EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Background. Rajasthan Secondary Towns Development Sector Project (RSTDSP), is the fourth phase of investment projects financed by the Asian Development Bank (ADB) and implemented by the Rajasthan Urban Drinking Water Sewerage and Infrastructure Corporation Limited-Externally Aided Projects (RUDSICO-EAP), previously known as Rajasthan Urban Infrastructure Development Project (RUIDP). RSTDSP has been supporting the ongoing efforts of the Government of Rajasthan (the government) towards improving the water and wastewater services in about 14 towns, each with a population between (50,000 and 100,000 in the state) or which are district headquarters (irrespective of the population) or having heritage, cultural or other importance and irrespective of population. The project has been investing in (i) the rehabilitation and expansion of the water supply network through a district metering approach for the management of nonrevenue water (NRW) and aiming for 24x7 water supply, (ii) the rehabilitation and expansion of the sewerage network, (iii) modernization and new construction of water supply and waste water treatment plants, as required, (iv) construction of faecal sludge management treatment plant, and (v) decentralized waste water management systems in the project towns. The project also aims for wastewater reuse and a city-wide, inclusive sanitation approach to improve sanitation for all, including below-poverty-line households. The project is expected to increase operational efficiency, improve service delivery, and positively impact the health and quality of life of the residents of project towns in the state. Pratapgarh is one of the towns selected under RSTDSP.

During subproject implementation, based on public consultations and technical requirements, the location of the sewage treatment plant (STP) has been changed. The previous location of the STP was proposed near Kila (Fort) gate road and site was very close to the habitations, hence decision was taken by the project implementation unit (PIU) with consultation to the officials of local bodies that an alternate land need to be identified. New location has been identified around 700 mtr from the previous land and proposed site is adjacent to Gupt Ganga road, near new bypass which comes under the municipal area of Pratapgarh town. In addition to that one number of consumer relation management centre (CRMC) which was previous proposed in sewage pumping station (SPS) premises near Kila (Fort) road has also been changed and now proposed to be constructed in the previous STP land near Kila (Fort) gate road. No changes have been made so far in SPS location. Initially length of the sewer networks was 100.33 km, which has been increased 109.031 km. During confirmatory survey and service improvement plan (SIP), it was noticed that some pockets/missing link was not covered in the initial design and detailed project report, which has now covered in the project scope, hence length of sewer network 9.13 km has been increased. The inclusion of the additional network 9.13 km will not result in any resettlement impact. Number of house sewer connection has now changed from 11418 to 10426 (actually feasible). This resettlement and indigenous peoples plan (RIPP) is updated to include these changes. It is further confirmed that all other components remain unchanged. The change in the work methodology will not result in involuntary resettlement impacts.

Subproject Description: Pratapgarh is one of the towns selected under (RSTDSP) and key subproject components include: (i) construction of sewage treatment plant (STP) of 7 million litre per day (MLD), treated effluent reuse works including construction of treated effluent elevated reservoirs (TEER), treated effluent storage reservoirs (TESR) and effluent pumping station (EPS); (ii) one sewage pumping station (SPS) of 7 MLD and manhole with pumping (MWP) of 0.10 MLD; (iii) proposed pipe line 109.031 km (iv) sewer property connections-10426 units (v) instrumentation, automation and provision of Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) works and stores along with ancillary civil works (vi) road restoration; (vii) faecal

sludge and septage management (FSSM)- 2 number of trucks (2 in nos.) - 4000 Litre and 1000 Litre capacities and (viii) two consumer relation management centers (CRMC).

Scope of Land Acquisition and Resettlement: This final resettlement and indigenous peoples plan is prepared after completion of civil works of proposed components of subproject sewerage, Pratapgarh town under RSTDSP. The document is updated to indicate the final components and location of such components of this subproject based on Service Improvement Plan (SIP), confirmatory survey and 100% census /socio economic surveys of potential affected persons. No private land has acquired for construction of proposed subproject components. Resettlement impact is minimized and consistent with the subproject selection criteria; rehabilitation is prioritized over new construction to avoid/minimize involuntary resettlement impacts. The new land selected for STP under khasra no-614 is an unproductive and vacant land under the possession/ownership of municipality, Pratapgarh. Total land required for STP is 5000 m² and 8000 m² vacant land of Municipality is available for the said works. Construction of STP does not cause any resettlement impacts. Land identified for SPS and CRMC near Kila(Fort) gate is an unproductive and vacant land under government ownership. Proposed land parcels, though classified as pasture land, have been lying vacant and not used for any productive purpose by any individual, community or institution. District collector has approved change of land use and allotment of proposed land parcel to Nagar Palika / Municipality (ULB). District Collector, Pratapgarh allotted 0.50 hectare (5000 m²) land out of 0.97 hectare land in Village- Pratapgarh under khasra no-263 for the construction of CRMC under RUIDP Phase-IV¹ and as a compensatory measure an equivalent area 0.51 hectare land (5100 m²) under khasra no.- 249 in the Village Gopalpura is declared as pasture land in accordance with section-92 of land revenue and allotment act, 1956 and 1963. Similarly, District Collector, Pratapgarh allotted 0.06 hectare (600 m²) land out of 0.97 hectare (9700 m²) land in Vill-Pratapgarh under khasra no-263 for the construction of sewage pumping station under RUIDP Phase-IV and as a compensatory measure an equivalent area/land under khasra no.- 212 is declared as pasture land. The total land required for SPS is around 600 m² and the same quantity of land is available. Land for second CRMC which was earlier proposed in STP campus has been changed and new location identified in the premises of Municipal office, which is vacant. Land requirement for CRMC is 900 m² and the available land is 968m². About 50m² of land owned by Municipality has been identified on the banks of Nallah (large wastewater drain) in Manpur for construction of MWP. Under the FSSM component, desludging of septage from household pits/septic tank will be collected and disposed in designated unit at STP. No permanent or temporary impact to livelihood and other assets owned by any individual or community is anticipated for the construction and development of STP, SPS, TEER, TESR, MWP sites.

Pipelines of sewer network were proposed within the existing available right of way (RoW) of government roads, and there were also no likely to cause of any loss of structure, common property resources (CPRs) or relocation impact is envisaged. Government departments own all proposed RoW to be used for laying pipelines. This is pertinent to inform that total 606 potential affected persons were identified as per census and socio-economic survey done in the month of February-March 2021. As pipeline was executed in few identified areas in April-May 2021 (completely lockdown due to covid pandemic) after taking special permission from district administration (Sub-Divisional Magistrate), livelihood impact of 194² potential affected persons were completely avoided. During reverification conducted by PIU and CMSC in the month of

January-February 2022, it was noticed that that execution of pipeline work may cause temporary loss of livelihood/income due to access disruptions to 412 road side non-titled small cabin/mobile vendors /transitory structure (pushcarts etc.). **Effectively, this report deals with potential livelihood impact (income loss) of 412 (606-194) vendors (non-titled small cabin/movable /transitory structure pushcarts etc.) due to loss of access during execution of pipeline works.** Based on data from the impact assessment and socio-economic survey, 148 affected persons (36%) belong to vulnerable category. Out of the total 148 affected persons from vulnerable category; 57(38%) are females (female headed households-FHH), 63(43%) are from scheduled caste (SC), 19(13%) belong to scheduled tribe (ST) community and 9(6%) are below poverty line (BPL).

Impact on indigenous peoples: Pratapgarh town has been declared as a scheduled area by the Government of India. Whilst many scheduled tribe (ST) households residing here; no longer maintain their cultural traditions and have settled amongst the non-tribal populations. Based on census and socio-economic survey, among the affected persons facing involuntary resettlement impacts (temporary income loss), 19 persons belong to scheduled tribe community. These persons are using the RoW for earning their livelihood through sale of fruits, garments, flowers etc. and will face temporary income loss during the period of pipe laying. During finalization of alignment prior to start of construction, efforts will be made by the implementing agency to provide access for continuation for their business activity. In case temporary livelihood impacts persists, compensation and assistances as per agreed resettlement framework and indigenous peoples planning framework will be disbursed to them. The project is designed to benefit 100% scheduled tribe households in the project coverage area. Contractual provisions will ensure that 100% scheduled tribe households in the coverage area will benefit from the improved wastewater infrastructure. The proposed subproject in Pratapgarh is Category B for both involuntary resettlement and indigenous peoples impacts.

Consultation and Disclosure: Goals and objectives of the project were disclosed to the stakeholders (including beneficiaries, affected persons, scheduled tribe community, elected representatives and institutional stakeholders). Stakeholders were briefed about the technical details of the project and project implementation cycle; project benefits as well as adverse impacts envisaged; environmental and social safeguards, gender inclusion, community participation built into the project. Draft documents have been uploaded in RUSDIP and ADB websites and updated version of RIPP will also be uploaded in RUSDIP ADB websites. Consultation carried out during preparation of the safeguard documents did not reveal culture/tradition specific requirements. During updating of this RIPP, consultation was done near proposed STP and CRMC sites and reason for changing the sites were briefed to the nearby habitation. However, further consultations will be continued with scheduled tribe population in project coverage areas which shall help in identifying culture and tradition specific requirements if any, such as avoidance of civil works during any specific festival days, and /or other period with cultural significance to the indigenous peoples (IP) communities; or accommodation of any other specific cultural concerns expressed by the indigenous people's communities. Such meaningful consultations shall be continued throughout the project cycle.

Grievance Redress Mechanism: GRM has been established under this sub-project. The GRM aims to provide a time-bound and transparent mechanism to voice and resolve social and environmental concerns linked to the project. Office order of PMU was also issued to all PIUs/CMSC to follow that grievance mechanism.

Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples Plan Budget and Financing Plan. The resettlement cost for the subproject was ₹4611929/-. PIU will issue order for release of payment to affected

persons and transfer funds electronically. Community awareness and public participation (CAPP) consultant was involved in facilitating the disbursement process and opening bank accounts for the affected persons who do not have such accounts.

Institutional Setup: The Local Self Government Department (LSGD), Government of Rajasthan (GOR) is the executing agency (EA) of the project and LSGD is responsible for overall strategic approvals, guidance, and monitoring of the project. Rajasthan Urban Drinking Water Sewerage and Infrastructure Corporation Limited (RUDSICO) is the Implementing Agency (IA) for the project. The Project Management Unit (PMU) is housed in the Externally Aided Projects division of RUDSICO (RUDSICO – EAP). PIU/PMU closely monitors resettlement plan implementation. PMU is compiling monitoring reports prepared by PIU semi-annually for its due submissions to ADB.

I. INTRODUCTION

A. Subproject Description

RSTDSP has been supporting the ongoing efforts of the Government of Rajasthan (the government) towards improving the water and wastewater services in about 14 towns, each with a population between (50,000 and 100,000 in the state) or which are district headquarters (irrespective of the population) or having heritage, cultural or other importance and irrespective of population. The project has been investing in (i) the rehabilitation and expansion of the water supply network through a district metering approach for the management of nonrevenue water (NRW) and aiming for 24x7 water supply, (ii) the rehabilitation and expansion of the sewerage network, (iii) modernization and new construction of water supply and waste water treatment plants, as required, (iv) construction of faecal sludge management treatment plant, and (v) decentralized waste water management systems in the project towns. Pratapgarh is one of the towns selected under RSTDSP.

2. Pratapgarh city falls in Pratapgarh district of Rajasthan and is a newly formed district headquarter. It is located in the southern part of Rajasthan close to Madhya Pradesh on Malwa plateau. Pratapgarh is 112 km from District Chittorgarh and 180 kms from Udaipur, the Divisional Headquarter. It is well connected with Chittorgarh, Banswara, Udaipur, Bhilwara, Ajmer in Rajasthan and Neemach, Mandsaur and Ratlam in MP. Pratapgarh is the administrative sub-divisional headquarters with Pratapgarh, Arnod, Bari Sadri and Chhoti Sadri tehsils under it. It is located on Jaipur – Banswara State Highway number 4. Pratapgarh is, however, not linked by rail network. According to 2011 census, the total population of Pratapgarh district is 867,848. Of these, 8.38% or 71, 807 lives in urban regions of which 36,573 are males and 35,234 females while 91.72% or 796,041 of the population lives in rural areas of which 401,171 males and 394,870 are females. Total population of Pratapgarh Municipal area, consisting of 25 municipal wards is 42,079 out of which 3,459 (8.22%) belongs to scheduled tribe community.

3. As per 2011 census, Rajasthan has 9,238,534 tribal population constituting 13.48% of the State's population. Major concentration of tribal population is in Banswara, Dungarpur, Udaipur, Pratapgarh and Sirohi districts. The total population of scheduled tribe within scheduled areas³ is 4,551,917.⁴ The scheduled areas cover 5,696 villages, contain 49.27% of

In Pratapgarh district, the total tribal population constitutes 63.42% of the total population, with Meena tribe being predominant in the population.⁵ The area falls under a scheduled area as defined by the Constitution of India.

4. There is no functional sewerage system in Pratapgarh town. Presently, the wastewater from kitchens and bathrooms is discharged into storm water drains culminating finally in the Nallah (large wastewater drain) or on open ground, which pollutes the environment and contaminates the ground water. Open defecation is also common. Most of the residential, commercial buildings and educational institutions have on-site septic tanks and soak pits. Although septic tanks are standard and accepted onsite sewage discharge facilities, however, the septic tanks in the town are not designed and maintained properly. The effluent does not conform to the standards and is directly let into the open drains.

5. During subproject implementation, based on public consultations and technical requirements, the location of the sewage treatment plant (STP) has been changed. The previous location of the STP was proposed near Kila(Fort) gate road and site was very close to the habitations, hence decision was taken by the project implementation unit (PIU) with consultation to the officials of local bodies that an alternate land need to be identified. New location has been identified around 700 mtr from the previous land and proposed site is adjacent to Gupt Ganga road, near new bypass which comes under the municipal area of Pratapgarh. In addition to that one number of consumer relation management centre (CRMC) which was previous proposed in sewage pumping station (SPS) premises near Kila(Fort) road has also been changed and now proposed to be constructed in the previous STP land near Kila(Fort) gate road. No changes have been made so far in SPS location. Initially length of the sewer networks was 100.33 km, which has been increased 109.46 km. During confirmatory survey and service improvement plan (SIP)⁶, it was noticed that some pockets/missing link was not covered in the initial design and detailed project report, which has now covered in the project scope, hence length of sewer network 9.13 km has been increased. The inclusion of the additional network 9.13 km will not result in any resettlement impact. Number of house sewer connection has also increased from 11418 to 11917. This resettlement and indigenous peoples plan (RIPP) been updated to include these changes. It is further confirmed that all other components remain unchanged. The change in the work methodology will not result in involuntary resettlement impacts (refer Table 1 for details of changed locations).

7. The project is designed to benefit 100% scheduled tribe households in the project coverage area. Contractual provisions ensure that 100% scheduled tribe households in the coverage area in Pratapgarh town will either benefit from house sewer connections for sewerage (in areas where sewer network is possible to provide) or from improved FSSM services (in areas that cannot be seweraged immediately). Project cost includes the cost of 100% sewerage house sewer connections in the coverage area, including to scheduled tribe households.

8. This resettlement and indigenous peoples plan (RIPP) is being updated to reflect the change in land parcels/sites and to reflect the findings of the confirmatory and socio-economic survey. This updated RIPP will be reviewed and upon ADB's no objection, will be disclosed in RSTDSP and ADB websites. Civil works will commence only after payment of compensation based on the updated RIPP for the said package. The implementing agency (IA) is responsible for handing over the project land/site to the contractor, free of encumbrance.

9. **Measures to Avoid and Minimize Involuntary Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples Impacts:** To avoid and minimize involuntary resettlement impacts, the subproject will consider the use of government land where available and right-of-way of government road for laying of all proposed pipelines under this package. The pipelines are proposed to be laid underground within the existing available road RoW. Diameters of proposed pipes ranges between 100 mm to 500 mm and would be laid in such a way that economic impacts and traffic disruptions are minimized to the extent possible. As per the assessment, indigenous peoples are likely to benefit from the subproject and will have minimal potential temporary economic impact (involuntary resettlement impact) and additional assistance will be provided to them as per agreed entitlement matrix.

10. To further minimize construction impacts, works will be executed during the early and late hours of the day, on holidays and market closure days, to avoid inconvenience to the public as well as traders and vendors. All safety norms would strictly be adhered to depending on the magnitude of work and the sensitivity of the location. The Project Implementation Unit (PIU) will also ensure that all the necessary rules related to safety and security of the public and residents are followed by the contractor. The actual dates of construction schedule will consider the rush hour, festival time, and special business days. This will also be discussed with vendors, squatters, market committee members, and residents, and accordingly, construction activities will be planned. After laying of pipes, the lane/road will be restored to its original condition (including bitumen, cement concrete [CC] and CC interlocking tiles as applicable).

11. The project will adopt measures to avoid/mitigate impacts which include: (i) proper traffic management during pipe laying work; (ii) announcement/notice of proposed civil works will be given in advance to residents and businesses prior to start of work; (iii) ensuring access to shops and businesses by providing pedestrian access through planks, assistance to mobile hawkers and vendors and those with moveable, temporary structures to shift to (and back from) nearby locations where they can continue with their economic activities; (d) provision of planks to ensure pedestrian access in residential or commercial properties; (e) proper coordination of civil works such that the period of disruption along a particular road section is minimized; and (f) signage with project details and contact details for grievance redress. These measures will be part of the contract and will be implemented with careful monitoring by the concerned PIU.

12. During house service connection, if any structures inside the property premises of the household is disturbed, damaged, or dismantled; the contractor will reconstruct the same

structures⁸. This may include but is not limited to dismantling of the ramp, and floor, excavation of trenches, laying, jointing of 110 mm dia PVC-U pipe, construction of intermediate house chambers (within the premises) for connecting existing sewage/sullage pipeline up to property chamber for joining of existing pipes coming from WC's, toilets, bathrooms, kitchen, wash basins etc., and refilling of trenches and repairing of floor with cement concrete base 1:2:4 and floor finishing with kota stone slab flooring over 20 mm (average) thick CM (1:4) / 40 mm thick Marble chip flooring with granite finish (shade matching with existing) / other tiles matching to existing floor and repairing of wall punctured for making hole as good as existing with 12 mm thick cement plastering in CM (1:4 ratio). It also includes the provision of gully trap arrangement, PVC-U pipes (SN8) as per IS 15328 (amended up to date), and as per specifications, jointing with a rubber ring (EDMO/SBR) with socket and spigot joint for all depths including specials, fittings / accessories of class III (6 kg/scum) uPVC as per IS 4985 with sealed joints in uPVC pipeline at all levels as per requirement etc. complete as per direction of an engineer in charge.

C. Objectives of Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples Plan

13. The draft combined Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples Plan (RIP) was initially prepared for the Pratapgarh sewerage subproject under RSTDSP was based on the preliminary project report prepared by RUDSICO (EAP). The document is updated to indicate the final sites and components of the project based on service improvement plan (SIP)⁹ confirmatory survey and 100% socio-economic surveys of potential affected persons. Civil works under this subproject are being executed using the design-build operate (DBO) modality.

14. This updated RIPP is prepared in accordance with ADB SPS, 2009 safeguard requirements for involuntary resettlement and indigenous peoples category B projects and to meet the following objectives:

- (i) to ensure that the scheduled tribe receive culturally appropriate social and economic benefits;
- (ii) to ensure that when potential adverse impacts on the scheduled tribe are identified, these will be avoided to the maximum extent possible;
- (iii) to describe the identified scope and extent of land acquisition and involuntary resettlement impacts because of identified project components, and address them through appropriate recommendations and mitigation measures in the resettlement and Indigenous Peoples plan;
- (iv) to present the socio-economic profile of the population in the project area, identify social impacts, including impacts on the poor and vulnerable, and the needs and priorities of different sections of the population, including women, poor and vulnerable;
- (v) to describe the likely economic impacts and identified livelihood risks of the proposed project components;
- (vi) to describe the process undertaken during project design to engage stakeholders and the planned information disclosure measures and the process for carrying out consultation with affected people and facilitating their participation during project implementation;
- (vii) to establish a framework for grievance redressal for affected persons that is appropriate to the local context, in consultation with stakeholders;

- (viii) to describe the applicable national and local legal framework for the project, and define the involuntary resettlement and indigenous people's policy principles applicable to the project;
- (ix) to define entitlements of affected persons, and assistance and benefits available under the project;
- (x) to present a budget for resettlement and define institutional arrangements, implementation responsibilities and implementation schedule for resettlement implementation; and
- (xi) to describe the monitoring mechanism that will be used to monitor resettlement and indigenous peoples plan implementation.

II. SCOPE OF LAND ACQUISITION AND INVOLUNTARY RESETTLEMENT

A. Land Acquisition and Involuntary Resettlement

15. **Construction of Sewage Treatment Plant (STP) and Treated effluent reuse works including construction of Treated Effluent Elevated Reservoirs (TEER), Treated Effluent Storage Reservoirs (TESR) and Effluent Pumping Station (EPS):** Construction of STP of 7 MLD capacity and including TEER, TESR and EPS, near Gupt Ganga road is proposed under khasra number-614, is an unproductive and vacant land under the possession/ownership of municipality. Total land required for STP is 5000 m² and 8000 m² vacant land of Municipality is available for the said works. Construction of STP does not cause any resettlement impacts. The summary table on the status of land availability and ownership is attached in **Appendix 1**, no-objection of Municipality is attached in **Appendix 2** and land record of proposed STP site is attached in **Appendix 3**. Google maps are attached in **Appendix 4**. Layout of proposed sewage treatment plant is presented in **Figure 2**.

16. **Construction of Sewage Pumping Station:** Construction of SPS, near Kila road is proposed in an unproductive and vacant land (owned by government). Proposed land, though classified as pasture land, has been lying vacant and not used for any productive purpose by any individual, community or institution. Livelihood or other involuntary impacts are not envisaged due to implementation of this subproject component. District Collector has approved change of land use and allotment of proposed land parcel to Nagar Palika/Municipality (ULB). District Collector, Pratapgarh allotted 0.06 hectare (600 m²) land out of 0.97 hectare (9700 m²) land in Village Pratapgarh under khasra number. -263 for the construction of sewage pumping station under RUIDP Phase-IV and as a compensatory measure an equivalent area/land under khasra no- 212 is declared as pasture land in accordance with section-92 of land revenue and allotment act, 1956 and 1963. The summary table on the status of land availability and ownership is attached in **Appendix 1**. Land transfer and allotment order of District Collector is attached in **Appendix 5**. Land record of allotted land for SPS (khasra no. 3027/263) measuring 0.06 hectare is attached as **Appendix 6** and 6(A). Google maps are attached in **Appendix 7**. Layout of proposed SPS is presented in **Figure 3**.

17. **Construction of Consumer Relation Management Centers:** Two CRMC will be constructed, one within Municipal office premises and second one is proposed in previously STP land near Kila gate road. Proposed land of CRMC near Kila gate though classified as pastureland, has been lying vacant and not used for any productive purpose by any individual, community or institution. Involuntary resettlement impacts are not envisaged for implementation of the said components. District Collector, Pratapgarh has approved change of land use and allotment of proposed land parcel to Nagar Palika/Municipality (ULB). District Collector,

Pratapgarh allotted 0.50 hectare (5000 m²) land out of 0.97 hectare (9700 m²) land in Village Pratapgarh under khasra no-263 for the construction of sewage treatment plant under RUIDP Phase-IV¹⁰ and as a compensatory measure an equivalent area 0.51 hectare (5100 m²) land under khasra no- 249 in the village Gopalpura is declared as pasture land in accordance with section-92 of land revenue and allotment act, 1956 and 1963. Land requirement is 900 m² and the available land is 9700 m², **Appendix 1** provides the summary table on the status of land availability and land ownership. No-objection of Municipality for proposed CRMC within their municipal office premises is attached in **Appendix 8** and land records of proposed CRMC site near Kila gate road is attached in **Appendix 9**. Google map of proposed CRMC sites is attached in **Appendix 10** and **Appendix 11**. Layout of proposed CRMC site at municipal office premises is presented in Figure 4.

18. **Construction of Manhole with Pumping (MWP):** One manhole with pumping (MWP) has been proposed in zone 1 for transportation of flow to zone 2 by gravity main. This is a small pumping station of 0.10 MLD capacity required to avoid the deeper sewer. Land has been identified by Municipality at the bank of Nallah in Manpur. Land requirement is 90 m² and same proportion of land is available for the construction of MWP. Proposed land for MWP is under the possession of Municipality. This proposed site is situated on bank of a wastewater drain (nallah), near Manpur, Pratapgarh town. On the ground surface of the proposed site, no houses/habitations are found. No livelihood and common property resources (CPRs) will be affected in the implementation of this component. **Appendix 1** provides the summary table on the status of land availability land ownership. NoC of Municipality is attached in **Appendix 2**. Google map of proposed MWP site is attached in **Appendix 12**. Layout of proposed MWP site is presented in **Figure 5**.

19. Under FSSM, desludging of septage from household pits/ septic tanks will be undertaken and septage will be disposed in designated unit in sewage treatment plant. Prior notice will be given to the household on the date and time of desludging. The desludging machine will be kept at a suitable place which would not hamper or impact normal activity of the community people or pedestrians. The truck will be kept in the proposed STP campus for which land has already been allotted. FSSM area marked on drawing in shown in **Figure 1**.

Figure 1: FSSM Coverage Area, Pratapgarh

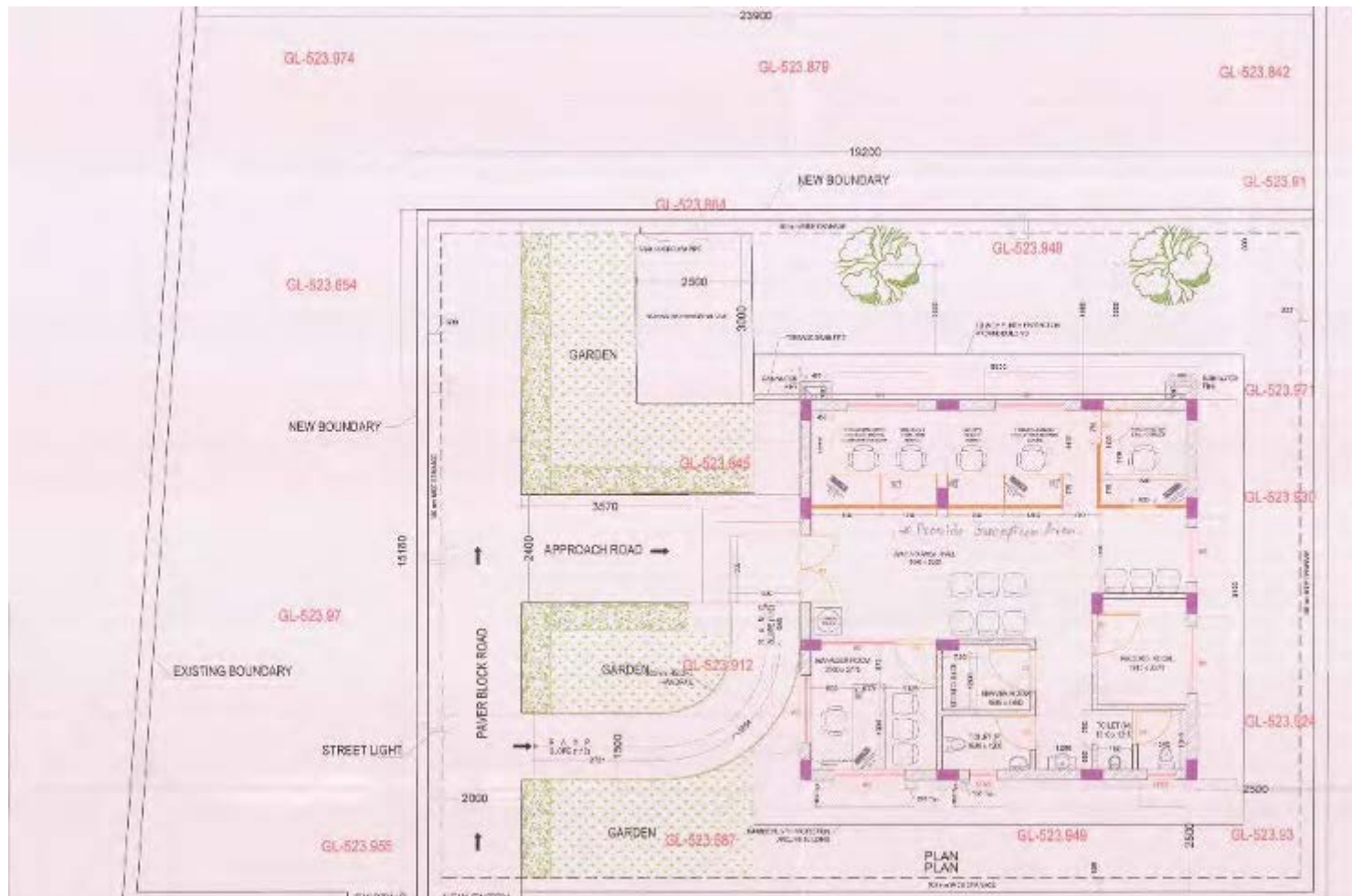

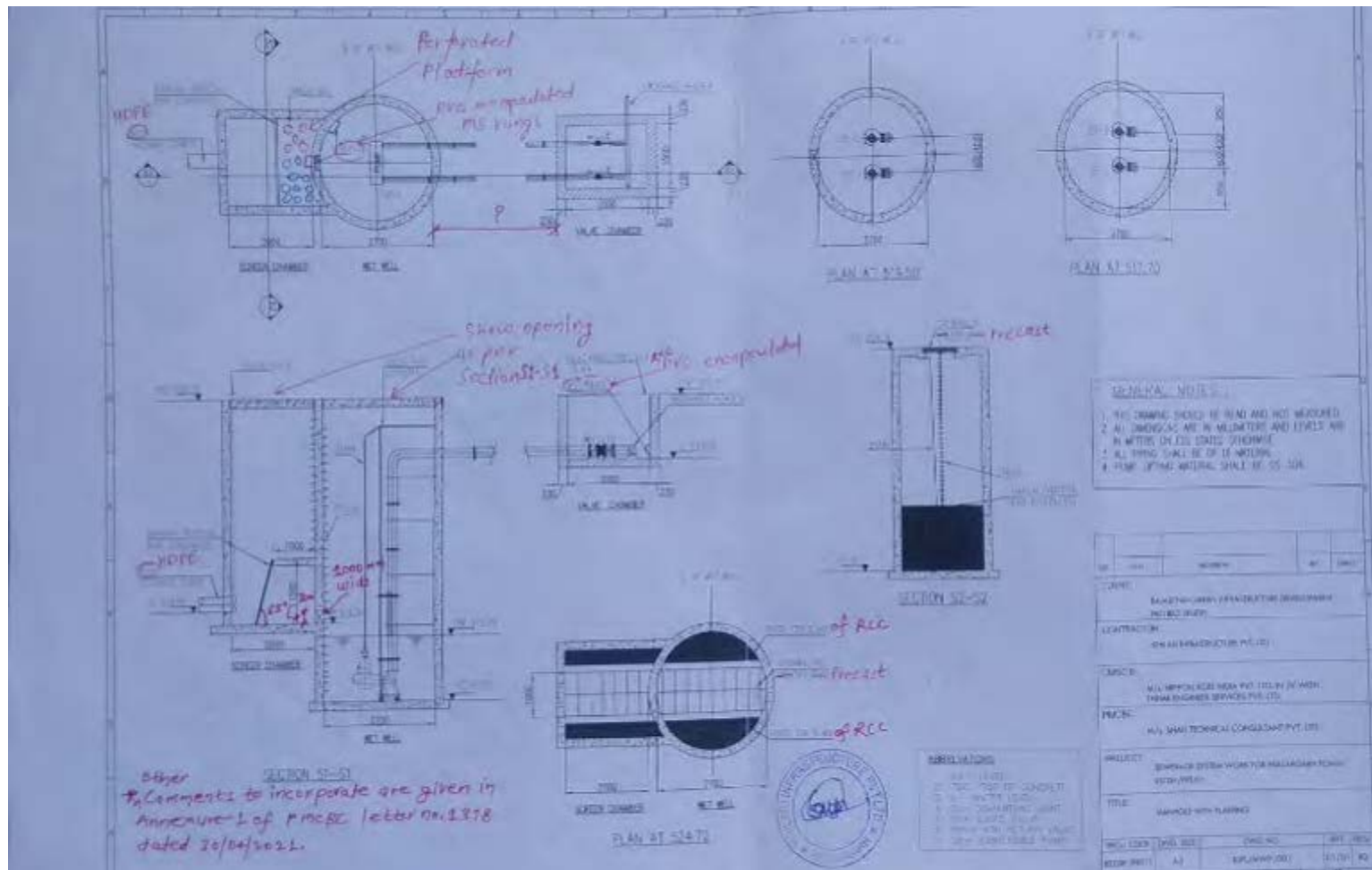

20. **Sewer Network:** Based on joint visit and transect walk by the officials of PIU, CMSC and contractor in all the areas where pipeline will be laid and it was confirmed that rising main of dia 100 mm-500 mm is proposed from SPS to STP and will be laid in the boundaries of RoW of government roads; will not have any involuntary resettlement impact. No commercial establishment- permanent shops or mobile vendors exist along the route and no economic impact is anticipated. The required trench width for pumping main¹¹ will be vary from 1m to 1.5m. Details of main pipes and photographs of alignment of main pipes are presented in below table while location marked on google map is provided in Figure 6.

21. Other sewer lines (both sewer main and lateral) will be laid in the RoW of roads/ middle of the roads. The diameter of pipeline ranges from 200 to 500 mm. Trenchless pipe laying works are proposed where sewer depth is more than 3.5 m, in the congested areas, and important road/junctions of the city to reduce inconvenience to the public and commercial establishments and also to minimize temporary livelihood impacts. No impacts (neither temporary nor permanent) on structures and CPRs¹² is envisaged. However, during laying of pipelines temporary impacts such as access disruptions, temporary income loss is anticipated for roadside vendors and kiosks as width of the road in some stretches is not sufficient. Being Design Build and Operation (DBO) contracts, even though the DPR are being prepared by consultants, the final design/alignment has to be provided/ prepared by the project contractor. As per contract, contractor should have to prepare the plan of pipe laying works starting with trunk main line followed by main pipeline and sewer network (lateral). Presently the final alignment is being provided by the contractor for the areas where trunk main and main pipeline will be laid. As it was mandatory to revise this RIPP including 100% socio-economic survey before start of civil work, joint visit and transect walk was undertaken and it was confirmed that all sewer network will be mostly laid along the existing right of way (ROW)/ middle of the town roads. All proposed RoW of roads for laying of pipelines are owned by government departments. The affected persons comprise non-titled movable /transitory structures (push carts etc.) within RoW of roads, who face temporary economic impacts during construction due to access disruption. There will be no temporary economic impacts or other impacts on permanent shops.

22. Anticipating the possibility of changed in alignment after trial pit¹³, 100% socio-economic survey was conducted for all the vendors/hawkers in both side of the road where sewerage networks pipeline are to be laid. During actual pipe laying, only one side/front will be utilized. The subproject was expected to cause temporary loss of access/disruption to livelihood during civil works to 606 non-titled movable /transitory structure (pushcarts etc.) vendors / traders located at both sides of the road. However, pipelaying works in some of the high/medium density areas has already been executed during the COVID-19 induced lockdown period in Pratapgarh. General movement and commercial activities were completely shut down due to restriction imposed by the state government due to Covid pandemic. Special permission was given by the district administration (Sub-Divisional Magistrate) for laying of pipelines maintaining all Covid protocols and guidelines including standard operating procedure (SOP). Total 194 vendors out of 606 were identified in the stretches where pipeline was laid during the lockdown period. As laying was completed during the said period all livelihood impact were avoided. The entire process has been detailed out in chapter XI of this report. **Effectively, this report deals with potential livelihood impact (income loss) of 412 (606-194) vendors (non-titled small cabin/movable /transitory structure pushcarts etc.) due to loss of access during execution of pipeline works.** There will be no temporary economic impacts or other impacts on permanent shops. Out of 412 affected persons, 219 having a small cabin, 32 persons occupy the ground on road RoW for selling items while 161 having a pushcart. After finalization of exact alignment, joint re-confirmatory survey had been conducted by the officials of PIU, CMSC and Contractor to finalize the list of affected persons likely to be impacted due to civil works. As pipe line will be laid on one side of the road, it is expected that impacts on considerable number of vendors will be avoided. Those who will be impacted will be paid assistance as per agreed

entitlement matrix. All the progress will be reported to ADB through the semi-annual social monitoring report.

23. Based on data from the socio-economic survey, 148 of the affected persons belong to vulnerable category (63 scheduled caste, 9 below poverty line¹⁴ and 57 female-headed households and 19 scheduled tribe). Impact identified area wise is presented in Table 5. The socio-economic profile of temporarily affected persons, photographs taken during survey are attached within **Appendix 13, 15, 16 and 17**.

24. The last date of the 100% socio-economic survey (along probable corridor of impact based on detailed design) is considered as the cut-off date which is 25th March 2021 for this subproject. Persons who settle in the affected areas after the cut-off date will not be eligible for compensation and assistance.

25. Pipelines in narrow roads and commercial areas will be laid phase-wise, after due consultation with shop owners. Civil works will also be completed one section at a time, before start of work in the next section. The contractor will maintain the noise level within permissible limits and ensure it does not exceed 55dB (A) as per Noise Pollution (Regulation & Control) Rules 2000. Details are given in the environmental management plan for this project.

26. Further, to minimize impact during construction specifically in laying of sewer lines, trenchless method/technology will be adopted for pipe laying. The trenchless technology is preferred for narrow roads and those with heavy traffic. Trenchless sewers have also been proposed at important circles in the city where traffic density is more, in the streets where traffic diversion is not feasible, highway crossing, railway crossing etc. In general sewer network at depth more than 3.5 m will be laid through trenchless technology. For areas where site condition is favourable, sewer lines may be laid using the open excavation method (details are mentioned in BOQ).

27. Care will be taken by the contractor to avoid/mitigate economic impacts through the following measures: (a) announcement of proposed civil works in advance (to enable shop owners to stock up and remain unaffected if goods vehicles are unable to reach them during construction, (b) provision of planks to ensure pedestrian access; (c) careful timing of implementation to avoid peak sale hours/days or school timings; (d) use of trenchless pipe laying technology, major civil work during night hours, maximum use of precast materials particularly for manhole will be used in commercial areas and narrow roads, where possible; (e) minimizing construction period to the extent possible; (f) assistance to mobile vendors if any present during construction, to shift nearby; (g) signage with project details and contact details for grievance redress; and (h) proper traffic management. These measures are part of the contract and will be implemented with careful monitoring by the concerned PIU.

28. The contractor will also be required to maintain access to shops and residences or other buildings along pipe alignments and to institutions located close to proposed sites. Safety will also be ensured through hard barricading of excavated alignments/sites, specific provisions related to impact avoidance, for pipe laying activities as well as construction work near schools, health centers, Anganwadi centers (ICDS), etc.

29. Summary impacts based on the findings of the inventory loss survey and 100% socio-economic survey is presented below. The survey was conducted on both sides of the road and data from all vendors were considered; however, execution of work and the impacts will be limited to only one side of the road (actual pipe laying corridor, which is yet to be finalized) and the number of probable affected persons (mobile vendors/ pushcarts etc.) will come down considerably.

B. Indigenous Peoples

30. Based on census and socio-economic survey, among the affected persons facing involuntary resettlement impacts (temporary income loss) 19 persons belong to scheduled tribe community. These persons are using the ROW for running their livelihood through selling of fruits, garments, flowers etc. and will be impacted for temporary period of work. During freezing of final alignment, efforts will be made by the implementing agency to provide access for

continuation for their livelihood. In case of temporary livelihood impacts persists, additional compensation and assistances as per agreed resettlement framework and indigenous peoples planning framework will be disbursed to them. In order to mitigate negative impacts on scheduled tribe persons, before and during the subproject design, implementation, as well as monitoring process, the project staff will enhance the dissemination of project information and conducting meaningful consultation especially with scheduled tribe persons to ensure that they get the maximum benefit from the advantage conditions brought by the subproject and fully understand their entitlements under this RIPP. No civil works will be allowed in sections of impact and compensation payment will be completed prior to start of civil works. Social safeguard requirements are included in the EMPs and bid documents.

31. Project design incorporates features for inclusion of 100% scheduled tribe families/households in the subproject coverage area in project benefits. No adverse impacts to the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems, or culture of indigenous peoples, or to the natural or cultural resources that indigenous peoples own, use, occupy, or claim as ancestral domain or an asset, are identified as a result of the proposed project. Contractual provisions will ensure that 100% scheduled tribe households in the coverage area will benefit from improved wastewater (sewerage system/FSSM) infrastructure. The socio-economic profile of the scheduled tribe community of Pratapgarh is presented in the next chapter.

32. **Specific Action Plan.** Further, to address any potential safeguards issues and ensure inclusion, a specific action plan for indigenous peoples is proposed for this subproject. The action plan will carry out the following specific activities: (i) a baseline survey¹⁶ will be conducted for identification and inclusion of indigenous peoples households within the project coverage area;¹⁷ (ii) proposed benefits (e.g. sewerage services) to indigenous peoples households will be shared and monitored; (iii) IEC materials, information sharing, consultations and other activities¹⁸ stated in the CAPP will be culturally sensitive and appropriate when implemented in the scheduled area; (iv) in case of any indigenous peoples impacts in subproject, the chief of the tribe or a member of the tribal council as traditional arbitrator (to ensure that traditional grievance redress systems are integrated) and an NGO working with indigenous peoples will be special invitees, when required. GRC will also ensure that grievance redress established is gender inclusive in receiving and facilitating resolution of the indigenous people's concerns; (v) consultations with IP households will be conducted in all subproject stages which shall help in identifying any culture-specific requirements and traditions like avoidance of any specific festival days, and/or other activities with cultural significance to the indigenous people communities during civil work; and any other indigenous people related issues and concerns that may be of importance to the community. An end-line sample survey¹⁹ will be conducted to document the views of indigenous people households about subproject benefits. Such survey is in line with subproject internal monitoring. The proposed action plan with activities, timelines and responsibilities is attached in **Appendix 18**. This action plan will be used for project monitoring

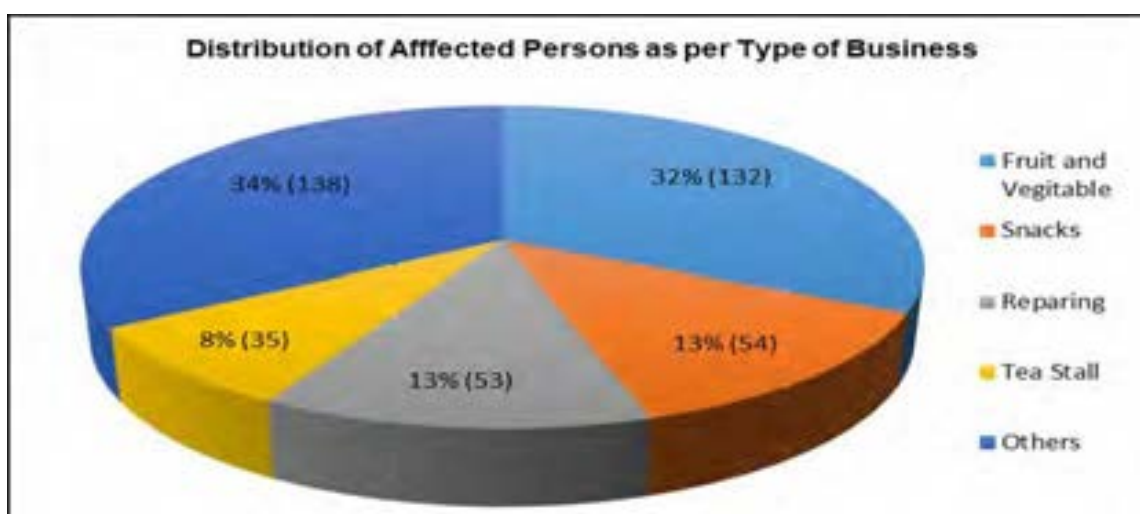

to ensure that indigenous people activities are undertaken on a timely basis and reported semi-annually and to determine whether project objectives have been achieved.

III. SOCIO-ECONOMIC INFORMATION AND PROFILE

33. Based on the inventory loss survey, 412 persons (non-titled movable structure vendors and traders) will potentially be affected under the subproject. About 36 % of affected persons belong to the vulnerable category. The survey provides information about the socio-economic conditions of affected households. A wide range of data including, social category, type of losses, type of occupation, sources of income, choice of resettlement etc. have been collected. The following sections present the socio-economic profile of the households likely to be affected by the proposed works.²⁰

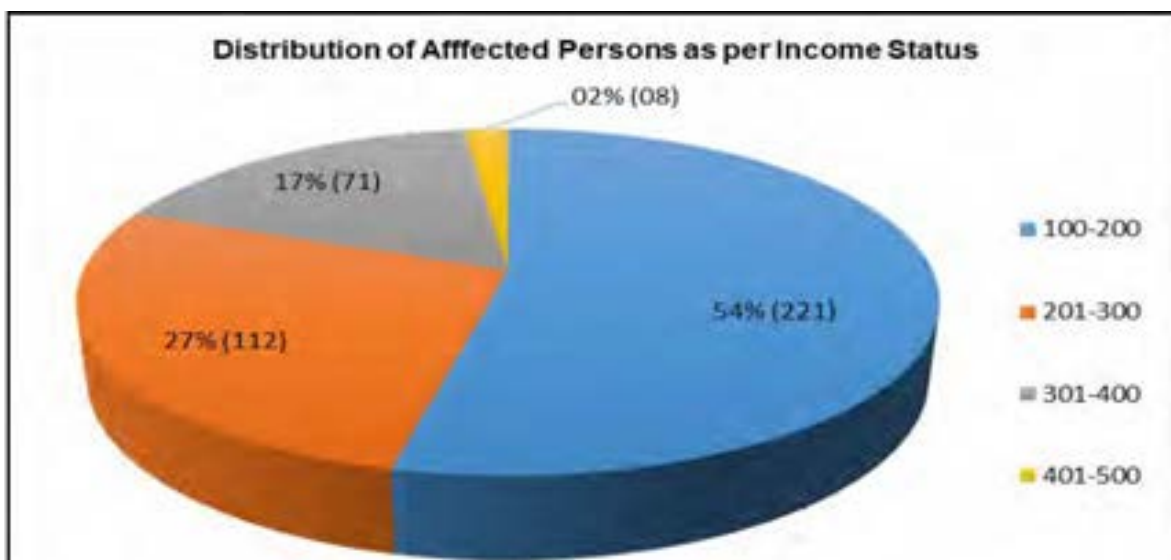
34. **Occupation:** Based on the census and socio-economic survey, a total of 412 affected persons whose businesses will be temporarily affected during pipe laying. These business activities are broadly classified and provided in the figure below. The primary business activities are (i) vegetable selling– about 32%; (ii) snacks- 13% (iii) vehicle repairing shops – 13%, and (iv) Tea Stall- 08% (V) Other occupations- 34%. Most of the affected persons having a movable structure while some of the affected persons sit on ROW of roads to sell their goods.



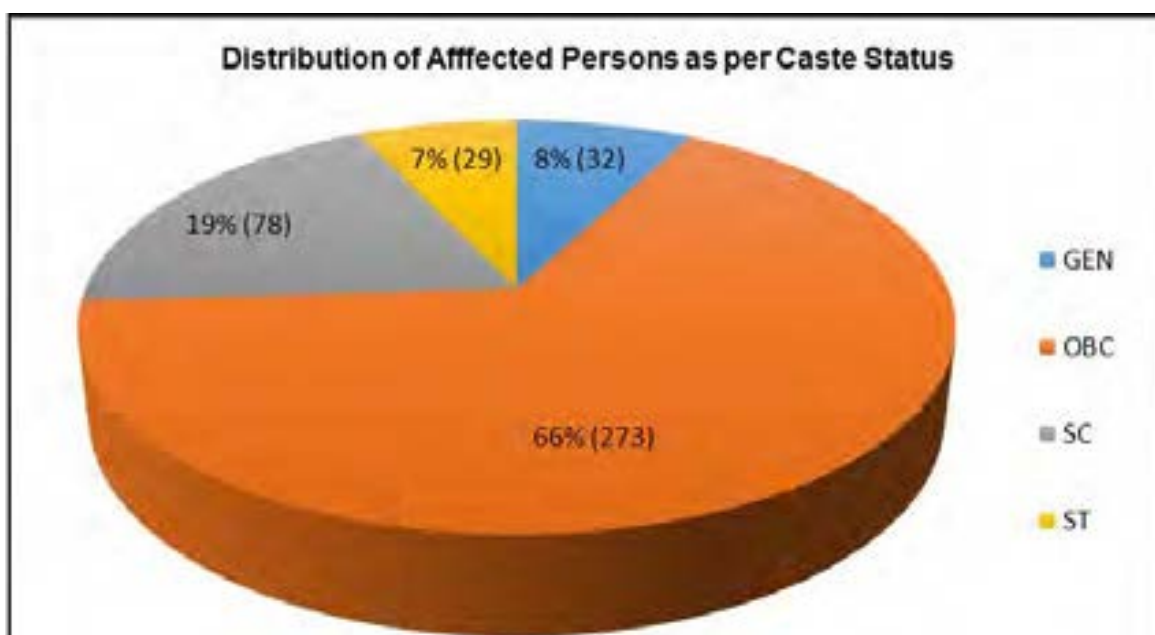
35. **Income Profile:** Based on the survey, 54% of households likely to be affected have an income of. 100-200 per day, while 27% of the households likely to be affected have an income of. 201-300, 17% of households likely to be affected have an income of 301-400 per day and 02% of households likely to be affected have an income of 401-500 per day. The average daily income is ₹ 256, higher than the declared government daily wage for unskilled categories of labor (semi-skilled and highly skilled).²¹

36. **Caste Profile:** Among the surveyed households, 8% of the affected persons belong to general castes, 66% belong to other backward castes (OBC), 19% belong to scheduled castes and 7% belong to scheduled tribe. It can be noted that Other Backward Castes (OBC) constitutes the majority in the social profile of affected persons in Pratapgarh, followed by the scheduled caste households.



of payment, allowance will be determined as per the daily income estimated based on census and socioeconomic survey (₹256 per day) or prevailing minimum wage rate as notified by Government of Rajasthan, whichever is higher.

38. **Profile of Indigenous Peoples in Pratapgarh.** The scheduled tribe population in Pratapgarh district is 550,427 which constitutes 63.42% of the total district population and 13.5% of the state's scheduled tribe population. The total population of Pratapgarh municipal area and other district towns is 71,807, of which, the scheduled tribe comprises 5,005 or 6.97%. Based on secondary data and field visits, it is ascertained that the scheduled tribe population is predominately based in rural areas. Further details are presented in Table 8 and 9. Total population of Pratapgarh Municipal area, consisting of 25 municipal wards is 42,079 out of which 3,459 (8.22%) belongs to scheduled tribe community.

39. Ward 1 has the highest concentration of scheduled tribe population (851 persons) followed by ward 20 which has 709 persons and about 486 persons from the scheduled tribe community live in ward 25. Five Municipal wards have no scheduled tribe population.

40. The district has registered an overall general literacy rate of 55.97% (which is lower than the State average 66.1%) in 2011. As regards to rural and urban areas of the district the overall general literacy rate has been registered as 53.20% and 84.78% respectively. Among the towns of Pratapgarh district, the highest literacy rate of 85.81 % has been attained by Pratapgarh Municipal town. Similarly, among the towns, scheduled tribe of Pratapgarh Municipality attained the highest literacy rate of 67.13% which is lower than the overall literacy rate (85.81%) of the town. Among all towns of the district, literacy rate of males and females from the scheduled tribe community of Pratapgarh Municipal area is 79.35% and 54.07% respectively; which are highest in the district. However, considerable difference in male female literacy among scheduled tribe (25.28%) is noticed in Pratapgarh town. This gender gap in literacy rate is also reflected among the total population; where overall general district male literacy is 69.5% and overall general female literacy is 42.4% reflecting gender gap of almost 27%.

41. Among the total number of literates from scheduled tribe community in Pratapgarh town, males constitute 61% and females 39% whereas out of the total illiterates; males constitute 41% and females constitute 59%.

42. In the district, 55.46% of the total population comprises total workers (main and marginal) and the rest 44.54% are non-workers. Out of the total male population, 57.50% are workers whereas among females, 53.38% are workers. Of the total scheduled tribe population in the district, 310,738 or 56.45% comprise workers, which is a little higher than the district rate. Similarly, 55.86% of males from scheduled tribe community are workers while as 57.05% of total females from scheduled tribe community are workers. Females from the scheduled tribe community exhibit greater participation in the work force (57.05%) compared to the overall female workforce participation (53.38%) of the district. However, percentage of males from the scheduled tribe community who are workers (55.86%) is a little lower than the district figure of 57.50%. The overall state work participation rate is 43.6%; for males the work participation rate is 51.5% while for females it is 35.1%.

IV. CONSULTATION, PARTICIPATION AND INFORMATION DISCLOSURE

A. Public Consultation

43. This updated RIPP was prepared in consultation with stakeholders. The key stakeholders consulted during RIPP preparation and updating include (i) affected persons, vulnerable households including scheduled tribe/indigenous people's groups; (ii) program beneficiaries (iii) elected representatives, community leaders, and representatives of community-based organizations; (iv) local government and relevant government agencies representatives; and (v) Program staff, PMU, PIU, and consultants. The key stakeholders were briefed them about the (i) technical details of project and project implementation cycle; (ii) the project benefits as well as adverse impacts envisaged during construction; (iii) environmental and social safeguards; (iv) gender inclusion; and, (v) community participation aspects built into the project. Consultations with affected persons during transect walks mainly included concerns such as traffic disruptions and impacts on livelihood. It was informed to survey affected persons that appropriate measures will be undertaken during construction to minimize impacts (including scheduling of activities during the early morning and reducing construction activities during the rush hour). It was also informed that, if despite mitigation measures, there would be any temporary impacts on livelihood; these would be compensated in accordance with the RIPP's entitlement matrix. Further consultations will also include focus group discussions (FGDs) and structured census surveys before the project implementation. Details of the consultations and the stakeholder meeting at town level minutes are attached in **Appendix 20, 21 and 22**.

B. Information Disclosure

44. The draft RIPP was disclosed on ADB and the RSTDSP websites and this updated version will also be disclosed similarly. This RIPP will also be available in key local/state government offices. As the subproject works are ongoing implementation and construction schedules are being informed to all residents prior to the commencement of pipe laying, through signboards. The signboards displayed at sites contains start and end dates of construction work at the location contact information for questions/grievances. During updating of RIPP, cut-off-date for temporary impacts was communicated in the entire affected area at the start of the census survey and also list of potential affected persons was displayed area wise on dated 25 March 2021. Copy of cut off date declaration and photographs of cut off date as displayed in multiple areas of Pratapgarh, is attached in **Appendix 23 and 24**. Such information sharing will facilitate affected persons to have access to lists in their area and resolve issues around any duplication, missing person/absentee from the list. RIPP/IEC materials will be translated into Hindi and will be disclosed/discussed with affected persons and beneficiaries, including those who cannot read in Hindi and/or their local dialect.

C. Continued Consultation and Participation

45. Consultation and disclosure have been a continuous process since the beginning of the project. Information dissemination is being carried out and will be continued throughout the project cycle. The project management consultants have already conducted training of contractor's representative such as engineers as well as safeguards personnel regarding the safeguard and other public outreach activities; refer **Appendix 25**. General community groups including the scheduled tribes were consulted and information disseminated about the civil works and project activities, anticipated impacts and mitigation measures, grievance redress process. The PMU, with the support of community awareness and public participation consultant (CAPPC), are designing and conduct a public awareness campaign which shall target all citizens including scheduled tribe communities during project implementation. The consultation and participation consultant is responsible to prepare and implement of community awareness activities and include scheduled tribe communities in such activities.²⁵

V. GRIEVANCE REDRESS MECHANISM

46. A project-specific, three-tier grievance redress mechanism (GRM) covers both environmental and social issues. The GRM has been established to receive, evaluate, and facilitate the resolution of affected persons' concerns, complaints, and grievances about the social and environmental performance at the project level. The GRM will aim to provide a time-bound and transparent mechanism to voice and resolve social and environmental concerns related to the project. Assessment of the GRM designed and implemented for the Rajasthan Urban Sector Development Program (RUSDP)²⁶ shows that the system effectively resolves

47. Common GRM. A common GRM has been formed for social, environmental, or any other grievances related to the project. The GRM is to provide an accessible and trusted platform for receiving and facilitating resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the project. The implementation of this resettlement plan follows the GRM described below.

48. Public awareness campaigns within entire ULB/Municipal area will ensure that awareness on grievance redress procedures is generated. The nodal officer- safeguards and gender supported by ASO at zonal level, will oversee the conduct of ULB/project coverage area-based awareness campaigns by the town-level safeguards and safety officers, through the CAPPC. The awareness campaigns will ensure that poor and vulnerable households are made aware of grievance redress procedures and entitlements. Contractors will provide pamphlets to communities prior to start of works and billboards during construction. The pamphlets and billboards will include relevant environmental and social safeguards, GRM information, and contact details of key personnel from PIU and contractors.

49. Affected persons will have the flexibility of conveying grievances/suggestions by dropping grievance redress/suggestion forms in complaint/suggestion boxes that will be installed by project PIUs or by e-mail, by post, or by writing in a complaints register in ULB offices/complaints register at contractor's work site²⁹ or by sending a WhatsApp message to the PIU³⁰ or by dialling the phone number of town level PIU/CAPPC or by dialling a toll-free number.³¹ Any aggrieved person can also avail the facilities of online grievance monitoring system 'Rajasthan Sampark' portal to register their grievances which is a parallel mechanism of grievance registration, in addition to the project GRM.³² Careful documentation of the name of the complainant, date of receipt of the complaint, address/contact details of the person, location

contractors. Complaints received were immediately referred by the CAPC/PMDSC supervision staff to the PIU Nodal officer (safeguards) and concerned engineer at PIU, who advised them on further action. Follow up with the contractor on complaint resolution was undertaken by PIU Nodal officer CAPC and PMDSC and final feedback sought from complainant upon resolution. Complaints requiring inter-departmental coordination were referred to the PMU for resolution, and feedback provided to complainant. The PMU kept regular track of grievances through WhatsApp and email alerts, ensuring registration and follow-up until resolution.

of the problem area, and how the problem was resolved will be undertaken and feedback provided to the complainant on action/decision taken. The SSO of town/city level PIU will have the overall responsibility for timely grievance redressal on environmental and social safeguards issues and for registration of grievances, related disclosure, with the assistance of project consultants. In case of grievances that are immediate and urgent in the perception of the complainant, the contractor, and officials of PIU with assistance from CMSC and CAPPC on-site will provide the most easily accessible or first level of contact for quick resolution of grievances. Contact numbers and names of the concerned PIU safeguard and safety officer, contractors, CAPPC and CMSC personnel will be posted at all construction sites at visible locations.

- (i) **1st level grievance.** The contractors, PIU executive engineer /assistant engineer designated as SSO (social and environment), CMSC (safeguard staff) and CAPPC can immediately resolve issues on-site, in consultation with each other and will be required to do so within 7 days of receipt of a complaint/grievance. If required, city level monitoring committee (CLMC)³³ will be involved in resolution of grievances at the 1st level;
- (ii) **2nd level grievance.** All grievances that cannot be redressed within 7 days at field/PIU level will be brought to the notice of Zonal PIU headed by Additional Chief Engineer (ACE). The ACE at zonal PIU will resolve the grievance within 7 days of receipt of complaint/grievance in discussion with the assistant safeguard officer (ASO), field level PIU, CMSC, CAPPC and the contractor;
- (iii) **3rd level grievance.** All the grievances that are not addressed by Zonal PIU within 7 days of receipt will be brought to the notice of the PMU. Depending on the nature of grievance, the Project Officer (Social/Environment) at PMU will resolve the grievance within 15 days of receipt of grievance with necessary coordination of Zonal PIU and CMSC and guidance/instruction of additional project director (APD-PMU).

50. Grievances not redressed through this process within/at the project level within stipulated time period will be referred to the CLC/grievance redress committee (GRC), which has been set up.³⁴ In its role as a GRC, the CLC will meet whenever there is an urgent, pending grievance. Other grievances can be discussed during its regular meetings. Zonal PIU will inform the CLC regarding any grievances required to be resolved urgently. The GRC will resolve the grievance within 15 days of receiving the complaint. In case of any indigenous peoples impacts in subprojects, the CLC/GRC must have representation of the affected indigenous people community, the chief of the tribe or a member of the tribal council as traditional arbitrator (to ensure that traditional grievance redress systems are integrated) and an NGO working with

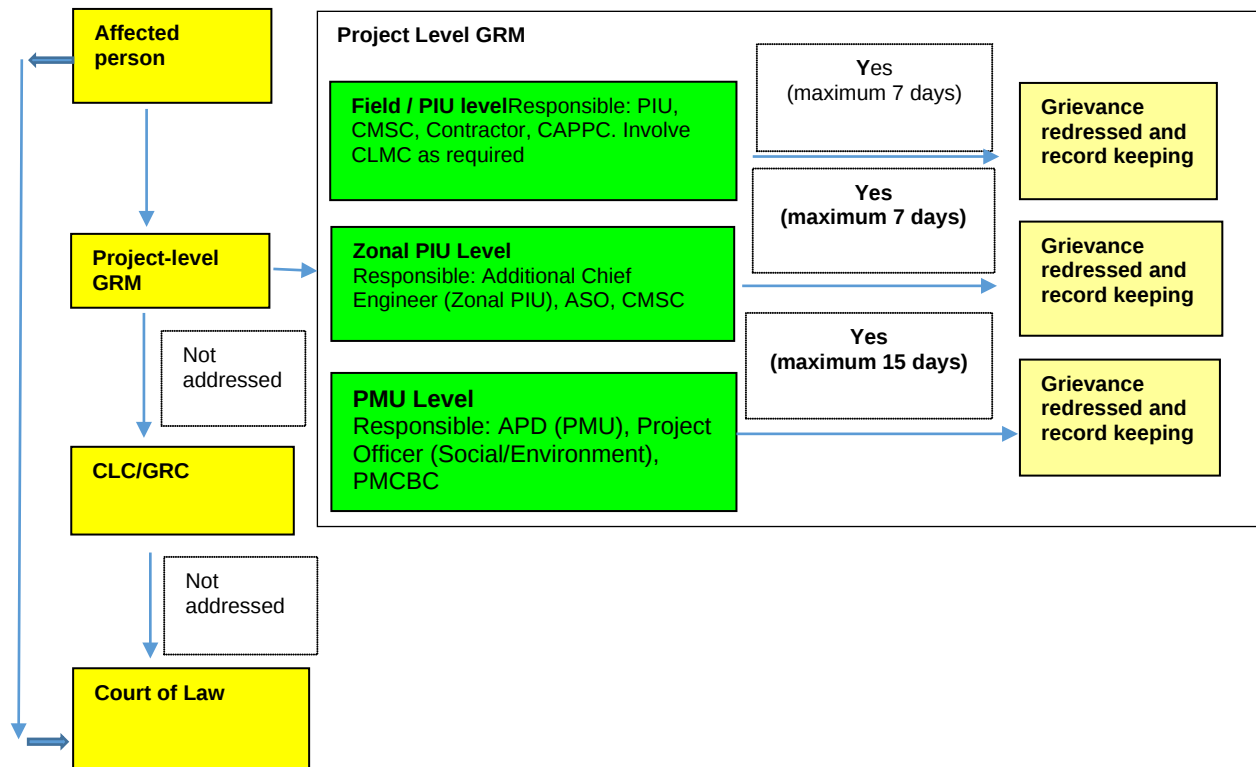

indigenous people groups. GRC will also ensure that grievance mechanism established is gender inclusive in receiving and facilitating resolution of the IPs' concerns.

51. The multi-tier GRM for the project is outlined below (Figure 7), each tier having time-bound schedules and with responsible persons identified to address grievances and seek appropriate persons' advice at each stage, as required. The GRC will continue to function throughout the project duration.

52. The project GRM notwithstanding, an aggrieved person shall have access to the country's legal system at any stage and accessing the country's legal system can run parallel to accessing the GRM and is not dependent on the negative outcome of the GRM. In case of grievance related to land acquisition, resettlement and rehabilitation,³⁵ the affected persons will have to approach a legal body/court specially proposed under RFCTLARRA, 2013;³⁶

53. People who are, or may in the future be, adversely affected by the project may submit complaints to ADB's Accountability Mechanism. The Accountability Mechanism provides an independent forum and process whereby people adversely affected by ADB-assisted projects can voice, and seek a resolution of their problems, as well as report alleged violations of ADB's operational policies and procedures. Before submitting a complaint to the Accountability Mechanism, affected people should make an effort in good faith to solve their problems by working with the concerned ADB operations department. Only after doing that, and if they are still dissatisfied, should they approach the Accountability Mechanism.³⁷

54. **Record-keeping.** The PIU town level will keep records of grievances received, including contact details of complainant, date the complaint was received, nature of grievance, agreed corrective actions and the date these were affected and final outcome. The number of grievances recorded and resolved, and the outcomes will be displayed/disclosed in the PMU office, PIU offices, and on websites, as well as reported in monitoring reports submitted to ADB on a semi-annual basis. The sample Grievance registration format is attached as **Appendix 26**.

55. **Periodic review and documentation of lessons learned.** The PMU Project Officer (Social and Environment) will periodically review the functioning of the GRM in each town and record information on the effectiveness of the mechanism, especially on the project's ability to prevent and address grievances.

56. **Costs.** All costs involved in resolving the complaints (meetings, consultations, communication and reporting/information dissemination) will be borne by the concerned PIU at town level while costs related to escalated grievances will be met by the PMU. Cost estimates for grievance redress are included in resettlement cost estimates.

57. Office order of PMU was issued to all PIUs/CMSC to follow the grievance redress mechanism (**Appendix 27**). Contractor has also shared a toll free number with the households through their social outreach team for lodging of complain/grievance, if any during execution of works.

VI. POLICY AND LEGAL FRAMEWORK

58. The policy framework and entitlements for the RSTDSP are based on:

Chief Justice of the High Court within the Project jurisdiction. S/He shall hold the officer for three years and shall be supported by Registrar and other officers. The Authority shall, for the purposes of its functions under this Act, shall have the same powers as are vested in a civil court under the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908. Authority (GRS) shall dispose any matter received within six months. All proceedings before Authority shall be judicial proceedings and shall take place in public. No civil court (other than High Court or the Supreme Court) shall have jurisdiction to entertain any dispute relating to land acquisition in respect of which the Collector or the Authority is empowered by or under this Act, and no injunction shall be granted by any court in respect of any such matter. Applications first go to Collector and within 30 days he can refer (if required) to the Authority. Such application can be made within six weeks by the applicant (if he or representative is personally present) after the date of award, and in other cases within six months. Collector may also accept any application within one year if feels appropriate. Interests are payable for delayed and excess payments. Payment of award into their bank accounts. Any disputed payments etc. shall be deposited with the Authority.

- (i) the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act (RFCTLARRA), 2013;³⁸
- (ii) ADB's Safeguard Policy Statement (SPS), 2009. The salient features of Government and ADB policies are summarized below. The involuntary resettlement principles and procedures to be followed for social safeguards under RSTDSP are detailed out in the resettlement framework.

59. The key involuntary resettlement principles of the ADB Safeguards Policy Statement (2009) are:

- (i) Screen the project early on to identify past, present, and future involuntary resettlement impacts and risks. Determine the scope of resettlement planning through a survey and/or census of displaced persons, including a gender analysis, specifically related to resettlement impacts and risks;
- (ii) Carry out meaningful consultations with affected persons, host communities, and concerned nongovernment organizations. Inform all displaced persons of their entitlements and resettlement options. Ensure their participation in planning, implementation, and monitoring and evaluation of resettlement programs. Pay particular attention to the needs of vulnerable groups, especially those below the poverty line, the landless, the elderly, women and children, and Indigenous Peoples, and those without legal title to land, and ensure their participation in consultations. Establish a grievance redress mechanism to receive and facilitate resolution of the affected persons' concerns. Support the social and cultural institutions of displaced persons and their host population. Where involuntary resettlement impacts and risks are highly complex and sensitive, compensation and resettlement decisions should be preceded by a social preparation phase;
- (iii) Improve, or at least restore, the livelihoods of all displaced persons through (i) land-based resettlement strategies when affected livelihoods are land based where possible or cash compensation at replacement value for land when the loss of land does not undermine livelihoods, (ii) prompt replacement of assets with access to assets of equal or higher value, (iii) prompt compensation at full replacement cost for assets that cannot be restored, and (iv) additional revenues and services through benefit sharing schemes where possible;
- (iv) Provide physically and economically displaced persons with needed assistance, including the following: (i) if there is relocation, secured tenure to relocation land, better housing at resettlement sites with comparable access to employment and production opportunities, integration of resettled persons economically and socially into their host communities, and extension of project benefits to host communities; (ii) transitional support and development assistance, such as land development, credit facilities, training, or employment opportunities; and (iii) civic infrastructure and community services, as required;
- (v) Improve the standards of living of the displaced poor and other vulnerable groups, including women, to at least national minimum standards. In rural areas provide them with legal and affordable access to land and resources, and in urban areas provide them with appropriate income sources and legal and affordable access to adequate housing;
- (vi) Develop procedures in a transparent, consistent, and equitable manner if land acquisition is through negotiated settlement to ensure that those people who

- enter into negotiated settlements will maintain the same or better income and livelihood status;
- (vii) Ensure that displaced persons without titles to land or any recognizable legal rights to land are eligible for resettlement assistance and compensation for loss of nonland assets;
- (viii) Prepare a RIPP elaborating on displaced persons' entitlements, the income and livelihood restoration strategy, institutional arrangements, monitoring and reporting framework, budget, and time-bound implementation schedule;
- (ix) Disclose a draft RIPP, including documentation of the consultation process in a timely manner, before project appraisal, in an accessible place and a form and language(s) understandable to affected persons and other stakeholders. Disclose the final RIPP and its updates to affected persons and other stakeholders;
- (x) Conceive and execute involuntary resettlement as part of a development project or program. Include the full costs of resettlement in the presentation of project's costs and benefits. For a project with significant involuntary resettlement impacts, consider implementing the involuntary resettlement component of the project as a stand-alone operation;
- (xi) Pay compensation and provide other resettlement entitlements before physical or economic displacement. Implement the RIPP under close supervision throughout project implementation;
- (xii) Monitor and assess resettlement outcomes, their impacts on the standards of living of displaced persons, and whether the objectives of the RIPP have been achieved by taking into account the baseline conditions and the results of resettlement monitoring. Disclose monitoring reports.

60. Core involuntary resettlement principles for the RSTDSP to be followed for each subproject, including sample subprojects are:

- (i) land acquisition, and other involuntary resettlement impacts will be avoided or minimized exploring all viable alternative sub-project designs;
- (ii) adverse impacts to indigenous peoples' dignity, human rights, livelihood systems and culture as well as to the natural and cultural resources of indigenous peoples will be avoided;
- (iii) where unavoidable, time-bound RIPP/PPs will be prepared and affected persons will be assisted in improving or at least regaining their pre-program standard of living;
- (iv) full information and close consultations with APs including consultation with affected persons on compensation, disclosure of resettlement information to affected persons, and participation of affected persons in planning and implementing sub-projects will be ensured;
- (v) vulnerable groups will be provided special assistance; beneficial impacts to indigenous peoples will be ensured through special measures identified in the RIPP, if any;
- (vi) payment of compensation to affected persons including non-titled persons (e.g., informal dwellers/squatters, and encroachers) for acquired assets at replacement rates;
- (vii) payment of compensation and resettlement assistance prior to the contractor taking physical acquisition of the land and prior to the commencement of any construction activities;
- (viii) provision of income restoration and rehabilitation; and

- (ix) Establishment of appropriate grievance redress mechanisms.

VII. ENTITLEMENTS, ASSISTANCE AND BENEFITS

A. Types of Losses and Affected Person Category

61. The types of involuntary resettlement impacts and losses³⁹ due to the proposed subproject components under RSTDSP comprise: (i) potential temporary income loss to vendors due to access disruption (ii) impacts to vulnerable persons (from amongst the affected persons).

62. According to ADB SPS, 2009 in the context of involuntary resettlement vis-à-vis economic impacts, affected persons (APs) are those who are economically displaced (loss of productive land, structures, assets, access to assets, income sources, or means of livelihood). The absence of formal and legal title to the land does not bar the affected person from receipt of compensation and resettlement assistance from the project. Vulnerable affected persons including scheduled tribes are eligible for additional compensation and assistance and are to be accorded priority in employment in project related construction activities.

B. Entitlements

63. As per agreed resettlement framework, all the affected persons will be eligible for compensation for loss of livelihood/income including temporary income loss. Unavoidable livelihood disruption due to construction activities will be compensated. For this subproject, the maximum estimated period of disruption during pipe laying activities is 14 days. Compensation for lost income (temporary loss) will be paid for a minimum of 14 days or for the period of disruption, whichever is greater. In case the period of disruption is greater than 14 days, the affected persons will be compensated based on the actual days of disruption. All affected persons will also be compensated for the time lag (7% annual inflation in survey income is provisioned) between payment of compensation and the time of survey. 'Shifting assistance' (lumpsum ₹ 1500) will be paid to all affected persons irrespective of their business type. All affected persons who are identified as vulnerable will be eligible for special assistance amounting to ₹ 9,000 as one-time assistances under temporary impacts for livelihood restoration.

64. All affected persons who are identified in the subproject areas on the cut-off date⁴⁰ will be entitled to compensation for their loss, and rehabilitation measures (as outlined in the entitlement matrix below) sufficient to assist them to improve or at least maintain their pre project living standards, income-earning capacity and production levels. Persons/vendors who settle in the affected areas after the cut-off date **25 March 2021** will not be eligible for compensation and assistance.⁴¹ Affected persons will be provided 30 days advance notice to ensure no or minimal disruption in livelihood. If required, they will also be assisted to temporarily

shift for continued economic activity. For example, they will be assisted to shift to the other side of the road where there is no construction. Ensuring there is no income or access loss during subproject construction is the responsibility of contractors.

65. Work will be undertaken on one side of the road and temporarily affected person (APs) will be assisted in moving to the other side of the road and returning their structures after construction is completed. Where moving is not required, access will be ensured by the contractor through measures prescribed in bidding documents/environmental management plan (EMP). An alternate place in the vicinity will also be identified where more number of affected persons are affected at one place (e.g. vegetable market) so that they can continue with their livelihood activities.

66. If construction activities lead to unavoidable livelihood disruption, compensation for lost income or a transitional allowance for the period of disruption whichever is greater will be provided. Affected persons identified as vulnerable including scheduled tribe persons, will be given priority in project construction employment and provided with additional special assistance for income restoration support. Compensation and assistance to affected persons must be made prior to possession of land/assets and prior to the award of civil works contracts. Since most affected households have moveable stalls, identity card (ID) cards should be distributed 30 days before compensation. In summary, temporarily affected persons will be provided with:

- (i) 30 days' advance notice regarding construction activities, including duration and type of disruption.
- (ii) Contractor's actions to ensure there is no income/access loss consistent with the initial environmental examination. This includes: leaving spaces for access between mounds of soil, providing walkways and metal sheets to maintain access across trenches for people and vehicles where required, increased workforces to finish work in areas with impacts on access, timing of works to reduce disruption during business hours, phased construction schedule and working one segment at a time and one side of the road at a time.
- (iii) Assistance to mobile vendors/hawkers to temporarily shift for continued economic activity. For example, assistance to shift to the other side of the road where there is no construction.
- (iv) For construction activities involving unavoidable livelihood disruption, compensation for lost income or a transitional allowance for the period of disruption whichever is greater.

VIII. RESETTLEMENT BUDGET AND FINANCING PLAN

67. The resettlement budget for Pratapgarh Wastewater subproject components includes resettlement assistance, as outlined in the entitlement matrix and contingency provision amounting to 20% of the total cost, as given in Table 12. CAPPCC will be involved in facilitating the disbursement process and will facilitate opening of bank accounts for the affected persons who do not have bank accounts. The costs are conservative estimates and will be confirmed during detailed project report preparation. The total resettlement cost for the subproject is ₹4611929/-.⁴⁷ PIU will be issuing order to make payments to affected persons through ECS/NEFT transaction from bank through concerned Treasury.

68. Details of RIPP budget estimate:

- (i) **Total number of affected persons** – Total 412 persons have been identified as affected persons during income loss survey. Temporary income loss is anticipated for 14 days for each affected person under this subproject.
- (ii) **Total number of vulnerable affected persons** –As per socio-economic survey 148 affected persons are identified under vulnerable category. Vulnerability assistance as per the entitlement matrix of RSTDSP is ₹ 9,000 per vulnerable affected person.
- (iii) **Computation of daily income loss** – as per initial survey the total income per day of all surveyed affected persons is ₹ 105650 and accordingly, an average of

- (iv) **Shifting assistance** (considered for all affected persons). – Based on nature of business of affected person, a uniform amount of ₹ 1500 is proposed as shifting assistance.
- (v) **Specific action plan.** Estimated costs related to implementation of the specific action plan for indigenous peoples.
- (vi) **20% contingency** is also included in budgetary provisions as cushion for any unforeseen impacts during execution of civil works and to cover for any increase in the number of affected persons or vulnerable affected persons during detailed design stage.

IX. INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS AND IMPLEMENTATION SCHEDULE

A. Institutional Arrangements

69. Local Self Government Department, Government of Rajasthan is the executing agency of the Project. The department is responsible for overall strategic guidance and for ensuring compliance with ADB's loan covenants. RUDSICO is the implementing agency for the RSTDSP responsible for technical supervision and project implementation. The RUDSICO Board under the Chairmanship of the Minister for Urban Development, and members comprising of the Chief Secretary, Secretaries of LSGD, Finance, Planning, Public Works Department (PWD), public health engineering department (PHED) and the project director, RUIDP as member secretary. It shall have full powers to decide on matters related to RSTDSP. The Board will take needful policy decisions, provide administrative and financial approvals, expedite clearances of project matters, ensure inter-departmental coordination and provide guidance to the PMU. As Per government order (GO) dated 21 Feb 2018, all powers and responsibilities of earlier state level empowered committee (SLEC, under RUIDP Phase III) have now been transferred to RUDSICO Board.

70. RUDSICO already established a state-level PMU, headed by dedicated project director, and housed in EAP division of RUDSICO. For the purpose of project implementation, 2 zonal PIUs, at Jaipur and Jodhpur, headed by ACE has been established. At field level, town-level PIUs also established for project implementation on ground.

B. Safeguard Implementation Arrangement

71. **Project management unit.** RUDSICO established a state-level PMU, headed by dedicated project director, and housed in EAP division of RUDSICO. For the purpose of project implementation, 2 zonal PIUs, at Jaipur and Jodhpur, headed by ACE has been established. At PMU, there are 2 dedicated project officers: (i) project officer (Environment); and (ii) project officer (Social and Gender), who are responsible for compliance with the environmental, social safeguards and gender in project implementation. Project officer (social and gender) have an overall responsibility in implementation of the RSTDSP as per the social safeguards frameworks (resettlement framework and indigenous people planning framework [IPPF]) and gender equality and social inclusion (GESI) Action Plan agreed between ADB and the government, including appropriate monitoring and reporting responsibilities. Project Officer (Social and Gender) at the PMU is supported by the SSS and the gender specialist of PMCBC. Key safeguard and gender mainstreaming related tasks and responsibilities at the PMU level are as follows:

72. Social Safeguards and Gender

- (i) Ensure subprojects conform to the agreed subproject selection criteria for the project;
- (ii) Review and finalize subproject involuntary resettlement and indigenous people category;
- (iii) Oversee preparation of resettlement plans, DDRs, and indigenous people plans (IPPs); confirm existing resettlement plans, DDRs, and IPPs are updated based on detailed designs, and that new subproject resettlement plans, DDRs are prepared in accordance with the resettlement framework and IPPF prepared for the project;

- (iv) Liaise with district administration for land acquisition, transfers; ensuring land availability;
- (v) Ensure that resettlement plans, DDRs, and IPPs are included in the bidding documents and civil works contracts;
- (vi) Provide oversight on social safeguard management aspects of subprojects and facilitate and follow-up to ensure that any delays in land procurement are addressed;
- (vii) Ensure and monitor the provision in the contract to include the indigenous people to benefit from the facilities constructed under the project;
- (viii) Facilitate and ensure compliance with all government rules and regulations regarding no objection certificates, third party certificates for negotiated settlement or donation, land ownership, and transfer details for each site, as relevant;
- (ix) Supervise and guide the zonal PIUs and city level PIUs to properly carry out the social safeguard monitoring;
- (x) Review, monitor, and evaluate the effectiveness with which the resettlement plans, IPPs, and provisions of DDRs are implemented, and recommend corrective actions to be taken as necessary;
- (xi) Consolidate monthly social safeguard and gender monitoring reports from PIUs and the CMSCs and submit semi-annual social safeguard monitoring reports to ADB;
- (xii) Ensure timely disclosure of final resettlement plans, DDRs, and IPPs in locations and form accessible to the public and affected persons;
- (xiii) Address any grievances brought about through the grievance redress mechanism promptly;
- (xiv) Oversee the assessment of training needs of affected persons and vulnerable persons by PIUs and/or PMCBC, coordinate training activities and convergence with the livelihood programs of the government;
- (xv) Ensure effective implementation of GRM at all levels;
- (xvi) Coordinate database management for social safeguards implementation and monitoring;
- (xvii) Coordinate public awareness campaigns by the PIUs including resettlement provisions with the help of print and electronic media; and
- (xviii) Serve as Gender Focal Point at PMU, which would involve overseeing - with the support of PMCBC, the implementation, monitoring and reporting on the GESI action plan.

73. The PMU is being supported by three institutional consultants under the supervision and control of project director, PMU: (i) the PMCBC is supporting the PMU; (ii) 2 CMSC are supporting the 2 zonal PIUs and town-level PIUs; and (iii) community awareness and public participation (CAPP) Consultants, will support the zonal PIUs and town-level PIUs.⁵¹

74. **Zonal Project implementation units.** There will be 2 zonal level PIUs at Jaipur and Jodhpur. Under each zonal PIU, there are city/town level PIUs, for ease of day-to-day monitoring and management at local level. The Additional Chief Engineer at each Zonal PIU is serving as the Nodal Officer, Safeguards and Gender. Each Zonal PIU have an assistant safeguards officer (ASO Environmental and Social Safeguards) who are assisting PMU project officer (environment/social) in implementation of the environmental/social safeguards and GESI

action plan in PIUs under its jurisdiction. Zonal PIUs will undertake internal monitoring and supervision and record observations throughout the project period to ensure that the safeguards and mitigation measures are provided as intended.

75. The zonal level ASO will oversee safeguards implementation by the city/town level PIUs, coordinate public consultations, information disclosure, regulatory clearances and approvals, implementation of resettlement plans, EMP implementation, and grievance redressal.

76. The Zonal PIUs will oversee and support social safeguards and gender equality and social inclusion action plan implementation by the PIUs at town/city level, through the following key tasks:

- (i) fill up involuntary resettlement and indigenous people impact checklist and classify the project;
- (ii) supervise CMSC to coordinate with PIUs and safeguards field staff for conduct census and socio-economic surveys, detailed measurement surveys, and verification surveys of affected persons, conduct consultations with affected persons, finalize the list of affected persons, prepare and/or update the resettlement plan, DDR, RIPP/IPP with the assistance of CMSC and submit to PMU for review and approval and submission to ADB;
- (iii) supervise PIUs to inform affected persons about (a) the project cut-off date; (b) public notice for the schedule of land acquisition and/or occupation; (c) entitlement matrix; and (d) compensation packages against different categories of loss and a tentative schedule of land clearing and/or acquisition for the start of civil works activities;
- (iv) coordinate valuation of assets, such as land and trees of various species. Finalize compensation packages based on proper due diligence and assessment;
- (v) facilitate land acquisition and compensation processes in consultation with the district administration; coordinate, supervise, and monitor the disbursement of compensation;
- (vi) Support PIUs to obtain no objection certificates, land documents, and third-party certifications as required for the subproject, in coordination with PIUs;
- (vii) support PMU to include resettlement plans, IPPs, RIPPs and DDRs in bidding documents and civil works contracts;
- (viii) guide PIUs to oversee implementation of avoidance and mitigation measures in the resettlement plans, DDRs, RIPPs and IPPs by contractors, including compliance with all government rules and regulations; take necessary action for obtaining ROW;
- (ix) guide and monitor PIUs to oversee resettlement plans, DDR, RIPP and IPP, and gender equality and social inclusion action plan implementation and maintenance of data for monitoring by contractors;
- (x) ensure listing of town wise BPL households;
- (xi) assist in conducting needs assessment to list skills relevant to the sector;
- (xii) assist to identify participants for livelihood and skilling training for women and members of other vulnerable groups;
- (xiii) ensure that the project maintains sex disaggregated data on staff, consultants, construction workforce participation, labor and project related trainings;
- (xiv) ensure that gender focal points are nominated in town level PIUs;
- (xv) ensure and monitor the provision in the contract to include the indigenous people to benefit from the facilities constructed under the project;

- (xvi) to ensure that corrective actions are taken when necessary to ensure compliance with SPS and loan covenants;
- (xvii) submit monthly social monitoring reports to PIUs and PMU;
- (xviii) guide PIUs to conduct continuous public consultation and awareness;
- (xix) address any grievances brought about through the grievance redress mechanism promptly;
- (xx) organize an induction course for the training of contractors, preparing them on RPs, DDR, IPP, and gender equality and social inclusion action plan implementation, social safeguard, and gender monitoring requirements related to mitigation measures, grievance redress mechanism and on taking immediate action to remedy unexpected adverse impacts or ineffective mitigation measures found during implementation;
- (xxi) liaise with the district administration, and line departments for dovetailing government's schemes for income generation and development programs for affected people, as and when required; and
- (xxii) assist in the implementation, monitoring, and reporting progress of gender equality and social inclusion action plan.

77. Town/City Level Project Implementation Unit. The town-level PIU is responsible for the quality of works executed under the project and are being guided by the zonal PIUs. The city/town PIUs is also responsible for implementation of the RIPP/GESI action plan. The town-level PIU is headed by a project manager (Superintendent Engineer/executive engineer or assistant engineer) and supported by CMSC field staff. Environment specialist of CMSC is assisting PIU in implementation of environmental safeguard. Social and gender specialist of CMSC assisting PIU in implementation of social safeguard and GESI related tasks. At each PIU, the assistant project manager is given additional responsibilities of safeguard tasks and is designated as SSO. The SSO is being assisted by the social and gender specialist and environment Specialist of CMSC in reviewing updated/revised IEEs, conducting surveys for updating of resettlement plan/due diligence report, public consultation and disclosure, assessment of entitlement and computation of compensation other than those covered under the RFCTLARRA, 2013, etc. The SSO, with the support of CMSC Social safeguards and Gender Specialist and CMSC field support staff, will assist Zonal ASO and PMU project officer (social) in implementation of the following key tasks. They will also be responsible for coordination of field level activities related to safeguards conducted by the DBO contractor and CMSC. Key role and tasks of town/city level PIU will be:

- (i) Provide field data to fill up IR/IP impact checklist and classify the project;
- (ii) Conduct census and socio-economic surveys, detailed measurement surveys, and verification surveys of affected persons, conduct consultations with affected persons, prepare list of affected persons, provide all data required to prepare/update resettlement plans/DDR/RIPPs/PPs with the assistance of CMSC field support, and ensure updated information is submitted to zonal PIU for preparation/updating of documents with CMSC and DBO contractor's support;
- (iii) Inform affected persons about tentative schedule of land acquisition/occupation, entitlement matrix and compensation packages against different categories of loss, and cut-off date;
- (iv) Coordinate valuation of assets, such as land, trees of various species, etc. Based on proper due diligence and assessment, prepare compensation packages;
- (v) Coordinate, supervise and monitor disbursement of compensation;
- (vi) Obtain no objection certificates (NOCs), land documents, third party certifications as required for the subproject;

- (vii) Support Zonal PIUs to prepare/update RPs/RIPPs/IPPs/DDRs;
- (viii) Oversee day-to-day implementation of impact avoidance and mitigation measures in RIPP and EMP by contractors, including compliance with all government rules and regulations particularly health and safety, take necessary action for obtaining ROW;
- (ix) Oversee maintenance of data for monitoring, by consultants and contractors;
- (x) Implement corrective actions when necessary to ensure no adverse social impacts;
- (xi) Submit monthly social monitoring reports to zonal PIU;
- (xii) Conduct continuous public consultation and awareness;
- (xiii) Set up GRM at field/site/PIU level and ensure it is fully functional. Address any grievances brought about through the grievance redress mechanism in a timely manner;
- (xiv) Ensure that induction course for the training of contractors is conducted regularly. Prepare contractors (with consultants' support) on RIPP/GAP implementation, social safeguard and gender monitoring requirements related to mitigation measures, health and safety and on taking immediate action to remedy unexpected adverse impacts or ineffective mitigation measures found during the course of implementation;
- (xv) Liaise with the District Administration and line departments for dovetailing Government's schemes for income generation and development programs for affected persons, as and when required;
- (xvi) Supervise the work of all consultants at town level (CMSC, CAPPC).
- (xvii) Undertake day-to-day implementation of final resettlement plans and GESI action plan;
- (xviii) Provide field level information required to prepare periodic safeguard monitoring reports in a format acceptable to ADB and quarterly GESI action plan updates in the format provided in PAM;
- (xix) Ensure relevant data on implementation of GESI action plan is collected and a gender-sensitive communication strategy and information, education and communication (IEC) materials are designed, illustrating key social and behavioural messages related to hygiene, sanitation, and health jointly with the communication specialist and in accordance with the GESI action plan; and
- (xx) Extend support in carrying out awareness campaigns in project towns.

78. **Design-build-operate Contractor.** The contractor is responsible for providing final design (including pipe alignments) to the supervision consultant for finalization/updating of RIPP. The contractor has appointed an environment, health and safety (EHS) supervisor along with safety stewards and social outreach team (SOT) who are responsible on a day-to-day basis for (i) ensuring implementation of EMP, (ii) coordinating with the town-level PIUs and environment specialists of project consultant teams; (iii) community liaison,⁵² consultations with interested/affected people, (iv) field-level grievance redress; and (iv) reporting.

79. The contractor will be required to submit to RUDSICO, for review and approval, a site-specific environmental management plan (SEMP) including (i) proposed sites or locations for construction work camps, storage areas, hauling roads, lay down areas, disposal areas for solid

and hazardous wastes; (ii) specific mitigation measures following the approved EMP; (iii) monitoring program per SEMP; (iv) budget for SEMP implementation. No works can commence prior to approval of SEMP.

80. A copy of the EMP or approved SEMP will be kept on-site during the construction period at all times. Non-compliance with, or any deviation from, the conditions set out in the EMP or SEMP constitutes a failure in compliance and will require corrective actions. The EARF and the IEEs specify responsibilities in EMP implementation during design, construction and operation and maintenance (O&M) phases.

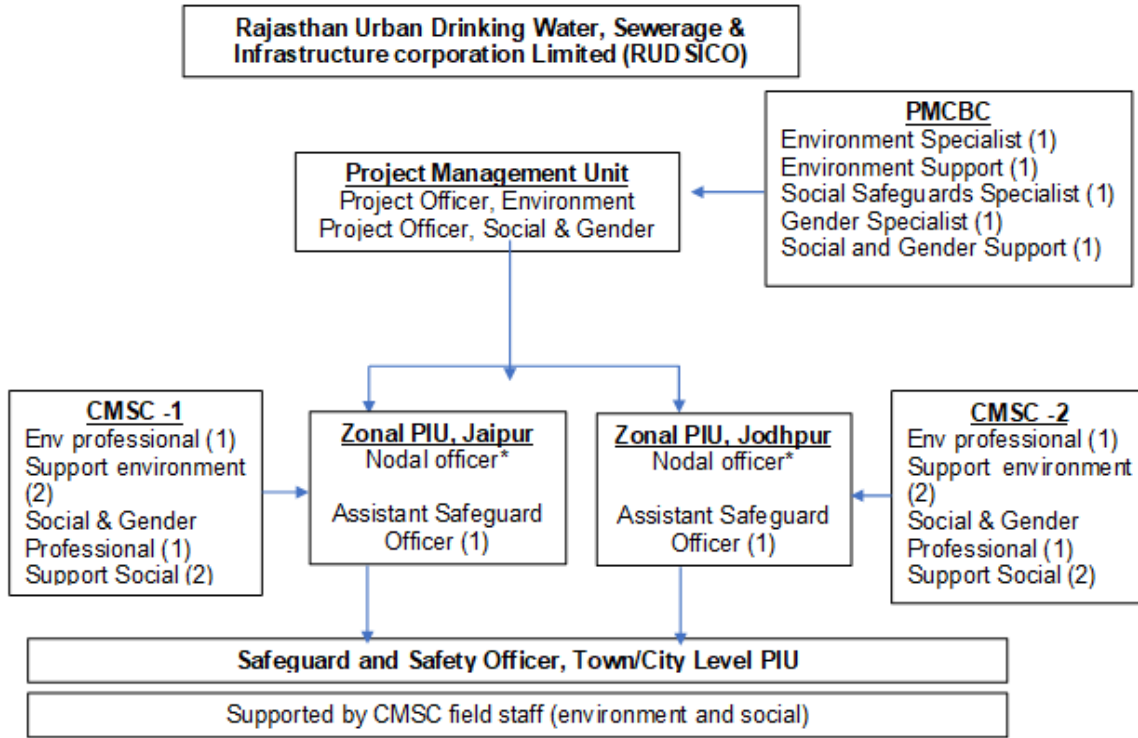
81. The DBO Contractor also have a dedicated social outreach team (SOT) and designated social supervisor, who hold a Master's degree in social science and would have at least 5 years of experience in resettlement planning and implementation and engage with the PIU, CAPPC and CMSC on social safeguards, health and safety, and core labor standards. The key role of the Contractor's Social Supervisor related to social safeguards will be to:

- (i) Work in close coordination with the PIU, CMSC and PMCBC engineers and social safeguards personnel to finalize detailed design keeping the safeguard principles adopted for the project in view;
- (ii) Ensure that all design-related measures (e.g., special considerations for the vulnerable related to facility locations or design, mitigation measures for affected persons etc.), are integrated into project designs before approval;
- (iii) Conduct joint walk-throughs with PIU, design engineers and social safeguards personnel of CMSC in sites/sections ready for implementation; identify the need for detailed measurement surveys, and support CMSC to jointly conduct detailed measurement surveys and census surveys to arrive at the final inventory of loss;
- (iv) Support project consultants in updating the draft resettlement plan/due diligence report/IPP/RIPP for submission to PIU/PMU and ADB for review and approval;
- (v) Ensure strict adherence to agreed impact avoidance and mitigation measures in the resettlement plan/DDR/RIPP/IPP during implementation;
- (vi) Assist with grievance redressal and ensure recording, reporting and follow-up for resolution of all grievances received; and
- (vii) Submit monthly progress reports including safeguards, health and safety and gender-disaggregated data as required for monitoring.

82. The resettlement plans /IPPs/RIPPs are included in bidding and contract documents and verified by the PIUs and PMU. All contractors have mobilized an environment, health and safety (EHS) supervisor and social outreach team (SOT) to ensure implementation of EMP/resettlement plan/RIPP social safeguard provisions in the agreed resettlement framework for the Project during civil works and O&M, who will also have the responsibility for communication with the public under the guidance of PMU/PIUs and grievance registration. Contractors are to carry out all mitigation and monitoring measures outlined in their contract.

83. The PMU and PIUs will ensure that bidding and contract documents include specific provisions requiring contractors to comply with: (i) all applicable labor laws and core labor standards on (a) prohibition of child labor as defined in national legislation for construction and maintenance activities; (b) equal pay for equal work of equal value regardless of gender, ethnicity, or caste; and (c) elimination of forced labor; and with (ii) the requirement to disseminate information on sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV/AIDS, to employees and local communities surrounding the project sites.

*Zonal PIU will be led by a nodal officer of the rank of assistant chief engineer who will also be the nodal person for safeguards and gender compliances in project implementation by town level PIUs. S/he will be supported by ASO in execution of these responsibilities.

84. Further details on responsibilities of different agencies for social safeguard implementation during different project phases are given in Table 13 below.

C. Institutional Capacity and Development

85. RUDSICO-EAP has experienced project staff for social safeguards, with knowledge and experience of ADB social safeguard policies and their implementation. However, retirement of existing staff during project implementation, transfer of candidates or recruitment/designation of

new candidates as safeguards officers at zonal or town level will require training of the new staff and officers who will be involved in project preparation and implementation. The PMCBC Social Safeguard Specialist will be responsible for training the PMU's safeguards officers (environmental and social), and PIUs' engineers and social safeguards officers. The resettlement framework includes indicative training modules on safeguards. The PMCBC will coordinate with PMU and PIUs on specific capacity development program.

- (i) sensitization on ADB's Policies and guidelines on social and indigenous people safeguards (ADB's Safeguard Requirement 2 and 3: Involuntary Resettlement and Indigenous Peoples) including meaningful consultation, GRM and accountability mechanism;
- (ii) introduction to the assessment of involuntary resettlement and indigenous peoples impacts and mitigation measures, including best practices, in the design, construction, operation and maintenance of water supply, sewerage, roads, and drainage subprojects;
- (iii) preparation and review of RPs/RIPPs/IPPs/DDR's based on preliminary design, and updating of the documents based on the final design;
- (iv) improved coordination within nodal departments;
- (v) disbursement of compensation, consultation; and
- (vi) monitoring and reporting requirements.

86. Table 14 provides the indicative training needs assessment. The cost of training will be borne under the Project's capacity building program by PMU. The detailed cost and specific modules will be customized for the available skill set after assessing the capabilities of the target participants and the requirements of the project by the SSS of PMCBC.

D. Implementation Schedule

87. The project will be implemented over a period of 7 years. The resettlement and indigenous peoples plan implementation schedule for this subproject it is 4 years. In general, the project implementation will consist of the three major phases, namely project preparation, land acquisition (if required), and rehabilitation of affected persons. In line with the principles laid down in this resettlement framework, the executing agency and implementing agency will ensure that project activities are synchronized between the RIPP implementation activities and the subproject implementation. The executing agency and implementing agency will ensure that no physical or economic displacement of affected households will occur until: (i) compensation at full replacement cost has been paid to each displaced person for project components or sections that are ready to be constructed; (ii) other entitlements listed in the RIPP are provided to the displaced persons; and (iii) a comprehensive income and livelihood rehabilitation program, supported by adequate budget, is in place to help displaced persons improve, or at least restore, their incomes and livelihoods.

88. All land acquisition, resettlement, and compensation for a subproject will be completed before award of civil works contracts. All land required will be provided free of encumbrances to the contractor prior to handing over of subproject sites and the start of civil works. The implementation of the RIPP will include: (i) identification of cut-off date and notification;⁵³ (ii) verification of losses and extent of impacts; (iii) finalization of entitlements and distribution of identity cards; (iv) consultations with affected persons on their needs and priorities; and (v) resettlement, provision of compensation and assistance, and income restoration for affected persons. The expected implementation schedule for the subproject is given in Table 15.

X. MONITORING AND REPORTING

89. The resettlement and indigenous peoples plan implementation will be closely monitored (specifically aspects relating to temporary impacts) to provide the PMU with an effective basis for assessing resettlement progress and identifying potential difficulties and problems. Internal monitoring will be undertaken by the PIU (through the assistant safeguard officer) with assistance from the PMU project officer. Monthly progress reports will be prepared and submitted to the PMU. PMU will consolidate the same and will submit semi-annual monitoring reports to the ADB for approval. Refer sample Monitoring Template in **Appendix 28**.

XI. STATUS OF WORKS AND ITS DUE DILIGENCE

90. The contract for this subproject has already been awarded, and the contractor mobilized on 28th October 2020. During the execution and service improvement plan (SIP) stage, (i) additional length of sewer network was considered and taken into as additional item and (ii) approach road to STP at Gupt Ganga road under Pratapgarh town. As part of due diligence - a field visit was undertaken to both the sites, where additional sewer network to be laid and approach road to STP which was initially dirt/unpaved road and CC road was proposed and constructed under subproject, with the objectives to (i) assess whether the subproject causes any resettlement (temporary/permanent, partial/full) impacts on structures and livelihood of titled or non-titled affected persons (APs); (ii) collect evidence (documents, photographs,) to understand/ identify resettlement impacts if any. In addition to that, list of affected persons was also curtailed as sewer network had been laid in the core market area of town Pratapgarh during the period of COVID 19. Details about due-diligence procedures related to social impacts are as follows:

A. Due diligence summary of the high and medium density areas where pipeline laid during lockdown period

91. This subproject is based on design build and operate model (DBO). The contract of this subproject has already been awarded on 28 October 2020 and approval has been given to the contractor for laying of pipeline and allied works in outskirts areas/residential areas. Pipelaying works in some of the high/medium density areas was also executed during the COVID-19 induced lockdown period in Pratapgarh. General movement and commercial activities were completely shut down due to restriction imposed by the state government due to Covid-19 pandemic. Special permission was given by the district administration (Sub-Divisional Magistrate) for laying of pipelines maintaining all Covid protocols and guidelines including standard operating procedure (SOP). Total 194 vendors⁵⁴ were identified in the stretches, where pipelines were laid during the lockdown period. As laying was completed during the said period, all livelihood impacts were avoided. Prior to commencement of works, joint visit with local bodies was undertaken for assessment of impact and subsequently meeting was organized with local bodies and decision was taken mutually by the local bodies and implementing agency to execute the pipe laying works in highly congested/commercial areas in the month of April and May 2021. During execution, frequent monitoring was done of all the areas taken. Total 1200 m pipeline works was executed at the center of the road (Ref **Appendix 29**) after obtaining permission from Sub-Divisional Magistrate. Permission letter for laying of pipeline is attached as **Appendix 30**. Newspaper clipping is also attached as **Appendix 31**.

Videography of the process was conducted by the project team to substantiate that the work was executed during the period of closure of the business activity due to government-imposed lockdown.

B. Due Diligence summary of additional length with regard to Social Impact

92. During execution, confirmatory survey was conducted by the contractor within the municipal area/limit under Nagar Parishad town Pratapgarh and it was found that few pockets / missing links left in sewer network of DPR. These pockets (residential areas) / missing links are incorporated in the Service Improvement Plan (SIP). Thus, additional length has been added in the scope of works which is as follows:

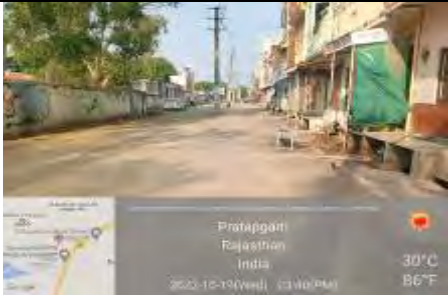

93. It is anticipating that the laying of the aforesaid additional length mainly in lateral lines will cause neither any physical nor any economic displacement of any kind. There is no possibility of land acquisition and no structure will be affected, none need to be relocated, and consequently no involuntary resettlement (IR) impacts are anticipating. It is pertinent to mention here that socio-economic survey of likely to affected persons had been done throughout the town as per alignment during preparation of DPR. Keeping in mind of additional length of 20.175 kms in lateral lines and 0.780 kms in DI K-7, a transect walk of the included with consultations, along with photography was also carried out with concerned officials and consultants. The following methodological techniques have been adopted for preparing DDR (i) Field-based assessment; (ii) Public consultations and (iii) evidence-based photo along with alignment of the additional length of sewer network. The DDR confirms that mainly residential areas have been included in the scope of sewerage network. Since the design has been optimized, the existing RoW of the available roads is sufficient for laying of network pipes. As per transect walk and visual screening, there will be no impact on structures, crops, trees or livelihood belonging to titled or non-titled persons. No additional affected persons were identified in the additional areas, hence the category of the subproject remains “B”.

C. Due Diligence Report on Approach Road from Gupt Ganga Marg to STP (7 MLD), Pratapgarh town under Subproject Waste Water town Pratapgarh

94. During preparatory stage, location of the STP (7 MLD) was proposed near Kila gate road and this site was quite close to the habitations. Hence, decision was taken by the project

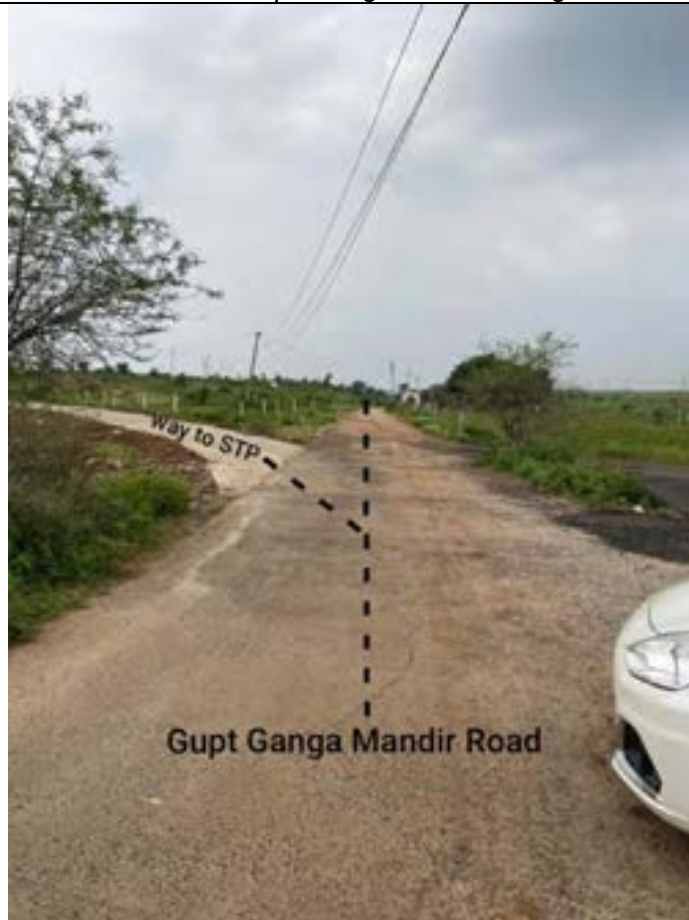
implementation unit (PIU) with consultation to the officials of urban local body (Nagar Parishad-town Pratapgarh) to shift the STP site to another location based on public consultations and technical requirements and an alternate land was identified. No habitation was reported in and around the site and reported technically appropriate. This newly identified site is also government land and under possession of Nagar Parishad-Pratapgarh town. Proposed site is about 600 m away from the paved (bituminous) road called Gupt Ganga Mandir road and located adjacent to proposed by-pass road which will further connect to existing Banswara – Pratapgarh road. refer to google image showing STP site along with proposed by-pass road shown in the red colour

95. This approach road with length of 604 m from Gupt Ganga road to STP is not recorded in the revenue record but being used by locals as throughfare pathway. Few roads related facilities like culverts, electric polls had been constructed/installed to define the right of way (ROW) of the existing road. Even landowners along the throughfare pathway are selling the plots. Refer to site photographs below:

96. Team of consultant has visited the revenue office and also have meeting with concerned officials locally called Patwari. As per record, approach road from Gupt Ganga mandir road to STP (7 MLD) is not recorded as road in the revenue record. It is also pertinent to mention that bitumen road Gupt Ganga Marg is also not recorded in the revenue record. He also confirmed verbally that most of the existing roads of town Pratapgarh are not recorded but being used by locals as throughfare pathway and related.

97. In this regard, a letter has also been issued by Nagar Parishad-Pratapgarh that approach road from Gupta Ganga Marg to STP (7 MLD) is under possession and jurisdiction of Nagar Parishad-Pratapgarh, copy of the letter enclosed.

D. Status of Proposed Subproject Waste Water-Pratapgarh town before handing over to Nagar Parishad-Pratapgarh

98. This subproject is based on the design-build & operate (DBO) model. The contract for this subproject has already been awarded, and the contractor mobilized on 28.10.2020 and completed all the works including construction of STP, SPS, CRMC, and laying of sewer network/pipelines. This subproject/scheme is handing over to NP-Pratapgarh on 19.07.2024 and consequently handed over to DBO Contractor namely M/s Khilari Infrastructure Private Limited for operation and maintenance for period of next 10 years, refer to **Appendix 32**. Photographs of works are presented below:

XII. IMPLEMENTATION OF RESETTLEMENT PLAN AND ITS STATUS

99. Measures recommended in resettlement plan has been followed. Activities related to implementation of RIPP-Pratapgarh had also been incorporated in the respective period of bi-annual SSMR and reported to ADB. Glimpses of RIPP Implementation with photographs, refer to **Appendix 35**. Summary of the RIPP implementation with regard to compensation amount given to affected persons is as follows while status of each affected persons (412 in nos.) is provided separately, refer to **Appendix 14**.

100. **RP Implementation** – During execution phase, adequate measures have been taken to minimize the adverse impacts of involuntary resettlement within the alignment, based on the key ADB principle to avoid and minimize land acquisition and resettlement impacts through detailed technical design such as usages of horizontal directional drilling (HDD) method, revision in pipeline alignments etc., impact was mitigated on 190⁵⁶ APs. During laying of the sewer network pipelines, PIU-Pratapgarh had proposed using the encumbrance-free government-owned land and existing road rights of way (ROW) belonging to the government. Out of 412 affected persons (APs), It was assessed that laying the sewer network pipeline works with the ROW and on the edges of the carriageway will require temporary shifting of 222 mobile vendors (fruit and vegetables, snacks, tea stall, fancy/makeup items etc.) only and out of that three AP voluntary refused to take compensation amount. All these temporarily affected mobile hawkers and vendors, including those with push-carts and temporary structures, were assisted by the Project contractor to move to alternative locations to continue business during the period of construction and were facilitated to return once construction in the area was completed. These affected persons (219 in no's) were compensated for income loss and out of that 70 households

belonged to vulnerable category, who were paid additional assistance as per the entitlement matrix. All social safeguard activities including compensation/assistance paid to APs, impact mitigated etc. are being reported to ADB through bi-annual SSMR of respective period. Summary of the APs after RP implementation is as follows while for details, refer to **Appendix 14**.

101. RIPP Implementation (Indigenous People) – Subproject Pratapagarh Town comes under district Pratapgarh and it has been declared as a scheduled area by the Government of India. The subproject area (municipality area) doesn't have significant population of scheduled tribe households. As per census of India-2011, out of 42079 population, 3459 (8%) population belong to scheduled tribes. These scheduled tribes are mainly reported at few wards like ward number 20, 25, 1, 4 and 19, refer to table below, and live with non-scheduled tribes' households. Thus, all the households including scheduled tribes' households are covered in the subproject beneficiaries' group. Out of total wards (25 in nos.), 8 percent of scheduled tribes' households is reported under ward number 20 (26%), followed by ward number 25 (25%), ward number 1 and 4 (23% each) and ward number 2 and 19 (13% each). In the remaining wards, percentage of scheduled tribes' households are significantly lower or not reported.

102. Numerous tribal groups are residing in Rajasthan State and tribes of Rajasthan constitute approximately (13.48%) of the total population. In Rajasthan, Banswara, Pratapgarh and Dungarpur are fully tribal districts while Udaipur, Rajsamanad, Chhitourgarh, Pali and Sirohi are having partially tribal areas. In the Rajasthan, Garasia tribes is small tribes inhabiting while Bhils are the largest tribe in Rajasthan residing all over the State. This subproject town Pratapgarh comes under Pratapgarh district and out of the total population of town Pratapgarh, only 8% population belongs to scheduled tribes (tribal community). Bheel and Vasava of tribal community constitute majority of population of the tribes in the subproject town.

103. No negative impacts are envisaged on any section of the society, including 'scheduled tribes from the subproject activities No subproject locations belong to tribal land nor fall in scheduled areas. Even, presence of a particularly vulnerable tribal groups (PVTG) is not reported. Thus, no adverse impacts on scheduled tribes' households are reported. The impacts to scheduled tribe population in the subproject areas are beneficial only. During execution stage, formal consultation / meetings with scheduled tribes are conducted on regular intervals right from planning to execution stage, and transect walks are conducted in project location including alignment of proposed sewer pipeline network under subproject wastewater components, no adverse impacts to scheduled tribe are anticipated and neither any physical displacement of any household including scheduled tribe household is anticipated.

104. During implementation of RIPP, also included addressing to safeguards issues and to provide maximum benefits to the scheduled tribes population, social safeguard staff, CAPP staff

and social outreach team (SOT) are directed to emphasized on tribal households and sensitize them through group meetings, individual consultation, distribution of IEC materials etc. To make messaging more effective among tribal areas/wards of subproject town Pratapgarh, team has developed audio message in local language (locally called Vagdi) considering language and socio-economic cultural aspects of local tribes. This audio message has been announced through pre-recorded audio announcement about benefits of the proposed subproject on local auto-rickshaw. Information about grievance redressal mechanism (GRM) of RUIDP along with Toll-free number are made available through printed material like flex banners, brochures etc. Information, Education and Communication (IEC) report is annexed under Appendix 35.

105. The subproject area is having beneficial impacts on scheduled tribe community in Pratapgarh town - 100% of the scheduled tribe households in subproject coverage area has been provided with sewerage connections.

106. Measures recommended in the RIPP have been updated and implemented. Activities related to the implementation of the RIPP for Pratapgarh Town had also been incorporated in the respective period of bi-annual SSMR and submitted to ADB. The glimpses of RIPP Implementation with photographs have been provided in Appendix 35. The summary of the RIPP implementation with regard to the compensation amount given to affected persons is as follows, while the status of each affected person is provided separately, refer to Appendix 14.

107. **Mitigation Measures** - During the execution of the civil works of laying of pipelines network to avoid and minimize the resettlement impacts, the project has implemented/mitigated the following measures: (i) announcement of proposed civil works in advance – through social outreach team (SOT) prior to start of civil works in the respective area and conduct meeting with local residents and shopkeepers etc.; (ii) provide access to shops and residences or other buildings along alignments by providing wooden and metal planks (iii) increased workforces to finish work quickly in areas with impacts on access; (iv) phased construction schedule and working on one segment or one side of the road at a time; ensured management of traffic during the laying of the pipeline; (v) work to be carried out in the market area in small section with phased manner during non-business hours (generally after 11 pm and before 4 am and on market holidays) to the extent possible; (vi) adopting trenchless technology; and (vi) assistance to mobile vendors, if any present during construction, to shift nearby and to shift back.

108. **Consultation** – Meaningful consultations with stakeholders like affected persons, local community, and other line departments etc. were organized during the Project cycle, both the initiation and execution stages of Project. During the execution phase, PIU officials, including Social Safeguard Support (SSS), visited regularly to disseminate project activities to affected persons, collect required data, and issue identity cards to the Affected Persons. Assistance was paid to Affected Persons prior to start of civil work

109. . In addition to that, a team of Community Awareness and Public Participation Consultant (CAPPC), including the Social Outreach Team (SOT) of the Contractor worked at the town level/sub-project to create awareness about the project in the field. It ensured public participation for all project works at the community level. CAPPC has also undertaken various IEC activities to

110. create awareness about subproject and promote better health and hygiene. During the execution period, all residents (including affected persons) were informed of construction schedules prior to the commencement of pipe laying. Signboards in the local language (Hindi) were displayed and included: (i) section to be affected, (ii) start and end dates, (iii) information on traffic rerouting, if any, and (iv) contact information for questions/grievances. Orientation programs were undertaken during regular interv

Is.

111. **Orientation Program** - Orientation programs were undertaken to sensitize the PIU officials, CMSC staff, and contractor team about ADB Policy, Entitlement Matrix, Resettlement issues, monitoring and reporting, and grievance redressal mechanism (GRM) etc., refer to **Appendix 25 and 35**.

112. A common GRM has been adopted for social, environmental, or any other grievances related to this proposed sub-project of wastewater, Pratapgarh town. This GRM was followed during the implementation of the resettlement plan. This GRM also provides an accessible and trusted platform for receiving and facilitating the resolution of affected persons' grievances related to the project. During the execution period, minor complaints from the local people about things like housekeeping, road restoration in the residential areas, pipeline damage, leakages in a new connection, etc. were received and resolved at the town level within the time frame. It is pertinent to mention here that no complaints were received from affected persons (APs) during and after execution of works.

113. During RIPP implementation, internal monitoring was carried out by CMSC in a regular basis and set of indicators for periodic monitoring has been planned at PIU level like (i) payment of compensation prior to the start of civil works, and (ii) unanticipated impacts and grievance redress has been monitored during execution, and corrective actions has also taken in accordance with the agreed entitlement matrix. No adverse impact is envisaged during RIPP implementation. And it has also been depicted in periodic biannual reports. The impacts are limited like temporary loss of livelihood, and doesn't affect the dignity, human rights, livelihood systems, or culture of indigenous peoples, or affect the territories or natural or cultural resources that indigenous peoples own, use, occupy, or claim as their ancestral domain. Beneficial impacts on all indigenous peoples (scheduled tribe) households in the subproject area are anticipated, and their participation in project benefits are enhanced

114. **Reuse of treated effluent:** STP (7 MLD) at Santpur- There are agricultural activities near the STP site, and treated effluent from STP will be utilized in irrigation facilities by local farmers. In this regard, meetings and personal contact with local farmers has been organized by CAPP, SOT and CMSC-II staff in consultation with municipality. All these farmers agreed to use treated effluent in their fields (Appendix 33). For more details regarding usages of treated effluent by stakeholders, refer to initial environment examination report of this subproject.

115. Under FSSM, desludging of septage from household pits/ septic tanks are being undertaken and septage is disposed in designated unit/area at sewage treatment plant. FSSM area is scattered and identified on outskirts of the town Pratapgarh but within the jurisdiction of municipality limit. Delimitation of the wards has been done and number of wards has been increased from 25 to 40 wards. As per increased number of wards, FSSM area comes under ward number 4, 5, 6, 8, 26, 27, 33, 39 and 40. These FSSM area marked on town map, refer to Appendix 34.

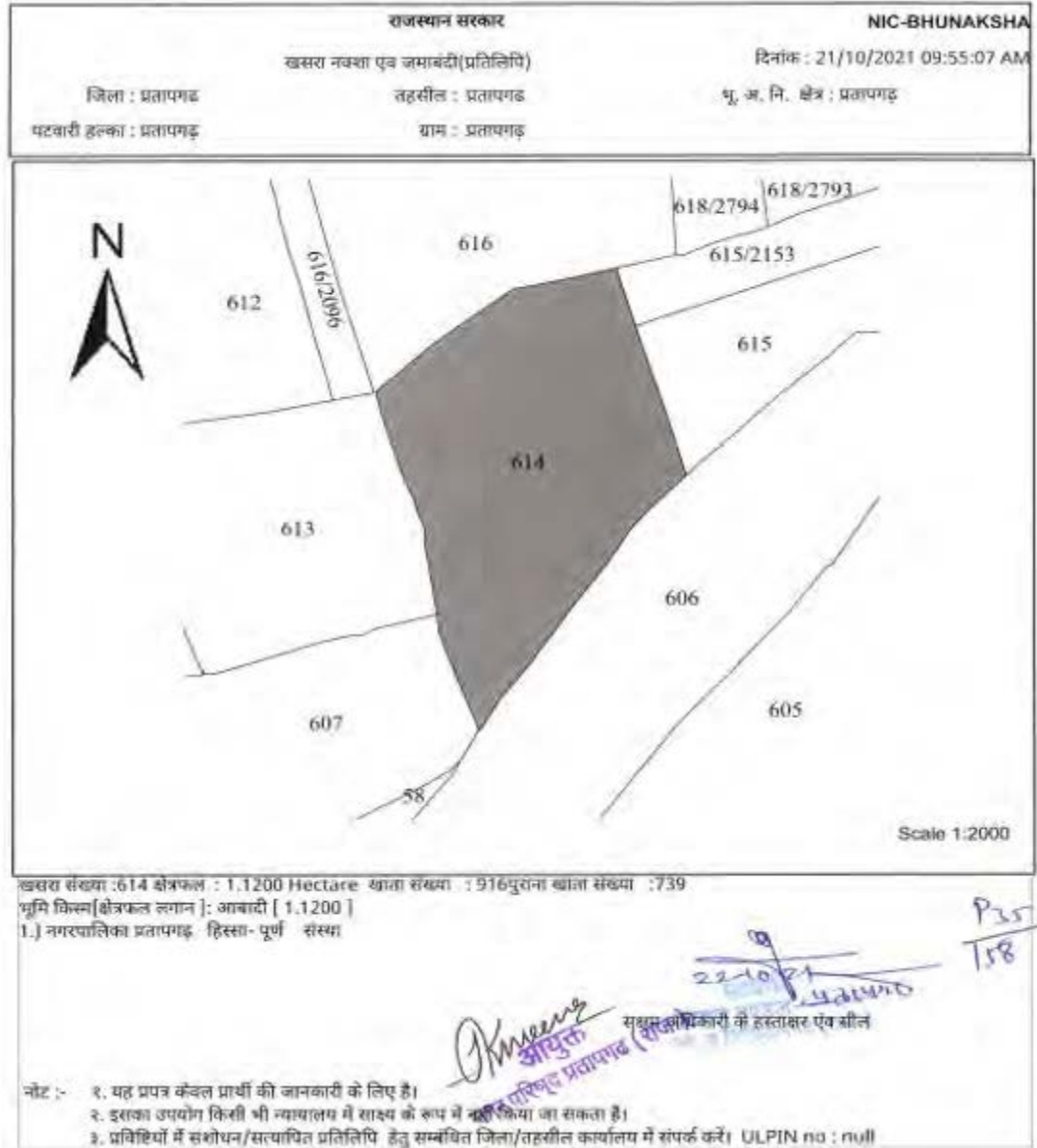

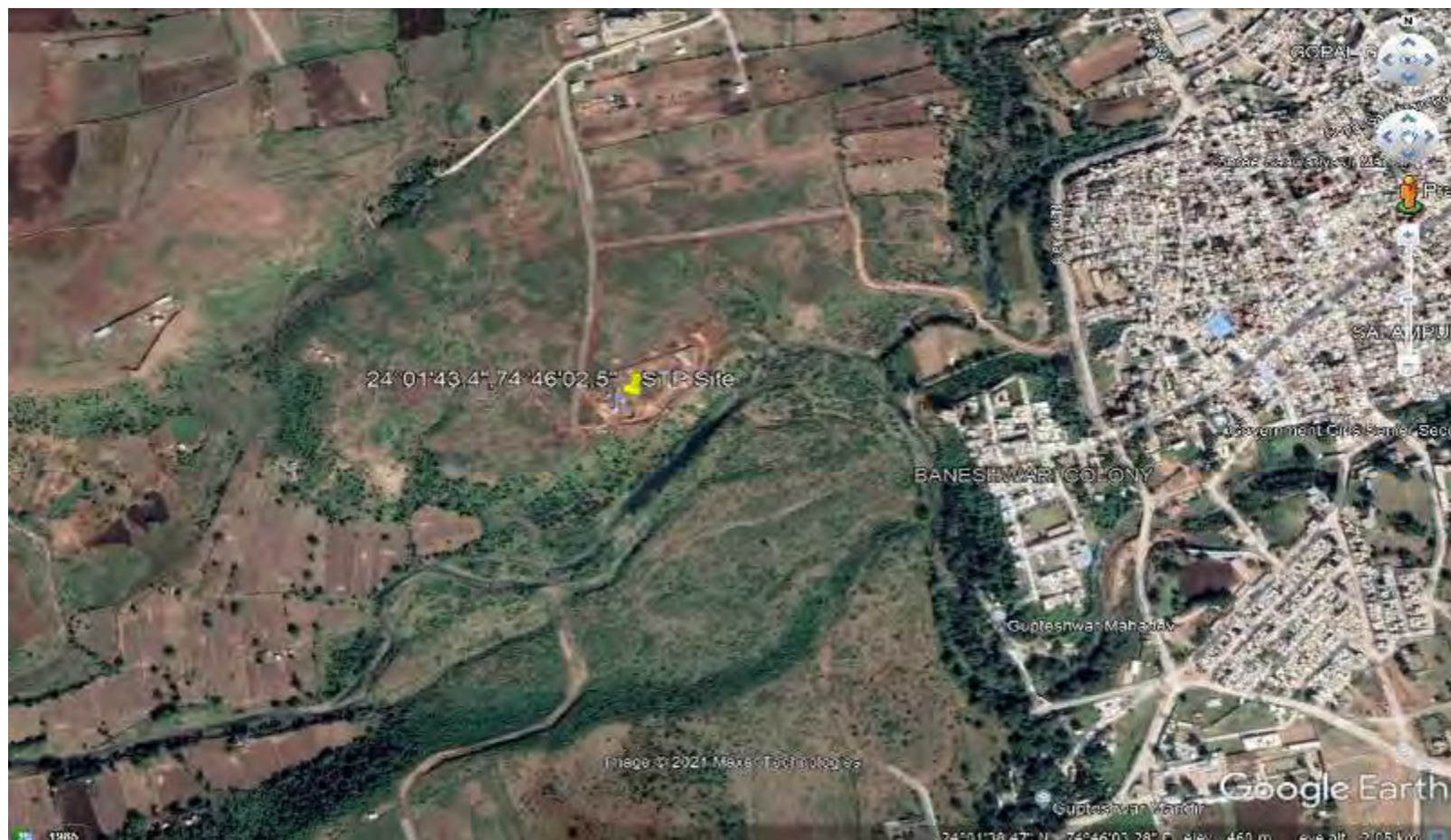

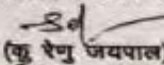

Appendix 6(a): Khasra Map of proposed SPS site, Kila Road

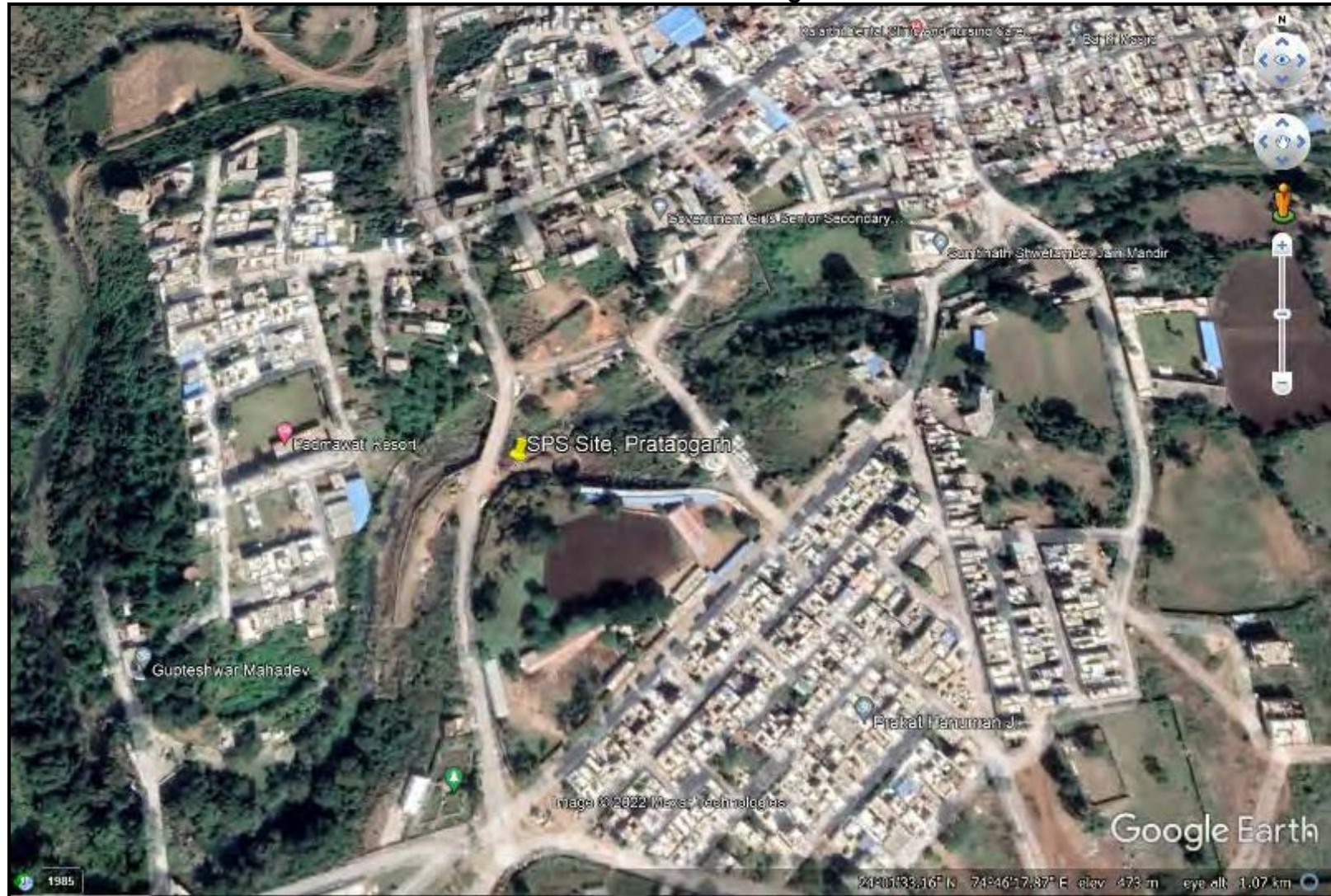

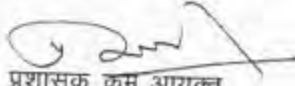

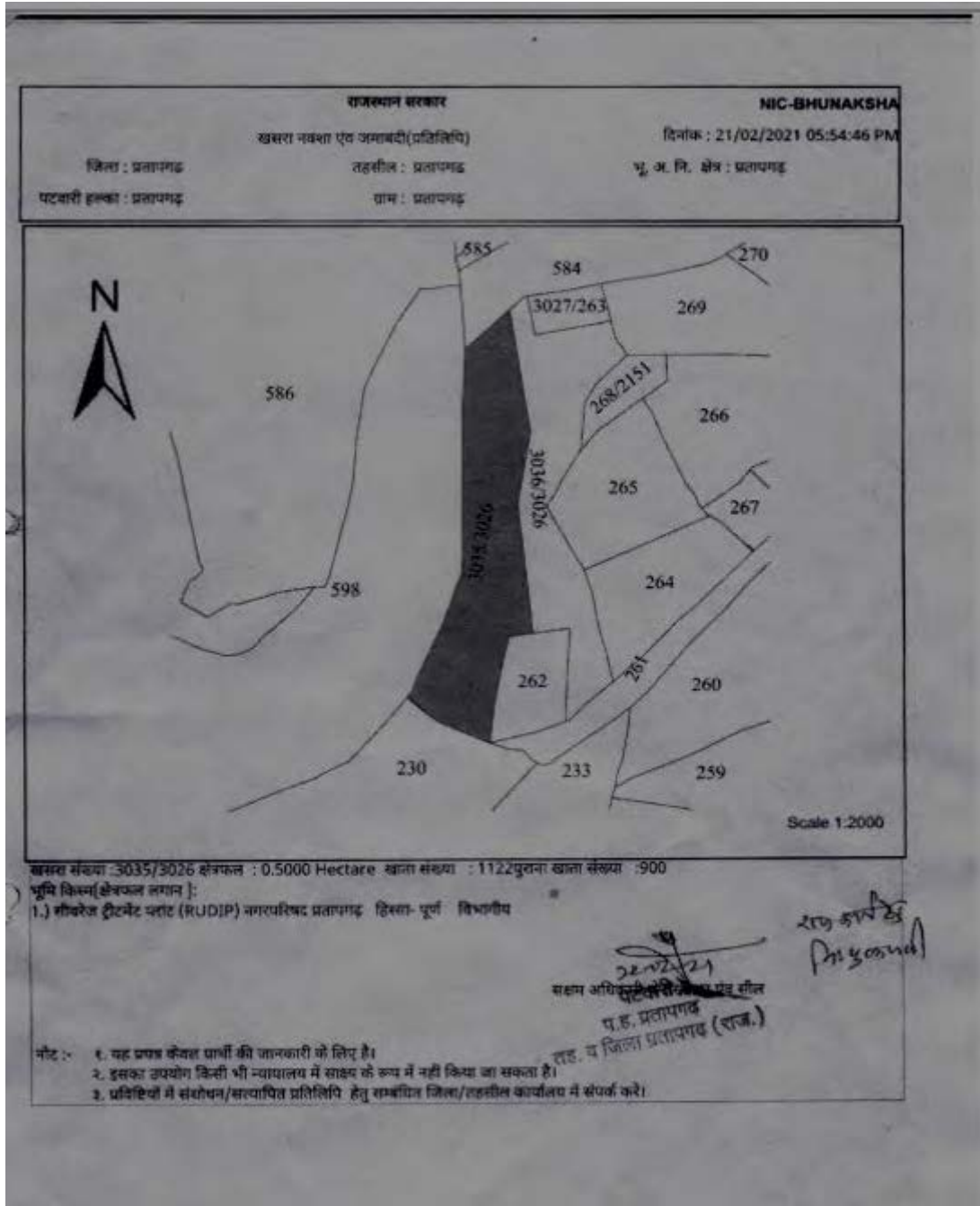
