the Act, except those matters as are specified in Section 11 of the Act, may file an application in writing. (Section 16).

52. Comparison of Government and ADB Policy. The RFCTLARR Act, 2013 represents a significant milestone in the development of a systematic approach to address land acquisition, rehabilitation and resettlement collectively in India. RFCTLARRA, 2013 has also laid down similar principles like ADB's SPS, 2009 and focus on avoiding or minimizing involuntary impacts, if not restoring and enhancing the quality of life of affected families irrespective of title to the land. Table 8 presents a comparison of the Government of India policies (RFCTLARRA, 2013, the Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Act, 2014 and the Rajasthan Street Vendors (Protection of Livelihood and Regulation of Street Vending) Rules, 2016), the state policies vis-à-vis ADB's SPS, 2009, and identifies gaps and gap filling measures.

53. Core involuntary resettlement principles for the RSTDSP-additional financing to be followed for each subproject are:

- (i) land acquisition, and other involuntary resettlement impacts will be avoided or minimized exploring all viable alternative subproject designs;
- (ii) adverse impacts to indigenous peoples' dignity, human rights, livelihood systems and culture as well as to the natural and cultural resources of indigenous peoples will be avoided;
- (iii) where unavoidable, time-bound resettlement plans (RPs)/ resettlement and indigenous people plan (RIPPs)/ Indigenous Peoples Plan (IPPs) will be prepared and affected persons will be assisted in improving or at least regaining their pre-program standard of living;
- (iv) full information and close consultations with affected persons including consultation with affected persons on compensation, disclosure of resettlement information to affected persons, and participation of affected persons in planning and implementing subprojects will be ensured;
- (v) vulnerable groups will be provided special assistance; beneficial impacts to indigenous peoples will be ensured through special measures identified in the IPP/RIPP, if any.
- (vi) payment of compensation to affected persons including non-titleholders (e.g., informal dwellers/squatters, and encroachers) for acquired assets at replacement rates;
- (vii) payment of compensation and resettlement assistance prior to the contractor taking physical acquisition of the land and prior to the commencement of any construction activities;
- (viii) provision of income restoration and rehabilitation; and
- (ix) establishment of appropriate grievance redress mechanisms.

VII. ENTITLEMENTS, ASSISTANCE AND BENEFITS

A. Types of Losses and Affected Person (AP) Category

54. The anticipated types of losses due to the proposed subproject components under RSTDSP comprise (i) temporary relocation; (ii) temporary loss of livelihood (iii) impacts to vulnerable persons (amongst the affected persons).

55. According to ADB SPS, 2009 in the context of involuntary resettlement vis-à-vis economic impacts, the affected persons (APs) are those who are physically and economically displaced (loss of productive land, structures, assets, access to assets, income sources, or means of livelihood). The absence of formal and legal title to the land does not bar the affected person from receipt of compensation and resettlement assistance from the project. Vulnerable affected persons are eligible for additional compensation and assistance and are to be accorded priority in employment in project related construction activities.

B. Entitlements

56. As per agreed resettlement framework for the project,²⁹ all the affected persons will be eligible for compensation for permanent/temporary loss of livelihood/income. Unavoidable

livelihood disruption due to construction activities will be compensated.³⁰ For this subproject, the maximum estimated period of disruption during execution of work is 30 days. All affected persons will also be compensated for the time lags (7% annual inflation in survey income is provisioned) between payment of compensation and the time of survey. 'Shifting assistance' (lump sum ₹1500) will be paid to all affected persons irrespective of their business type. All affected persons who are identified as vulnerable will be eligible for special assistance amounting to ₹9,000 as onetime assistance under temporary impacts for livelihood restoration. All the non-titled vendors facing temporary livelihood impacts will be extended vulnerability benefits as per the entitlement matrix.

57. The titleholders are handled through RFCTLARRA, 2013 and the preliminary notification by the competent authority would be the cut-off date as per the law. The start date of the census and socio-economic surveys based on final design and DMS is the cut-off date for all non-titleholder affected persons. All affected persons who are identified in the subproject areas on the cut-off date³¹ will be entitled to compensation for their loss, and rehabilitation measures (as outlined in the entitlement matrix below) sufficient to assist them to improve or at least maintain their pre-project living standards, income-earning capacity and production levels. The detailed measurement survey has been conducted and cut-off-date is announced as 12 September 2023. However, after mobilization of contractor another round of survey will be conducted and in case of new impacts a new cut-off date will be announced. Affected persons will be provided 30 days' advance notice to ensure no or minimal disruption in livelihood. If required, they will also be assisted to shift to alternate locations. For example, they will be assisted to shift to the other side of the road or to a nearby location within the immediate vicinity, where there is no construction. Ensuring there is no income or access loss during subproject construction is the responsibility of PIU, Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh and project contractor.

58. If construction activities result into unavoidable livelihood disruption, compensation for loss of income or a transitional allowance for the period of disruption, whichever is greater, will be provided. The vendors experiencing impacts on livelihood will be provided with subsistence with subsistence allowance for a year, one-time financial assistance and transitional allowance. Further all the vendors will be provided with additional vulnerability assistance. However, since all the vendors will be provided with alternate space to continue with their current business/trade, assistance for skill training will not be required. All the vendors are operating either through make-shift structures or pushcarts, which can be moved from their current place to the alternate site hence, the impacts are limited to livelihood loss and no loss of structure is envisaged.

59. If construction activities result into unavoidable temporary livelihood disruption, compensation for loss of income or a transitional allowance for the period of disruption, whichever is greater, will be provided. Vulnerable affected persons will be given priority in project construction employment and will be provided with additional special assistance for income restoration support. Compensation and assistance to affected persons must be made prior to possession of land/assets and prior to the award of civil works contracts. Since most affected households have moveable stalls, ID cards should be distributed 30 days before compensation. In summary, temporarily affected persons will be provided with:

- 30 days' advance notice regarding construction activities, including duration and type of disruption.
- Contractor's actions to ensure there is no income/access loss consistent with the initial environmental examination. This includes, increased workforces to finish work in areas with impacts on access, timing of works to reduce disruption during business hours, phased construction schedule. and working one segment at a time and one side of the road at a time
- Assistance to mobile vendors/hawkers to temporarily shift for continued economic activity. For example, assistance to shift to the other side of the road or within immediate vicinity where there is no construction.³⁵
- For construction activities involving unavoidable livelihood disruption, compensation for lost income or a transitional allowance for the period of disruption whichever is greater. For budget purpose maximum 30 days have been proposed for period of disruption under this subproject.

VIII. RESETTLEMENT BUDGET AND FINANCING PLAN

60. The resettlement budget for conservation and development of heritage sites of Nawalgarh town subproject components includes resettlement assistance, as outlined in the entitlement matrix and contingency provision amounting to 20% of the total cost and is presented in **Table 12**. Community awareness and public participation consultants (CAPPC) will be involved in facilitating the disbursement process and will facilitate opening bank of accounts for the affected persons who do not have bank accounts. The total resettlement cost for the subproject is **₹ 2,578,584 (INR 2.57 million)**. The Superintending Engineer / Executive Engineer of PIU will be issuing sanction order for compensation payment to affected persons which shall be released through electronic clearance service/National Electronic Fund Transfer (ECS/NEFT) transaction from bank, through concerned Treasury of the state administration.

61. The details of resettlement plan budget estimate are the following:

- (i) **Total number of affected persons** – A total of 149 affected persons (885 family members) have been identified as a project affected persons during income loss survey. Temporary livelihood losses are estimated for 30 days for each affected person under this subproject. Out of the 149 persons: (a) 113 will face temporary impacts operating in Ramdev Mela Ground and they will be (i) relocated in the adjacent open space during the period of work and (ii) will be shifted to shops to be constructed by the project. The construction of shops included in as BOQ items as part of subproject cost and not budgeted here. Civil works at this particular section (near Ramdev Mela Ground) will commence only after payment of compensation and relocation of 113 vendors (having movable structures) to the alternate location site; and (b) 36 affected businesses will face temporary income loss.
- (ii) **Total number of vulnerable affected persons** – As per socio-economic survey 17 affected persons (103 family members) are from vulnerable category. Vulnerability assistance for RSTDSP has been budgeted amounting to ₹ 9,000 per household, in accordance with the entitlement matrix (temporary loss of livelihood).
- (iii) **Compensation against daily income loss** – as per income loss survey, the total daily income for all surveyed affected persons is ₹ 45650 and accordingly, the average of this total figure i.e., ₹306 has been considered as average daily income of affected persons (it is higher than the daily minimum wage rate of Rajasthan, which is ₹ 259). This average has been applied for all 149 affected persons in budget estimate. During subproject implementation, payment will be disbursed to permanent shop owners as per their disclosed taxable income as submitted with Income Tax Departments.
- (iv) **Shifting assistance.** Shifting assistance shall be provided to movable structures. Out of 149 potential affected persons, estimated to face temporary impacts, 139 have movable structures while 10 possess permanent shops at city gates. Out of the 139 movable vendors; for 113 vendors situated at Ramdev Mela Ground shifting assistance has been calculated twice ($₹ 1500 \times 2 = ₹ 3,000$) i. once for relocation to the adjacent open space during the period of work and ii. The second time (additional assistance) during shifting to the shops that are proposed to be constructed by the project. *The second shifting allowance will only be paid during their proposed shift to the new shop.* A uniform amount of ₹ 1500 is proposed as shifting assistance for the 26 movable shops (situated near city gates, heritage walk-way and the redevelopment of the 2 city squares, refer **Table 2 and 4**).
- (iv) **Contingency amount** – Contingency amount of 20% is also included in budget provisions for any unforeseen impacts during detailed design or execution of civil work.

62. The disbursement of the compensation amounts will be made by the office of district collector through the district treasury through issue of bank cheque or direct deposit into the affected persons' account. The PIU/project ULB will deposit appropriate amount with the district treasury for the same which will be sourced from resettlement and rehabilitation budget, kept aside as the state share, for this project. The PIU (with CMSC support staff at PIU level) and CAPPC will be involved in facilitating the disbursement process and will facilitate opening bank accounts for the affected persons who do not have bank accounts. PIU will prepare compensation details including names of affected persons, bank account details, compensation amount, and submit to the district treasury prior to start of civil works. PIU with support from CMSC field staff and CAPPC will monitor compensation payment to affected persons. CMSC will support the PIU to monitor, document and maintain evidence of payments in PIU's records. Zonal PIU will monitor all town level PIUs for compliances in this respect.

IX. INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS AND IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

A. Institutional Arrangements

63. The implementation arrangements include Local Self Government Department (LSGD), Government of Rajasthan will be the executing agency of the project. The department will be responsible for overall strategic guidance and for ensuring compliance with ADB's loan covenants. RUDSICO is the implementing agency for the RSTDSP, responsible for technical supervision and project implementation. The RUDSICO Board under the Chairmanship of the Minister for Urban Development, and members comprising of the Chief Secretary, Secretaries of LSGD, Finance, Planning, PWD, PHED and the project director, RUIDP as member secretary. It shall have full powers to decide on matters related to RSTDSP. The Board will take needful policy decisions, provide administrative and financial approvals, expedite clearances of project matters, ensure inter-departmental coordination and provide guidance to the PMU. As per GO dated 21 Feb 2018, all powers and responsibilities of earlier state level empowered committee (SLEC, under RUIDP Phase III) have now been transferred to RUDSICO Board.

64. RUDSICO already established a state-level PMU, headed by dedicated project director, and housed in EAP division of RUDSICO. For the purpose of project implementation, two zonal PIUs, at Jaipur and Jodhpur, headed by ACE has been established. At field level, town-level PIUs will be established for project implementation on ground.

B. Safeguard Implementation Arrangement

65. **Project Management Unit.** RUDSICO already establish a state-level PMU, headed by dedicated project director, and housed in EAP division of RUDSICO. For the purpose of project implementation, 2 zonal PIUs, at Jaipur and Jodhpur, headed by ACE has been established. At PMU, there are 2 dedicated project officers: (i) project officer (Environment); and (ii) project officer (Social and Gender), who is responsible for compliance with the environmental, social safeguards and gender in project implementation. Project officer (social and gender) have an overall responsibility in implementation of the RSTDSP as per the social safeguards frameworks (resettlement framework and indigenous people planning framework [IPPF]) and gender equality and social inclusion (GESI) Action Plan agreed between ADB and the government, including appropriate monitoring and reporting responsibilities. Project Officer (Social and Gender) at the PMU is supported by the social safeguards specialist (SSS) and the gender specialist of PMCBC. Key safeguard and gender mainstreaming related tasks and responsibilities at the PMU level are as follows:

66. Social Safeguards and Gender

- (i) Ensure subprojects conform to the agreed subproject selection criteria for the project;
- (ii) Review and finalize subproject involuntary resettlement and indigenous people category;
- (iii) Oversee preparation of resettlement plans, RIPPs and DDRs; confirm existing resettlement plans and DDRs are updated based on detailed designs, change in scope of work, and that new subproject resettlement plans, RIPPs and DDRs are prepared in accordance with the resettlement framework and IPPF prepared for the project;
- (iv) Liaise with district administration for land acquisition, transfers; ensuring land availability;

- (v) Ensure that resettlement plans, RPPs and DDRs are included in the bidding documents and civil works contracts;
- (vi) Provide oversight on social safeguard management aspects of subprojects and facilitate and follow-up to ensure that any delays in land procurement are addressed;
- (vii) Ensure and monitor the provision in the contract to include the indigenous people to benefit from the facilities constructed under the project;
- (viii) Facilitate and ensure compliance with all government rules and regulations regarding no objection certificates, third party certificates for negotiated settlement or donation, land ownership, and transfer details for each site, as relevant;
- (ix) Supervise and guide the zonal PIUs and city level PIUs to properly carry out the social safeguard monitoring;
- (x) Review, monitor, and evaluate the effectiveness with which the resettlement plans, RPPs and provisions of DDRs are implemented, and recommend corrective actions to be taken as necessary;
- (xi) Consolidate monthly social safeguard and gender monitoring reports from PIUs and the CMSCs and submit semi-annual social safeguard monitoring reports to ADB;
- (xii) Ensure timely disclosure of final resettlement plans, RPPs and DDRs in locations and form accessible to the public and affected persons;
- (xiii) Address any grievances brought about through the grievance redress mechanism promptly;
- (xiv) Oversee the assessment of training needs of affected persons and vulnerable persons by PIUs and/or PMCBC, coordinate training activities and convergence with the livelihood programs of the government;
- (xv) Ensure effective implementation of GRM at all levels;
- (xvi) Coordinate database management for social safeguards implementation and monitoring;
- (xvii) Coordinate public awareness campaigns by the PIUs including resettlement provisions with the help of print and electronic media; and
- (xviii) Serve as Gender Focal Point at PMU, which would involve overseeing - with the support of PMCBC, the implementation, monitoring and reporting on the GESI action plan.

67. The PMU is being supported by three institutional consultants under the supervision and control of project director, PMU: (i) the PMCBC is supporting the PMU; (ii) 2 CMSC are supporting the two zonal PIUs and town-level PIUs; and (iii) community awareness and public participation (CAPP) Consultants, will support the zonal PIUs and town-level PIUs.

68. **Zonal Project implementation units.** There are 2 zonal level PIUs at Jaipur and Jodhpur. Under each zonal PIU, there are city/town level PIUs, for ease of day-to-day monitoring and management at local level. The Additional Chief Engineer at each Zonal PIU is serving as the Nodal Officer, Safeguards and Gender. Each Zonal PIU is staffed with an assistant safeguards officer (ASO Environmental and Social Safeguards) who are assisting PMU project officer (environment/social) in implementation of the environmental/social safeguards and GESI Action Plan in PIUs under its jurisdiction. Zonal PIUs undertaking internal monitoring and supervision and record observations throughout the project period to ensure that the safeguards and mitigation measures are provided as intended.

69. The zonal level ASO is overseeing safeguards implementation by the city/town level PIUs, coordinate public consultations, information disclosure, regulatory clearances and approvals, implementation of resettlement plans, RPPs, EMP implementation, and grievance redressal.

70. The Zonal PIUs will oversee and support social safeguards and gender equality and social inclusion action plan implementation by the PIUs at town/city level, through the following key tasks:

- (i) fill up involuntary resettlement and indigenous people impact checklist and classify the project;
- (ii) supervise CMSC to coordinate with PIUs and safeguards field staff for conduct census and socio-economic surveys, detailed measurement surveys, and verification surveys of affected persons, conduct consultations with affected persons, finalize the list of affected persons, prepare and/or update the resettlement plan, RIPP and DDR, with the assistance of CMSC and submit to PMU for review and approval and submission to ADB;
- (iii) supervise PIUs to inform affected persons about (a) the project cut-off date; (b) public notice for the schedule of land acquisition and/or occupation; (c) entitlement matrix; and (d) compensation packages against different categories of loss and a tentative schedule of land clearing and/or acquisition for the start of civil works activities;
- (iv) coordinate valuation of assets, such as land and trees of various species. Finalize compensation packages based on proper due diligence and assessment;
- (v) facilitate land acquisition and compensation processes in consultation with the district administration; coordinate, supervise, and monitor the disbursement of compensation;
- (vi) Support PIUs to obtain no objection certificates, land documents, and third-party certifications as required for the subproject, in coordination with PIUs;
- (vii) support PMU to include resettlement plans, RPPs and DDRs in bidding documents and civil works contracts;
- (viii) guide PIUs to oversee implementation of avoidance and mitigation measures in the resettlement plans, RPPs and DDRs by contractors, including compliance with all government rules and regulations; take necessary action for obtaining ROW;
- (ix) guide and monitor PIUs to oversee resettlement plans, RPPs and DDR, and gender equality and social inclusion action plan implementation and maintenance of data for monitoring by contractors;
- (x) ensure listing of town wise BPL households;
- (xi) assist in conducting needs assessment to list skills relevant to the sector;
- (xii) assist to identify participants for livelihood and skilling training for women and members of other vulnerable groups;
- (xiii) ensure that the project maintains sex disaggregated data on staff, consultants, construction workforce participation, labor and project related trainings;
- (xiv) ensure that gender focal points are nominated in town level PIUs;
- (xv) ensure and monitor the provision in the contract to include the indigenous people to benefit from the facilities constructed under the project;
- (xvi) to ensure that corrective actions are taken when necessary to ensure compliance with SPS and loan covenants;
- (xvii) submit monthly social monitoring reports to PIUs and PMU;
- (xviii) guide PIUs to conduct continuous public consultation and awareness;
- (xix) address any grievances brought about through the grievance redress mechanism promptly;

- (xx) organize an induction course for the training of contractors, preparing them on resettlement plans, RIPPs, DDR, and GESI action plan implementation, social safeguard, and gender monitoring requirements related to mitigation measures, grievance redress mechanism and on taking immediate action to remedy unexpected adverse impacts or ineffective mitigation measures found during implementation;
- (xxi) liaise with the district administration, and line departments for dovetailing government's schemes for income generation and development programs for affected people, as and when required; and
- (xxii) assist in the implementation, monitoring, and reporting progress of gender equality and social inclusion action plan.

71. Town/City Level Project Implementation Unit. The town-level PIUs will be responsible for the quality of works executed under the project and being guided by the zonal PIUs. The city/town PIUs will be responsible for implementation of the IEE/resettlement plan/ RIPP/GESI action plan. The town-level PIUs will be headed by a project manager (executive engineer or assistant engineer) and will be supported by CMSC field staff. Environment specialist of CMSC will be assisting PIU in implementation of environmental safeguard. Social and gender specialist of CMSC will be assisting PIU in implementation of social safeguard and GESI related tasks. At each PIU, the assistant project manager will have an additional responsibilities of safeguard tasks and designated as SSO. The SSO will be assisted by the social and gender specialist and environment Specialist of CMSC in reviewing updated/revised IEEs, conducting surveys for updating of resettlement plan/due diligence report, public consultation and disclosure, assessment of entitlement and computation of compensation other than those covered under the RFCTLARRA, 2013, etc. The SSO, with the support of CMSC Social safeguards and Gender Specialist and CMSC field support staff, assisting Zonal ASO and PMU project officer (social) in implementation of the following key tasks. They are responsible for coordination of field level activities related to safeguards conducted by the DBO contractor and CMSC. Key role and tasks of town/city level PIU will be:

- (i) Provide field data to fill up IR/IP impact checklist and classify the project;
- (ii) Conduct census and socio-economic surveys, detailed measurement surveys, and verification surveys of affected persons, conduct consultations with affected persons, prepare list of affected persons, provide all data required to prepare/update resettlement plans/DDR/RIPPs with the assistance of CMSC field support, and ensure updated information is submitted to zonal PIU for preparation/updating of documents with CMSC and DBO contractor's support;
- (iii) Inform affected persons about tentative schedule of land acquisition/occupation, entitlement matrix and compensation packages against different categories of loss, and cut-off date;
- (iv) Coordinate valuation of assets, such as land, trees of various species, etc. Based on proper due diligence and assessment, prepare compensation packages;
- (v) Coordinate, supervise and monitor disbursement of compensation;
- (vi) Obtain no objection certificates (NOCs), land documents, third party certifications as required for the subproject;
- (vii) Support Zonal PIUs to prepare/update resettlement plans/RIPPs /DDRs;
- (viii) Oversee day-to-day implementation of impact avoidance and mitigation measures in resettlement plans/DDR/RIPPs and EMP by contractors, including compliance with all government rules and regulations particularly health and safety, take necessary action for obtaining ROW;
- (ix) Oversee maintenance of data for monitoring, by consultants and contractors;

- (x) Implement corrective actions when necessary to ensure no adverse social impacts;
- (xi) Submit monthly social monitoring reports to zonal PIU;
- (xii) Conduct continuous public consultation and awareness;
- (xiii) Set up GRM at field/site/PIU level and ensure it is fully functional. Address any grievances brought about through the grievance redress mechanism in a timely manner;
- (xiv) Ensure that induction course for the training of contractors is conducted regularly. Prepare contractors (with consultants' support) on resettlement plans/DDR/RIPP/ GESI action plan implementation, social safeguard and gender monitoring requirements related to mitigation measures, health and safety and on taking immediate action to remedy unexpected adverse impacts or ineffective mitigation measures found during the course of implementation;
- (xv) Liaise with the District Administration and line departments for dovetailing Government's schemes for income generation and development programs for affected persons, as and when required;
- (xvi) Supervise the work of all consultants at town level (CMSC, CAPPC).
- (xvii) Undertake day-to-day implementation of final resettlement plans and GESI action plan;
- (xviii) Provide field level information required to prepare periodic safeguard monitoring reports in a format acceptable to ADB and quarterly GESI action plan updates in the format provided in PAM;
- (xix) Ensure relevant data on implementation of GESI action plan is collected and a gender-sensitive communication strategy and information, education and communication (IEC) materials are designed, illustrating key social and behavioral messages related to hygiene, sanitation, and health jointly with the communication specialist and in accordance with the GESI action plan; and
- (xx) Extend support in carrying out awareness campaigns in project towns.

72. **Contractor.** The contractor will appoint an environment, health and safety (EHS) engineer who is responsible on a day-to-day basis for (i) ensuring implementation of EMP, (ii) coordinating with the town-level PIUs and environment specialists of project consultant teams; (iii) community liaison,⁴⁰ consultations with interested/affected people, (iv) field-level grievance redress; and (iv) reporting.

73. After approval of resettlement plan (RP) and IEE, a copy of the EMP or approved SEMP will be kept on-site during the construction period at all times. Non-compliance with, or any deviation from, the conditions set out in the EMP or SEMP constitutes a failure in compliance and will require corrective actions. The EARF and the IEEs specify responsibilities in EMP implementation during design, construction and operation and maintenance (O&M) phases.

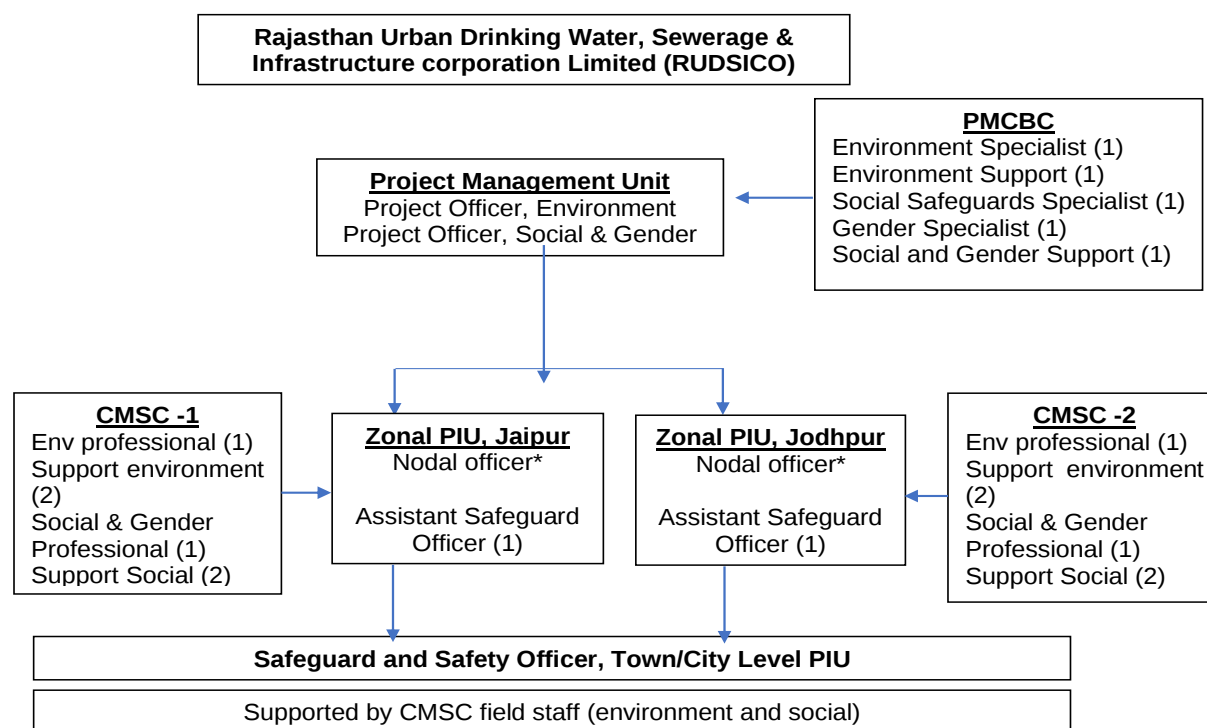
74. The contractor will have a dedicated social outreach team (SOT) and designated social supervisor, who will be a graduate in social science/sociology and would have at least 5 years of experience in resettlement planning and implementation and engage with the PIU, CAPPC and CMSC on social safeguards, health and safety, and core labor standards. The key role of the Contractor's Social Supervisor related to social safeguards will be to:

- (i) Work in close coordination with the PIU, CMSC and PMCBC engineers and social safeguards personnel to help finalize detailed design keeping the safeguard principles adopted for the project in view;
- (ii) Support project consultants in achieving subproject goals; and undertake consultations with appropriate stakeholders including Nagar Nigam Officials as and when required in presence of PIU/PMU Officials Consultants;
- (iii) Ensure strict adherence to agreed impact avoidance and mitigation measures in the resettlement plan/DDR/RIPP during implementation;
- (iv) Assist with grievance redressal and ensure recording, reporting and follow-up for resolution of all grievances received; and
- (v) Submit monthly progress reports to PIU/PMU on subproject progress.

75. **Civil works contracts:** The resettlement plans /IPPs are to be included in bidding and contract documents and verified by the PIUs and PMU. All contractors will be required to designate an Environment, Health and Safety (EHS) supervisor to ensure implementation of EMP/resettlement plan social safeguard provisions in the agreed resettlement framework for the Project during civil works and O&M, who will also have the responsibility for communication with the public under the guidance of PMU/PIUs and grievance registration. Contractors are to carry out all mitigation and monitoring measures outlined in their contract.

76. The PMU and PIUs will ensure that bidding and contract documents include specific provisions requiring contractors to comply with: (i) all applicable labor laws and core labor standards on (a) prohibition of child labor as defined in national legislation for construction and maintenance activities; (b) equal pay for equal work of equal value regardless of gender, ethnicity, or caste; and (c) elimination of forced labor; and with (ii) the requirement to disseminate information on sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS, to employees and local communities surrounding the project sites.

*Zonal PIU will be led by a nodal officer of the rank of assistant chief engineer who will also be the nodal person for safeguards and gender compliances in project implementation by town level PIUs. S/he will be supported by ASO in execution of these responsibilities.

77. Further details on agencies responsible for social safeguard implementation during different project phases are given in Table 11 below.

C. Institutional Capacity and Development

78. RUSIDCO-EAP has experienced project staff for social safeguards, with knowledge and experience of ADB social safeguard policies and their implementation. However, retirement of existing staff during project implementation, transfer of candidates or recruitment/designation of new candidates as safeguards officers at zonal or town level will require training of the new staff and officers who will be involved in project preparation and implementation of this project. The PMCBC Social Safeguard Specialist will be responsible for training the PMU's safeguards officers (environmental and social), and PIUs' engineers and social safeguards officers. The resettlement framework includes indicative training modules on safeguards. The PMCBC will coordinate with PMU and PIUs on specific capacity development program.

- (i) sensitization on ADB's Policies and guidelines on social and indigenous people safeguards (ADB's Safeguard Requirement 2 and 3: Involuntary Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples) including meaningful consultation, GRM and accountability mechanism;
- (ii) introduction to the assessment of involuntary resettlement and indigenous peoples impacts and mitigation measures, including best practices, in the design, construction, operation and maintenance of water supply, sewerage, roads, and drainage subprojects;
- (iii) preparation and review of resettlement plans/RIPPs/DDR's based on preliminary design, and updating of the documents based on the final design;
- (iv) improved coordination within nodal departments;
- (v) disbursement of compensation, consultation; and
- (vi) monitoring and reporting requirements.

79. Table 12 provides the indicative training needs assessment. The cost of trainings will be borne under the Project's capacity building program by PMU. The detailed cost and specific modules will be customized for the available skill set after assessing the capabilities of the target participants and the requirements of the project by the SSS of PMCBC.

D. Implementation Schedule

80. The project will be implemented over a period of 18 months. The resettlement plan implementation schedule will vary from subproject to subproject. In general, the project implementation will consist of the three major phases, namely project preparation, land acquisition (if required), and rehabilitation of affected persons. The implementation of the resettlement plan will include: (i) identification of cut-off date and notification, (ii) verification of losses and extent of impacts, (iii) finalization of entitlements and distribution of identity cards, (iv) consultations with affected persons (APs) on their needs and priorities, and (v) resettlement, provision of compensation and assistance, and restoration for affected persons (APs). The PMU and zonal PIU will ensure that no economic displacement of affected persons will occur until: (i) compensation at full replacement cost has been paid to each displaced person for project components or sections that are ready for construction; (ii) other entitlements listed in the resettlement plan are provided to the affected persons. However, public consultation and monitoring will be continued on an intermittent basis as needed during the entire duration of the project. The implementation schedule for the subproject is given in **Table 13**.

ADB = Asian Development Bank, CAPPC= community awareness and public participation consultant, CLC/CLMC= city level committee/city level monitoring committee, CMSC= construction and supervision consultant, GRC = grievance redress committee, PIU = project implementation unit, PMCBC = project management and capacity building consultant, PMU = project management unit,

Notes: (i) The start date of census and socio-economic surveys based on final design and DMS will be the cut-off date for non-titled affected persons/temporary impacts. For titled affected persons, the cut-off date is the date as per the RFCTLARR Act 2013. (ii) The resettlement plan will be updated based on final detailed design and DMS, affected person census and socio-economic surveys, (iii) Endorsement and disclosure of finalized resettlement plans consistent with the resettlement framework to be undertaken.

** Civil works at this particular section (Ramdev Mela Ground) will commence only after payment of compensation amounts relocation of vendors to the alternate location site for continued business. The same principal applies for the vendors to be impacted during development of heritage walk and the improvement of the 2 city squares.

X. MONITORING AND REPORTING

81. Resettlement plan implementation will be closely monitored to provide the PMU with an effective basis for assessing resettlement progress and identifying potential difficulties and problems. Internal monitoring will be undertaken by the PIU (through the SSS) with assistance from the PMU SPO. The socio-economic status of the affected persons will be monitored to ensure that their living standards are restored to pre project level or improved. Monthly progress reports will be prepared by the consultants and contractors and submitted to the PMU. PMU will consolidate the same and will submit semi-annual monitoring reports to the ADB for approval. Monitoring reports will be disclosed on PMU and ADB websites (refer to sample monitoring template in **Appendix 28**).

XI. NEXT STEPS

82. Following points/issues were identified that will be updated prior to start of civil works and reported to ADB for approval.

- (i) Alternate location for the 113 vendors running their business near Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground is identified for their continued business opportunity during the period of construction. No construction activity will be initiated prior to allotment of alternate space to the 113 vendors operating in Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground.
- (ii) Agreement between the vendors and the Nagar Palika (Municipality) will be drawn based on mutually agreeable terms and conditions for allotment of shops in the Mela (Fair) Ground. In principle, confirmation for the allotment of shops to the 113 vendors has been provided by both the agencies (Nagar Palika (Municipality), Nawalgarh and PIU, RSTDSP).
- (iii) The resettlement plan will be updated prior to start of construction and the alternate location for the to be affected vendors of under the subproject components (i) Redevelopment of Heritage Walk and (ii) Redevelopment of 2 City Chowk (Square) will be depicted (photographs and google maps) in the updated draft for ADB approval. No construction activity will be initiated prior to allotment of alternate space to the vendors.
- (iv) For the subproject component Rehabilitation of 29 Heritage Assets, all remaining NOCs will be secured prior to start of work and appended in the updated resettlement plan for ADB approval.
- (v) Due diligence will be undertaken for the above mentioned activities and same will be reported to ADB through the updated resettlement plan prior to start of construction and continue reporting through semi-annual social monitoring reports.
- (vi) Formal and informal consultations will be carried out, including but not limited to focus group discussions (FGDs), public meetings, community discussions, and in-depth and key informant interviews through the implementation of the project and the same will be reported to ADB through the semi-annual social monitoring reports. In case there is a change to project design or additional scope is proposed during implementation, ADB will be promptly informed; social safeguards document will be updated and submitted to ADB for approval.
- (vii) Mitigation measures as proposed in this resettlement plan will be taken into account by the contractor and robust monitoring plan will put in place by the PIU and PMU to ensure its compliance. All safety measures will be taken during civil work.

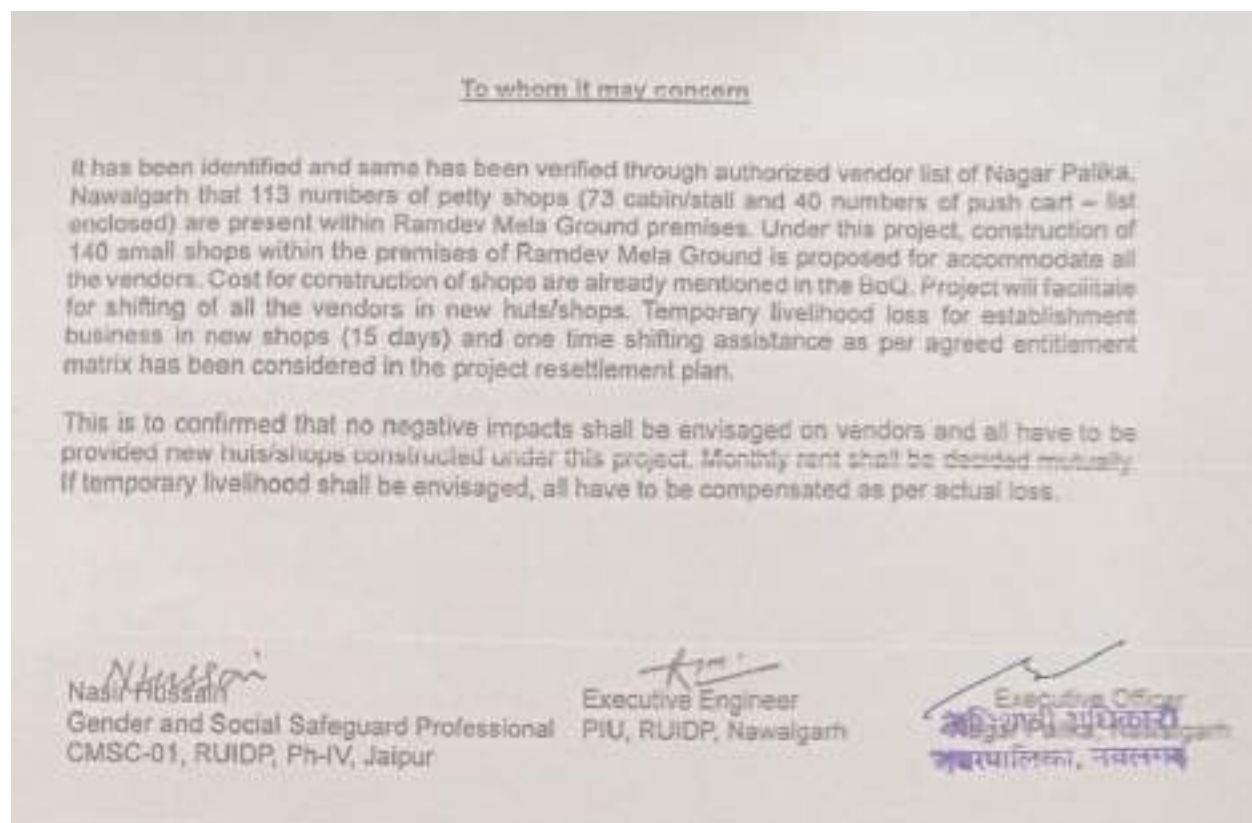

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU)

This memorandum of understanding is made on _____ day of _____ 2023 between Nagar Palika (Municipal Council) of Nawalgarh, **Government of Rajasthan** through Mr./ Mrs., **The**
on one part (hereinafter referred to as “the First Party”) and Secretary/President of through Mr/Mrs. (herein after referred to as “the Second Party”) for Subproject ‘ (Package No.).

We the signatories of Nagar Palika of (Municipal Council) and the members of vendors association have agreed for the construction of an integrated urban Haat (Market) area with heritage landscape design elements at Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground.

The Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground area is located about 700m south of the city center, and it is traversed by the main road that leads from Nawalgarh towards the south. The total area of the Mela (Fair) Ground is approximately 2.6 hectares; making it a large public space that serves as a prominent venue for major events and festivals in the city. **It has great potential for development as a tourist destination, as it is connected to the Heritage Walk.** The ground is slightly away from the crowded narrow streets of the city center, and there is ample open space nearby that can be used for parking, making it easily accessible by car and suitable for accommodating many people simultaneously. Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground is the major areas of local as well as tourists’ interaction in the town and hence are in need of proper infrastructure in order to cater the needs of tourists as well as local folks. It will be developed as integrated urban Haat (Market) area with heritage landscape design elements. The essential public facilities such as public toilets will be provided as well. This Mela Ground is also a commercial space where many merchants gather. There are 113 small makeshift shops and vendors operating in mobile stalls, selling puja samgiri (worship material), fruit, vegetable, tea etc. These small vendors are exposed to heat and dust.

The subproject titled ‘Conservation and Development of Heritage Sites at Nawalgarh Town’ under ADB assisted Rajasthan Secondary Towns Development Sector Project – Additional Financing proposes re-development of the Ramdev Mela Ground. Re-development including construction of shopping kiosk and food zone will cause impact on the 113 vendors. These 113 vendors will be provided new shops (3meter x 3meter dimension) at the proposed shopping kiosks. This arrangement will elevate their current status from open air temporary shops to proper shops with better working condition and secure tenure.

The mutually agreed terms and conditions are as follows:

1. That the First Party is the landowner of the **Ramdev Mela (Fair) Ground** bearing Khasra No. **1332**, with transferable right to use the property is going for redevelopment of the **Ramdev Mela Ground which will include construction of shopping kiosk and food zone.**
2. The Second Party (113 vendors operating from the **Ramdev Mela Ground**) have no reservation / objection for the said revelopment activities in the **Ramdev Mela Ground.**
3. That the Second Party (all the 113 vendors at **Ramdev Mela Ground**) will be provided with shops ofdimention in the proposed shopping kiosk and food zone at **Ramdev Mela Ground with secure tenure.**
4. The shops will be provided free of cost / with nominal deposit of.....to the Second Party and the monthly rent will be as per the existing and prevalent norms under Mawalgarh Nagar Palika.
5. During redevelopment of Mela (Fair) ground, as space is available near the proposed site (at a distance of mere 100m); hence all the Second Party (113 vendors) will relocate in that space temporarily during redevelopment / construction activities and period. Civil works at this particular section will commence only after payment of compensation and relocation of vendors to the alternate location site. The re-development period will depend on the work schedule of the subproject and the Second Party will have no objection to such scheduling of work.
6. The vendors will not demand any compensation if there is loss of business during the construction period.
7. That both the Parties hereto agree that the re-development of the **Ramdev Mela Ground** is for the public service and for greater benefit of public residing in Nawalgarh Town.
8. That the provisions of the MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING will come into force and effect from the date of signing of this deed.
9. IN WITNESS WHEREOF the Parties hereto have signed this deed on the day and the year first above written.

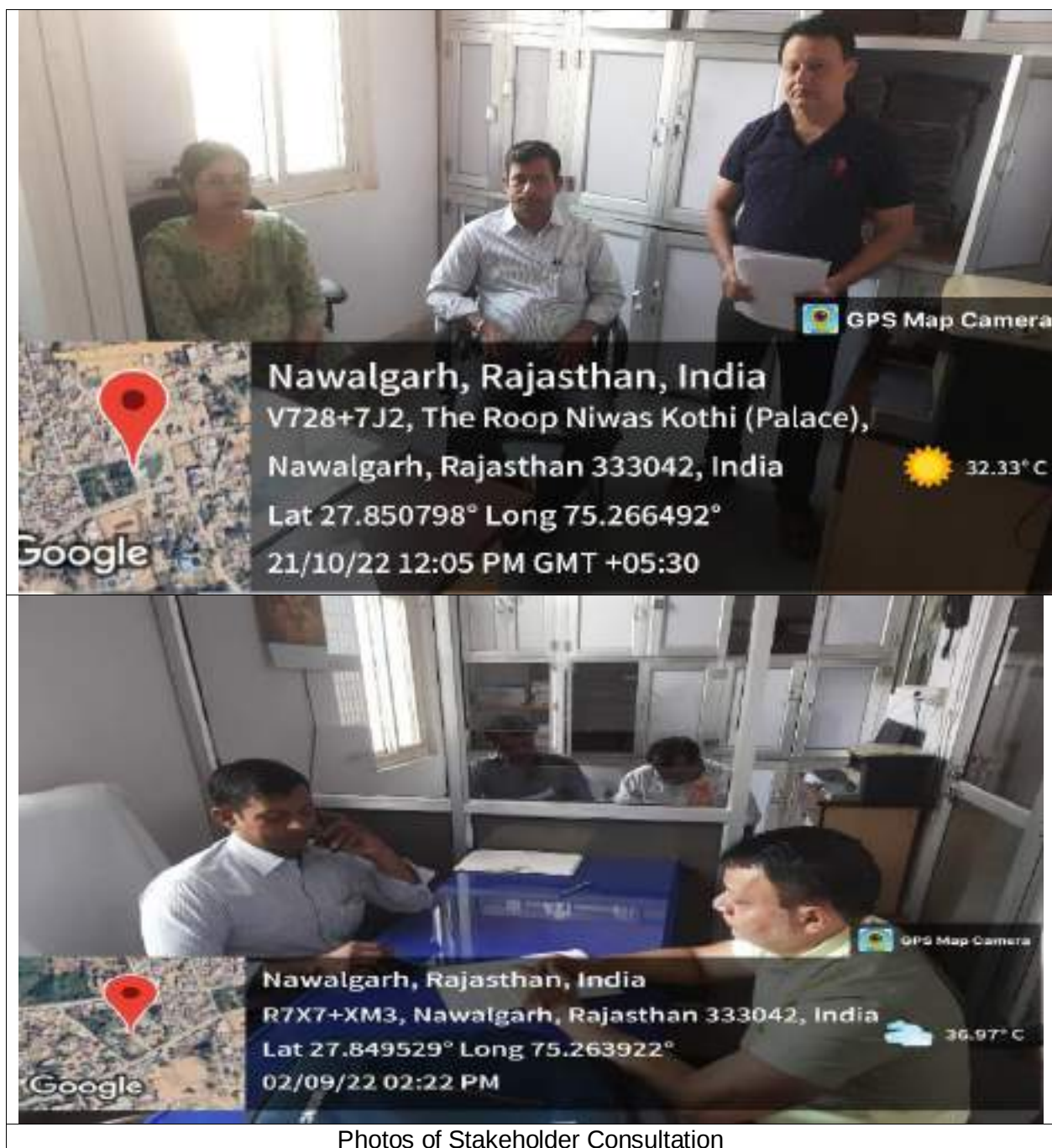

Some street and mobile vendors are situated at vicinity of Canopies, Gates, Park and Roads and are engaged in earning livelihood work. City Beautification works will be executed at nearby these Canopies, Gates, Park and Roads which may temporarily affect the street and mobile vendors and they may have to move to other places at nearby locations for continued business. If there is any loss of business or livelihood, the person will be considered as affected person and compensated as per ADB/GOR requirements. Since this project is based on a design build operator model, the contractor will first organize a detailed measurement survey, followed by a Socio-economic survey (carried out between 04.09.2023 to 05.09.2023). The cut-off date will also be determined during that time. Anyone who establishes a shop or crate or any makeshift structure, after the cut-of-date will not be considered as the affected person and have to remove their structures'. They will receive a prior intimation from the project or ULB.⁴⁴
